The year 2005 saw a dramatic increase in the workload of the County Attorney's office and the number of cases filed by the office. Following are the number of cases filed in each classification, with the number for 2004 in parentheses:

The fines assessed with these cases also rose from only \$78,623.29 assessed in 2004 to \$159,151.75 assessed in 2005. Hot check collection in 2005 resulted in restitution to local merchants in the amount of \$58, 125. 58 up from \$44,562.50 in 2004.

Some of the changes which were made during 2005 include the creation of a computerized case management system to help manage and docket the criminal caseload. The system was created by the County Attorney on existing software, so the cost to the county was minimal. The system will help the County Attorney and the County Judge monitor case settings, ensuring that

Texas Farmers Union Asking Congress To Support Disaster Assistance

Submitted by Wes Sims, Texas Farmers Union in Waco, TX.

As fires raged across Texas, devastating farms and homes, Congress left of its holiday recess without declaring the burning portions of our state disaster areas. The fires are still burning, and we've yet to see any emergency assistance. I am pleased the President Bush declared several counties disaster areas, however I am concerned that the government has yet to provide direct assistance to those who have suffered severe losses on the farm. I am urging him to direct congress to pass an emergency disasters assistance bill to help farmers and ranchers cover all natural disasters- including drought, hurricane, flooding wildfires and deep frosts.

The wildfires of the last several weeks have destroyed crops, pastures, livestock, fences, houses, barns and equipment. We've heard reports of the tags melting off animal's ears, and cows burning to death. To date, the fires have scorched nearly 500,000 acres of farmland here, in Oklahoma and in New Mexico. Millions of dollars in damage has already occurred, with more

I find it irresponsible of Congress to adjourn without passing disaster assistance for producers suffering from the blows of Mother Nature.

Texas Farmers Union is asking Congress to support disaster assistance for farmers and ranchers who have suffered crop and livestock losses in 2005 and 2006 due to weather related disasters including drought, fire, flood, frost, etc.

This assistance should be designated as emergency spending and not offset by reductions in agriculture programs. NFU also believes assistance should be provided to help farmers and ranchers cope with increased energy costs through an economic assistance plan.

Weather-related disaster losses combined with declining commodity prices and skyrocketing energy costs are putting farmers in a financial bind. In the past we have successfully fought for and won disaster assistance, but in the long run we think that Congress needs more than ad-hoc legislation to address disaster in the countryside. TFU supports the development and implementation of a permanent disaster program by the federal government. We believe that such a program should cover both shallow and catastrophic losses.

Our leaders in Washington should not turn their backs on our nation's suppliers of food and fiber when we need help most. We know we cannot control the weather, but I hope Congress will step in and help us rebuild our farms and businesses. www.texasfarmersunion.org

Giardina is a 1984 graduate of Paulding High School.

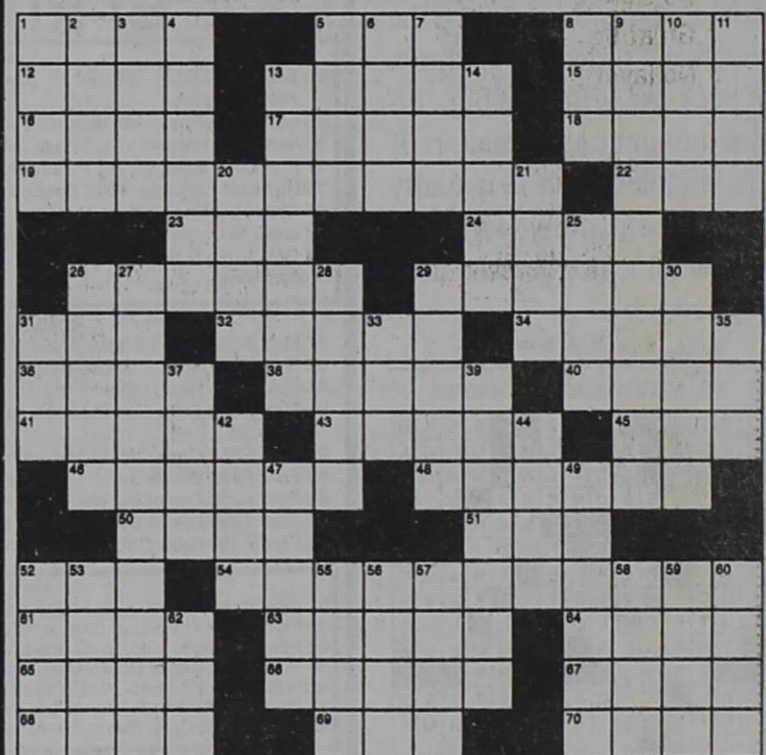
Ranger College Alumni Encouraged To Participate In College's Development

Fishing for the Truth

Outlandish claims out of Indonesia might otherwise go unnoticed, but when backed up by London Natural History Museum authorities, they become take-to-the-bank facts. So ring one up for the Indonesians. They harbor the world's smallest fish there, and that's no fish story.

Museum officials claim that the fish, about a quarter-inch long, are .1 millimeter shorter than the species previously thought to be the smallest. The new record holders — dubbed "Paedocypris Progenetica"—are members of the carp family. They have see-through bodies, and thrive in dark, tea-colored water at least 100 times more acidic than rainwater in peat swamps on the Indonesian island of Sumatra.

The news is bound to turn the fishing world upside down. Now anglers who've spent lifetimes trying to catch the biggest fish will switch gears in the race to see who can catch the smallest.

The tiniest of fishermen in the tiniest of boats may bait the tiniest of hooks, and moments later reel in a trophy, screaming that he caught a fish "THIS SHORT." He'll have his index finger almost against his thumb, exaggerating the shortness of his catch.

But a game warden will come alongside, examine the catch and order him to throw it back for being too big. Final thought on the matter: If the smallest fish is actually transparent, how will they know if the taxidermist does a good job?...

Fort Worth— The largest collection of Civil War artifacts west of the Mississippi River went on display when the Texas Civil War Museum opened to the public January 25.

The museum is a collaborative effort involving private collectors Ray and Judy Richey and The Texas Division United Daughters of the Confederacy. The museum has more than 3,000 artifacts which will rotate on exhibit.

Among the artifacts is a collection of more than 60 flags valued at approximately \$3 million. It is the largest collection of flags in the state of Texas. Most of the flags are from Texas units that fought for the Confederacy.

"This is a long-time dream of mine to be able to share my personal collection in a public venue," said Richey, president of Ray Richey and Company, Incorporated. "I have been collecting for more than 20 years, and this is one of the largest private collections of Civil War artifacts in North America. I believe this museum will be an essential stop for anyone interested in learning more about this important part of Texas and United States history."

The museum is a non-profit entity that includes artifacts from what was the Texas Confederate Museum displayed in Austin from

1904 to 1988. This collection is controlled by The Texas Division UDC. This joint venture between private collectors and a public trust is considered rare among museum collections in the United States.

Among the featured displays at the museum is a collection of Victorian era dresses. The museum has over 200 dresses and about three dozen will be displayed on a rotating basis.

The museum will offer special discounts and attractions for student groups. The museum's main focus will be educating current and future generations about the Civil War and the role Texas played.

Once opened, the museum's operating hours will be Tuesday through Saturday, 9 a.m. until 5 p.m. Admission prices are \$6 for adults and \$3 for students ages 7 through 12. Children 6 years and under are free when accompanied by an adult. Group and active military discounts are available.

puterization effort also saves time when setting cases and producing the accompanying paperwork.

The office has also stepped up efforts to ensure that Defendants actually show up for court. Bond Forfeitures and related agreements totaled only \$6,325 in 2004, but have reached \$19, 570 in 2005. This number should actually decrease in the future as bondsmen and sureties understand that defendants showing up for court is not optional.

There were no major trials in 2005 and six minor trials were conducted, with 5 convictions and one hung jury.

Emergency Farm Loan Applications Being Accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans caused by extreme wildfire threat that occurred on December 1, 2005, and continuing, are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) office located in Anson, Richard G. Young said.

"Callahan is one of 9 primary counties in Texas recently named by the President of the United States eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from extreme wildfire threat that occurred on December 1, 2005, and continuing."

Richard G. Young said, "Farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 100% of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue the agricultural business, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 3.75 percent."

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible

for a FSA emergency loan," Richard G. Young said. Farmers participating in the Federal Crop Insurance program will have a figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under the emergency designation will be accepted until September 11, 2006 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Richard G. Young said.

FSA is a credit agency of the United States Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who meet U.S. citizen requirements and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizenship requirements are met by holding a majority interest.

The FSA office in Anson is open from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday - Friday.
