BUDGET HEARING SET FOR MAY 11

Quick thinking by James A. Jar- A public hearing on the tentative City of Rockport budget has been set for Monday, May 11, at the regular meeting of the City Council, according to Mrs. Jean Tuer,

The budget, according to Mrs. Tuer, is based on an estimated 90 percent collection, amounting to \$44,550; delinquent tax collections estimated at \$1700; gross receipts from other sources, \$1700; permits of various sorts, \$500; and \$500 in occupation taxes.

The city's tax rate of \$1.50 per hundred is allocated as follows: 22½ percent or 34c out of every tax dollar to the street improvement bond sinking fund; a like amount to the street maintenance fund; and 55 percent, or .82c to the general fund.

The tentative budget calls for \$10,000 for the street improvement bond sinking fund; \$10,000 for the street maintenance fund; and \$32,-250 for the general fund of the city.

This last is allocated as follows: Five hundred dollars to the park fund; \$2,500 fire department; \$500, building maintenance; \$1,500 for social security payments; \$1,500 for insurance; \$4,500 for street lights; \$4,000 for office salaries; \$3,500 for office expense; and \$13,-750 for city operations.




