Wonders of Liquid Air To Be Shown At ACHS Next Thursday

A timely and interesting demonstration of the wonders of science, to be presented at Aransas County High School Auditorium next Thursday morning, May 7, at 8:45 a.m., is the liquid air program of John Sloan.

In his program Sloan conducts about thirty-five separate demonstrations, among which are a variety of combustion experiments achieved by evaporating nitrogen from liquid air. These are designed to convey an understanding of the principle of rocket propulsion, showing how the liquid makes kerosene burn rapidly to supply the super-power thrust required by rockets.

FEDERAL ENGINEER INSPECTS PLANT SITE

Quick thinking by James A. Jarboe, head of the Chamber of Commerce Industrial Committee, has resulted in consideration of Rockport as a site for one of the salt-water conversion plants planned for the Gulf Coast by the federal government.

A letter to the proper governmental agency immediately after the preliminary announcement appeared in the newspapers brought a prompt reply and ended in a visit Wednesday afternoon of E. A. Cadwallader, federal engineer making a first-hand investigation of possible sites. He was accompanied by W. O. George, chief of the Ground Water Division of the Texas Board of Water Engineers and by Bill Price, Central Power & Light industrial engineer.

Jarboe, from work done beforehand, was able to assure the group that a site for such plant was available on Navigation District property, and that such a project would receive full support from the area, a statement seconded by County Judge John D. Wendell.

Others taking part in the conversation were City Councilmen Ernest Harriet and Jack Horton, City Water Superintendent Tom Shults, Travis Johnson, and Chamber of Commerce Manager Mary Juergens.

Cadwallader asked that a very detailed questionnaire be filled out and returned to his office as soon as possible, and that he be furnished with maps of the region.

Scout Contest Gets Under Way For Jamboree

Men of the First Presbyterian Church, sponsors of Boy Scout Troop 49, have initiated plans to send one outstanding member of the troop to the National Jamboree in July of 1960.

To be held at Colorado Springs, the Jamboree is expected to attract approximately 50,000 scouts and explorers from all sections of the United States. Such a trip, they feel, ought to provide the chosen boy with enough thrills to last a lifetime.

Besides attending the Jamboree, boys will be able to take advantage of a number of guided trips, one of which will be a visit to Carlsbad Caverns. These side trips, Scoutmaster Louis Tuer said, are included in the Jamboree fee.

The Troop 49 scout will be chosen by means of a contest which will start Friday, May 1, 1959, and continue for the next fourteen months, closing July 1, 1960.

Points will be given each boy for the different ranks he attains during the contest, and for such things as attendance at meetings, participation in troop activities, attendance at Sunday school, mass, catechism and church, and hours worked on troop projects, as well as community activities.

Attaining the rank of second class scout, a boy will receive 10 points, first class scout, 25; star, 50; life, 75; and Eagle, 150. All attendance items will be valued at 10 points each, as will each hour spent on troop projects.

Scoutmaster Tuer said that each merit badge earned will be good for 20 points, and pointed out that as there are over 100 such badges available the boys have a wide and varied field from which to choose.

For earning the God and Country Award, one of the most prized and revered, 200 points will be credited to the scout and any Eagle palm award will also receive 200 points.

The boys will start from scratch, Tuer says, but from the interest and enthusiasm already displayed, he looks for a spirited contest, in which the boys will also improve their minds, bodies and attitudes typified by the ideals of scouting.

And, so fast did news of the approval get around, according to A. C. Glass, that James Palmer, local game warden, bought the first lot the morning following, while a local builder is negotiating for ten more on which to start home construction.

R. J. Beaman, owner of Holiday Lodges, asked councilmen to enter into an agreement with him allowing him to fence an unopened portion of Maple Street to protect trees growing there. He would agree to maintain the property and to remove the fence on demand. This request was tabled until other property owners in the area could be contacted for their reactions.

James A. Jarboe, county surveyor, presented a revised plat of the Buck Jones subdivision. He stated that Jones still requested city water service, but had withdrawn his request for sewage. The council approved the plat, but asked that they be furnished with a revised map of the water lines.

Mayor Hollis Collum was authorized to write state legislators that the council approved House Bill 631, which would aid in enforcement of collection of a personal property tax on autos, which neither the county or school district enforces, and which most cities have given up as a bad job.

This bill would require anyone applying for a car, truck, or similar license to present certificates showing that these taxes had been paid to city, school and county before a new license could be issued.

In other action, the council authorized installation of necessary drainage under a number of street crossings, to tie in with the work now underway on Loop 70, and water service requested for Sandra Courts was approved, provided that the owner paid half the cost of extending the lines.

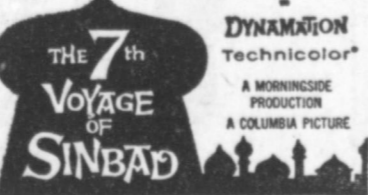

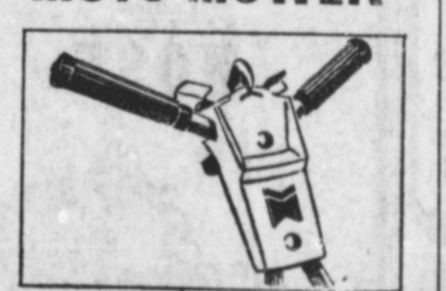
