Marina Proposed for Little Bay Area to Cost \$500,000

A \$500,000 marina for the Rockport end of the Little Bay project is a possibility if an offer made through Corpus Christi architect Lynn Evans is accepted by Aransas County Navigation District commissioners.

Evans, who met with the Board to display plans of the proposed development, said that his principals were willing to sign a long

term lease on the waterfront acreage involved if satisfactory terms can be arranged. Development would follow quickly, he stated.

Chairman Dick Pieton and Commissioners Raymond Owens and Ted Atwood, while impressed by the possibilities of the project, made no decision, pending study.

As shown on Evans tentative layout, the shore part of the marina would consist of stores, offices, a restaurant, dressing rooms and showers, contained on the first floor of a sprawling, attractively landscaped building.

The central portion of the structure, two stories high, provides space upstairs for a yacht club. Room for future expansion is left, Evans said, where cabanas, guest cottages and more shops may be built, and the necessary docks and other facilities are provided in front of the buildings.

Navigation District commissioners, during the informal discussion, expressed much interest in this or, as one said, "any project for this area in keeping with our overall plan of development for the waterfront, that will provide taxes for the county and revenue for the Navigation District."

Commissioners noted that the overwhelming acceptance of the Little Bay project by the public was already posing problems, and pointed to the fact that the new mile and a half crescent of beach, dredged from the bottom of the bay, was crowded from end to end over the Fourth.

"We must be careful," Chairman Pieton said, "of the type of developments around the new basin. They must be attractive, in order not to ruin the waterfront; they must return us a reasonable revenue on our investment; and they should be of such a nature that they will add to the real and intangible value of the property."

New, High-Voltage Line Soon to Be Completed to Lamar

Construction is moving rapidly on a new high voltage transmission line from Central Power and Light's Refugio substation to the Lamar oil fields.

The 69,000-volt line will carry additional power to Lamar Peninsula, where the Bay Petroleum's new stripping plant is well under way, increasing available supplies for future oil well development.

B. T. Hardeman, CPL manager at Rockport, said construction crews are now setting poles for the new line, following survey work which got underway in June. Actual construction began last week.

The line, of conventional H-frame construction, is expected to be ready for service August 1, Hardeman said.

Shelton Sets Course Record With 63

Jack Shelton, professional at Live Oak Country Club, playing in a match game with five other golfers, shot a sizzling 63 Wednesday afternoon to set a new course record at the local club.

Shrimp Production Skyrocketing, Prices Take Nose Dive In July

According to C. E. Nickerson, U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service statistician, shrimp production in the Coastal Bend is skyrocketing.

During the first seven days this month, Nickerson said, production of 426,000 pounds of tails more than doubled the entire output for the month of June, which amounted to only 189,400 pounds of tails.

The shrimp were small, Nickerson said, running from 43/50 to 36/42, and the price was about 20c a pound lower than for the same time in 1958.

There has been a 12c to 14c drop since the last week in June.

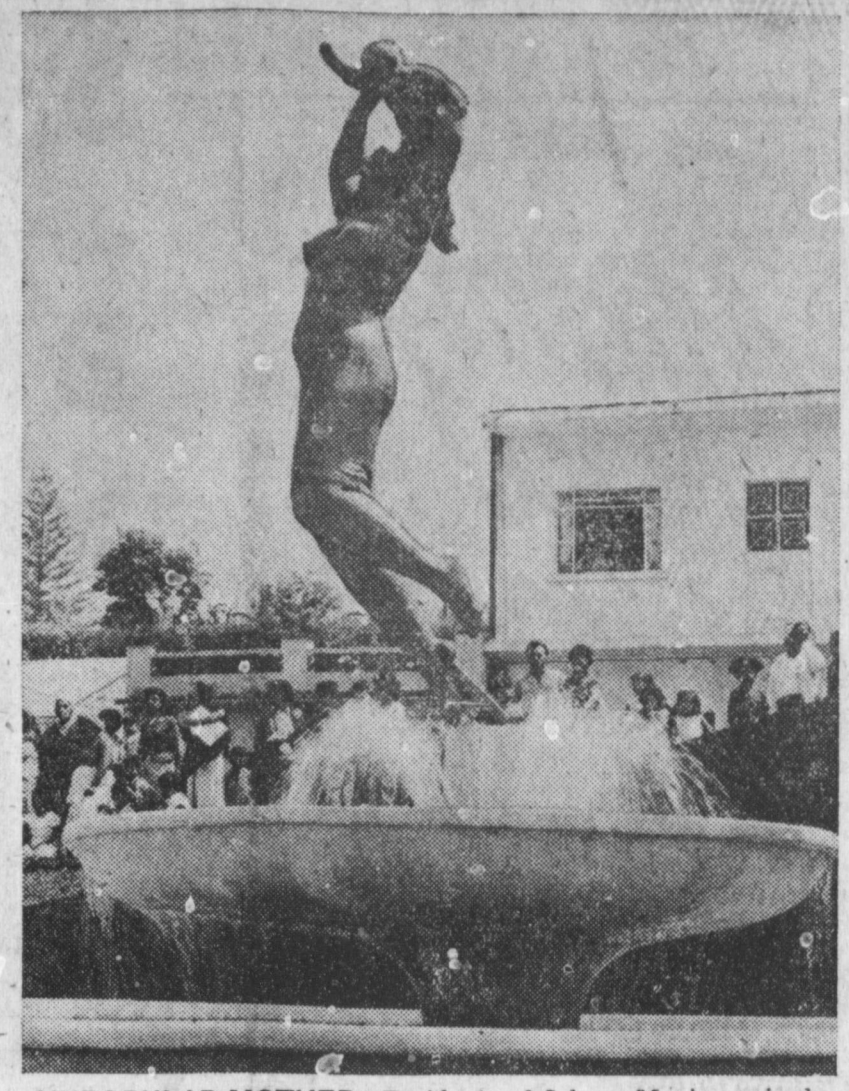
ROCKPORT INCLUDED IN AIR FORCE PROGRAM

Forty-Nine Boats Make Houston Power Squadron Rendezvous Here

Fulton harbor blossomed with boats, binoculars, nautical language and sun tans Tuesday afternoon, as the Houston Power Squadron arrived for the annual rendezvous, accompanied by other craft from Corpus Christi and San Antonio.

Out of 44 that left Houston for the holiday cruise on July 4th, all made it but one.

Considering the fact that they are of all shapes and sizes from the 15-foot "Dumbo" belonging to Eddie Le Melleur powered with an outboard on through gasoline and diesel-engined craft up to the 50-foot Mollye Kaye II the flotilla had very little trouble.

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Home Delivery Proposed for Mail

Chamber of Commerce Told That It is Practical Certainty With a Little Assistance From Residents

House to house mail delivery in Rockport is practically a certainty, Postmaster Jimmy Simmons told Chamber of Commerce directors Tuesday night, if an accurate survey of public preference can be made, and this survey was immediately promised. Directors will make it on a house to house basis, they told the postmaster.

The survey was necessary, Simmons said, to prevent pigeonholing of the project because a postcard

survey addressed to 1010 box holders had been unsatisfactory. Out of this number of inquiries, he stated, only 335 Rockport residents had been interested enough to answer.

Seventy-five percent of those answering wanted home mail delivery, the postmaster said, but postal inspectors who have been working on the project have stated that responses must be obtained from about four-fifths of all people receiving mail in the proposed delivery area.

Mrs. Mary Juergens, manager of the Chamber, told directors that she, the postmaster, CPL man Cecil Cole, City Secretary Jeanne Tuer and others had aided in the preliminary work of mapping the delivery routes. She urged that everything possible be done to push the project, which, she said, is a healthy sign of the city's growth.

The boundaries of the district will reach to King Street on the south, Aransas Bay on the east, Highway 35 on the west, and the present city limits on the north.

The first unit of Little Bay Shores, just north of the city, will not receive mail delivery unless it is annexed by Rockport, Postmaster Simmons said.

If mail delivery is begun, Simmons stated, it will require the services of two men. One, in the more thickly populated section in the center of town will walk nine miles a day delivering six days a week, except that there will be no delivery on holidays and Sundays.

The other, working from a right hand drive truck, will cover the outlying residential districts, where all mail boxes will have to be placed on the curb for easy access.

There will be one mail delivery a day, Simmons explained, as afternoon mail gets in too late to be put out the same day. However, any box holder who wishes to do so may retain his box. This does not mean, he said, that mail would be delivered to the house during the week and put in the box Sundays and holidays. It simply means that mail addressed to the house will be delivered to the house, and that mail addressed to the box will be placed in it.

Nor will firms issuing lots of bills be able to operate as they have done in the past.

"The days of dumping letters in the slot addressed to Joe Blow, City, will be over," Simmons stated. "If Joe Blow's full address isn't on the letter, it will be returned to the sender. And all letters will cost four cents instead of three."

Directors, after listening to Simmons, decided that they would make a walking campaign to contact everyone receiving mail of the area that will be served by the carriers, asking people to express themselves on the project.

As one of them said:

"If we miss this chance, we may not get another for a long time, and then we'd be very unhappy, because we do need mail delivery, and will need it more and more as our population continues to skyrocket."

Local Ski Club Formulates Rules For Safety Here

In a Wednesday night meeting at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Homer Faber, the Rockport Water Ski Club adopted a constitution and formulated plans for water safety.

In addition to compiling a list of safety tips for skiers, for distribution to them and to boating enthusiasts, the club laid plans for erection of a "Safe Procedure" sign at the new quadruple launching ramp which is part of the newly completed Little Bay project.

Good and safe procedures endorsed by the local club are as follows:

Stay away from fishermen, swimmers and people wading. Have an extra person in any boat towing a skier to watch the person on skis, or, if this is not possible, at least a rear view mirror.

Learn and use hand signals between skier and boat operator. Run parallel to shore and come in slowly when landing. Stop the motor when a skier is being assisted into the boat. Ski counterclockwise. Turn out of the pattern with the boat when the skier is lost. Never back up to a skier in the water—make a circle.

Glance at the rear view mirror as often as is possible when there are no imminent hazards ahead. Don't pull skiers when there is traffic. Don't pull a skier in less than five feet of water. Over eight feet is better. Many serious accidents to skiers come from falls in shallow water. Keep boat passengers off decks and gunwales. When a skier falls, find out at once if he is O. K. If he is, return at idling speed. Don't follow another skier too closely. Always have an extra life jacket or tube handy for the skier.

IT'S THE LAW

No Will? Who Inherits Property?
 What will happen if you should die without executing a legal and proper will? Who will inherit your property? Your husband, wife, mother, father, children, your wife's relatives? The best way you can say who will have it is to provide a will which will protect your rightful beneficiaries and dispose of your property in accordance with your wishes.

When a deceased has no will, or dies "intestate" as the law calls it, the property of that person is distributed according to a detailed formula fixed by law. In some cases this may be the way you yourself would divide it—but in many cases it is not.

The provisions of the law concerning the distribution of the property of a person who dies without a will are rather complicated, and all of the possibilities cannot be covered by a general statement.

There are different rules for real estate and for personal property, for community property and for separate property, for homestead property and for all of the many possible combinations of surviving relatives. Each situation must be carefully studied to determine the correct distribution of the property.

For example, here is a general idea of how the community property which you and your spouse have accumulated will be divided if you do not make a will prior to your death.

If your husband or wife survives and there are no children, the surviving spouse receives all of the property.

If, in addition, there are surviving children or descendants of deceased children, they would divide one-half of the property, while the surviving spouse would receive the other one-half.

Of course, grandchildren do not share in the estate unless their parent who would inherit is deceased. And when descendants of previously deceased children do inherit, they receive only the portion that the child would have received, regardless of the number of such descendants.

An odd note, perhaps, is that the surviving spouse already owns one-half of the community estate prior to your death, and the law adds nothing to this share where there are children surviving.

When there are only children and their descendants surviving, they divide the entire community estate between them.

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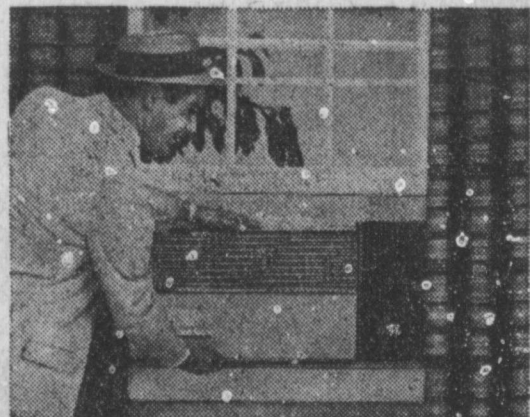

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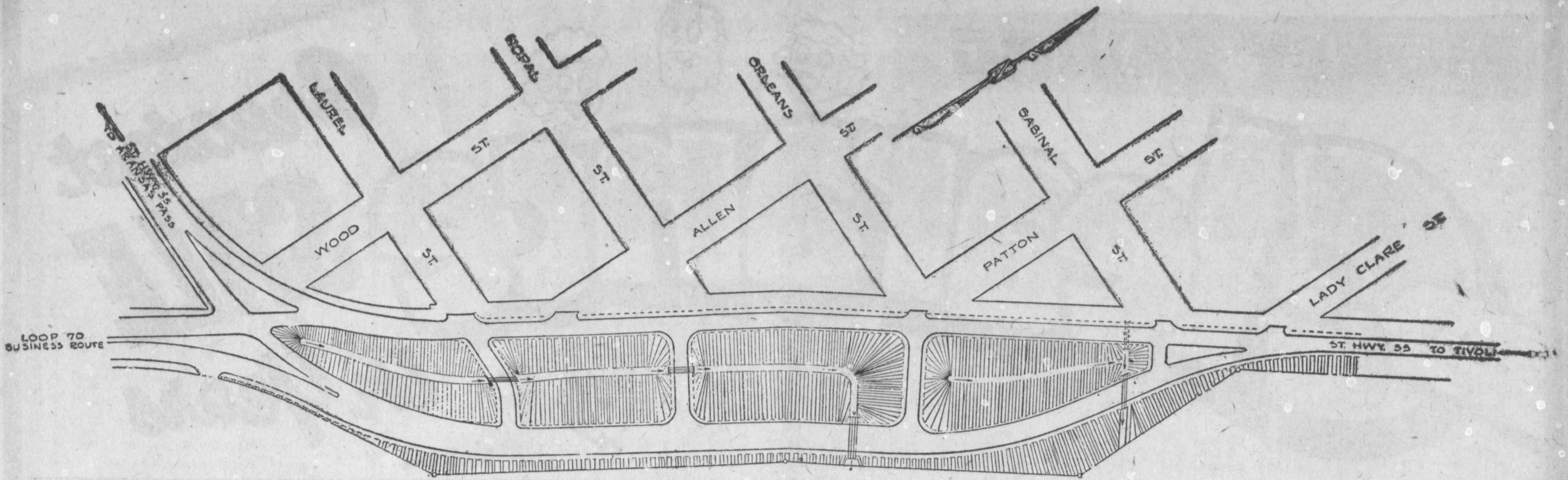

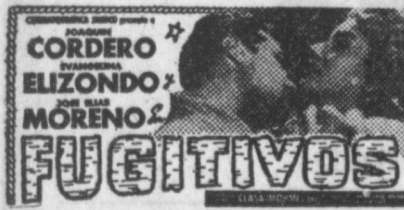

TEXAS CHAMPIONS OF FREEDOM

GENERAL JOHN BELL HOOD

Defender of States Rights and Self-Determination

In victory and defeat John Bell Hood, the Texas Brigade's "fighting general" of the Civil War, was a dedicated defender of man's right to choose his way of life. Like Robert E. Lee, Hood was a graduate of the U. S. Military Academy at West Point. And, like Lee, he resigned his commission in the U. S. Army to serve his state and the South through the bitter years from 1861 to the surrender at Appomattox Court House, April 9, 1865.

From the time he took command of the 4th Texas Infantry, that — with other Texas and Confederate regiments — came to be known as Hood's Texas Brigade, because of his daring leadership. Victories and promotions came quickly. As Major General Hood he was considered the hero of Chickasaw, where he lost his right leg. As Lieutenant General Hood, commanding the Army of Tennessee, he met crushing defeat at Nashville on

December 16, 1864, and was relieved of his command.

But Texas doesn't forget her champions of freedom. A monument in his memory stands within the state capitol grounds at Austin, and Camp Hood — established during World War II — now Fort Hood — was named in honor of the "fighting general," loyal defender of his state's rights to self-determination.

Today Texans still demand and get their right to choose the way they want to live. 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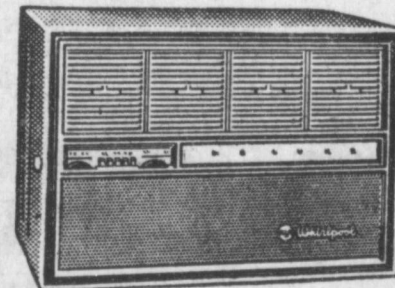

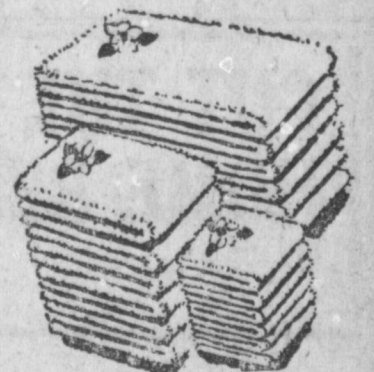

Mrs. Bonnigene Chatfield Gregory, mother of Mrs. Roy Hinton of Rockport, is the heroine of a true romance, recently uncovered by her sister, through the help of the Battleship Texas Commission.

Scrap metal was much needed at the beginning of World War II and the City of Corpus Christi patriotically offered its old bell—a thousand pounds of badly-needed metal—to help assuage the demand.

However, instead of being melted into scrap, the bell was accepted by the U.S.S. Houston as a gift, hung on the ship's deck, and inducted into the Navy when the cruiser was christened at Newport News June 19, 1943.

But probably no story of its adventures since it was founded by Meneeley and Kimberly in New York, in 1873, would prove more interesting than the sprightly little tale about its part in a 1910 romance.

The municipal bell tower stood on a small plaza at the foot of the bluff in the old days. Just across Schatzel Street, according to Corpus Christi historian Sister Xavier, was the office of Dr. G. W. Gregory, city physician, which faced the tower.

Dr. Gregory, a widower, had one curious habit. Each day, his sons noticed, he left his pills and prescriptions for a time, picked up a newspaper, and went to his front door where he pretended to read.

Boy-like, their curiosity was aroused, and the pair of them set their heads together to discover the attraction.

This turned out to be a milliner in a nearby department store. Tall, stylish and auburn-haired, she passed the doctor's office each noon during the week, shortly after the bell signalled city employees that it was time for lunch.

Not knowing her name, the two youths began to call the lady "Bell" and to tease their father.

"Hurry, Dad here comes Bell," Eventually they learned that the lady was from Montgomery, Alabama, Cradle of the Confederacy, and from that day on she was "Dixie Bell" to the boys.

Finally, the doctor surprised his sons. Calling them into his office, he said:

"Dixie Bell is now a Texas Belle. Boys, meet your new mother!"

Mrs. Hinton, in telling the story, said:

"Our family have laughed many times about this. My pappy wasn't as sly as he thought. The boys really gave him a time."

Mrs. Gregory just smiles about it.

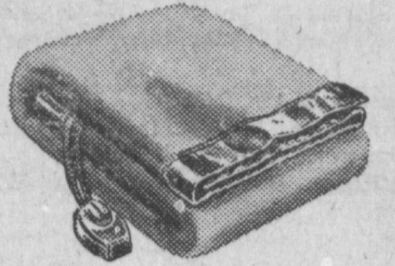

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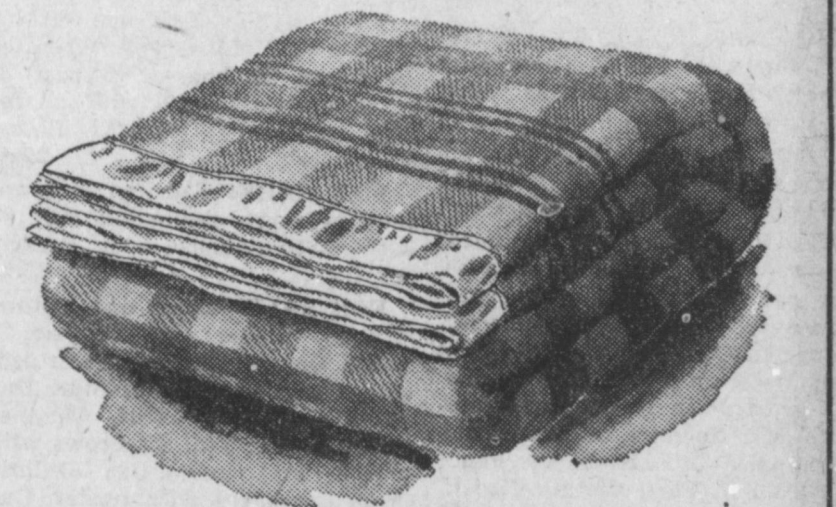
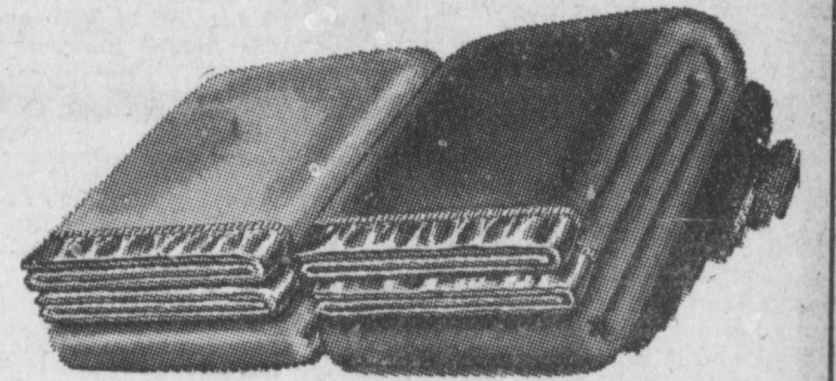
