Roe's to Have Grand Opening On July 17-18

When Roe's Food Store formally opens its doors again, next Friday and Saturday, after extensive remodeling and enlargements, everyone has a chance to win a door prize.

Thousands of dollars worth of groceries, plus 2500 individual prizes will be given away, according to Charles A. Roe, Sr., who said that among other things there will be 48 baskets of groceries.

This marks the third time since 1946 that the store has grown. Opening originally in the Steyer Building, owned by Mrs. Lois Rozzell, as a frozen food locker plant, it was changed and enlarged several years ago.

This third enlargement, in which the new Roe building and the older Steyer building were joined, has added approximately 2750 square feet of floor space, almost doubling the size of the sales area.

All shelving is new; the lighting has been completely changed, capacity of the serve-yourself frozen food, ice cream, milk, vegetable and meat cases has been doubled; and approximately a third more stock has been added to the shelves.

An innovation is the planning of the meat counters at the front of the store. This, according to Charles Roe, Jr., was done because most meals are planned around the meat course. As a result, he said, many housewives like to buy their meat first and other ingredients of the meal later.

The aisles have been widened; the layout of the store has been redesigned to make shopping easier; and the added floor space makes it possible to carry many items that lack of space formerly prohibited.

To take care of the increased space in the store, air conditioning capacity has been doubled also.

Of stucco construction, with aluminum and glass trim, the exterior of the building has been completely changed in appearance, by addition of a new entrance.

To the rear of the store a paved parking lot has been added, 7500 square feet in area.

As a matter of fact, about the only thing recognizable about the changed set-up is the same brand of cheerful service that Charlie and the rest of the folks in the store have been treating customers to for years.

Freeport Awarded Water Plant

FREEPORT— This industrial area, 60 miles south of Houston, was selected Tuesday as the site for the nation's first sea water conversion plant.

Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson recently said such a plant would open up tremendous possibilities of farming, ranching and industry in the Southwest.

Freeport was selected over 30 other sites in the nation for the first plant.

Announcement was made in San Francisco by Interior Secretary Fred A. Seaton in a speech to the American Water Works Assn.

"The Freeport site was selected because it offers several features not available at other locations," Seaton said.

"The conversion plant is to be located two miles from the coast adjacent to an existing Dow Chemical Co. plant," he continued.

"The sea water intake line serving the chemical plant will provide the conversion plant with feed water. Dow Chemical will sell us steam, thus eliminating the necessity of constructing a boiler.

"The city of Freeport and the chemical plant will purchase all the product water of the plant. Dow Chemical will also utilize the brine effluent and conduct research on the economic potential of brine utilization."

Mayor Jim Russell here said "we are very pleased because we have been working hard for it."

Russell said Freeport had offered to pay 20 cents per 1,000 gallons for half of the output of the plant and that Dow Chemical had offered to buy the other half at 30 cents per 1,000 gallons.

The executive committee named Richard R. Ryan, managing director of the former Nueces County Tuberculosis Association, as executive director of the Coastal Bend Tuberculosis Association. Mrs. William Palmer of Sinton was named field representative in San Patricio County, and Mrs. Robert Alcorn was named field representative in Kleberg and Kenedy Counties. Tuberculosis association offices will be maintained in Kingsville, Sinton and Corpus Christi.

The executive committee will consider a budget and program for the year at its next meeting, to be Monday, July 23, in Robstown. Mrs. Myra Allen of Rockport was named county Seal Seal chairman for Aransas County.

LIBRARY PROGRESS IS REVIEWED FOR THE WOMAN'S CLUB

At the regular meeting of the Woman's Club of Aransas County Tuesday afternoon Jack Baughman spoke on the progress made by the county library.

"If there was ever a do-it-yourself institution," he said, "this was it," recalling the first book drive and the first library, an old store building which Arthur Bracht allowed the club to use.

"The City Council of that day was no help," he continued, "and at first the Commissioners' Court was cool to the library, also. But since then, Judge Wendell and the commissioners have been of great aid and have done everything possible to support the organization."

Money for catalog cards and similar materials came from the Woman's Club, as well as the labor necessary to prepare the books for circulation, and the first librarians were members of the club who gave freely of their time to help.

"There was no money for books," he continued, "and after that first drive, whatever accessions there were came from individual gifts. Emory Spencer gave the fine history of Refugio County; the Brachts gave memorial books; a friends of Mrs. Glass sent juveniles and has continued to do so from time to time. And there were others, that have become so numerous over the years that it would be hard to list them all."

"Arthur Bracht gave the old Bracht store rent free until the time that the Commissioners' Court allowed the organization to use a room in the courthouse. This was the library's second significant step forward."

"Mrs. West, Mrs. Joe Slocum and others painted the shelves for that first library room in the courthouse, and they are still in use," Baughman said. "Everett West and Joe Slocum had their services volunteered by their wives, and they built them, with the help of other husbands. The money came from the Woman's Club."

In a report prepared this week for the Commissioners' Court, Mrs. Everett West, secretary of the library board, outlined some of the more recent achievements.

On January 1 there was a balance in the library account, handled by Mrs. Ettoille Eller, the county treasurer, of \$252.77. The Commissioners' Court allocated \$1000 to the project; \$300 came from the United Fund since the first of the year; gifts amounted to \$12.71, and fines to \$30.36.

Out of this money, 165 books were purchased at a cost of \$408, and salaries used another \$300. One of the library's proudest possessions, a new set of the Encyclopedia Britannica, cost \$204. Magazines cost \$6.75; supplies cost \$13.90; and social security \$13.90.

This is the fourth week of summer school, and the next two-week session will be devoted to landscape painting, according to director Simon G. Michael.

Mrs. West said, that an average of 100 more books are being checked out each month in 1959, and that circulation continues to crawl upward.

In January, 194 fiction books were circulated along with 174 non-fiction and 194 juveniles. Figures for the other five months, in the same order, were: February, 233, 182, 210; March, 256, 168, 226; April, 242, 142, 401; May, 179, 105, 619; and June, 218, 101, and 595. Total circulation for the six-month period was 4439, compared with 3696 in 1958.

The library is open on Monday, Wednesday and Friday afternoons, from 1 p.m. to 4:30. Mrs. West's report said.

There are 924 borrowers on record, and there are 5195 books on the shelves. Three hundred and twenty-eight of these have been added since January 1. One hundred and sixty-five were purchased at an average cost of \$2.50 per book, and 163 used books were donated by patrons of the library.

In April, Mrs. C. C. Atchley, the librarian, attended several sessions of the Texas Librarians' Convention, dealing with small libraries.

In June, Mrs. West attended a workshop for Coastal Bend librarians.

In closing, he paid tribute to the Woman's Club for its continued support of the project; to all those people who have donated books, time, and money; to the United Fund, from which substantial contributions have been received; to the County Judge and Commissioners' Court; and to all those individuals who have aided the project.

"This has more nearly been a community project than practically any other you can name," he said. "So many people have helped, and so many are interested in it, that any attempt to single out persons or organizations would be fruitless."

City Council Orders Tax Collections

Authorizes City Attorney Dick Hatch to File Suits on Delinquents; Discuss But Fail to Act on Re-Evaluation Contract

With city finances at a low ebb because of unanticipated demands for funds attendant on construction of Loop 70—the Highway 35 business route through Rockport—the City Council, at its regular meeting, authorized City Attorney Dick Hatch to file suits for collection of some \$6,000 in delinquent taxes.

According to the financial report made by City Secretary Mrs. Jeanne Tuer, general fund collections in June were only \$228, an amount far overbalanced by \$1661 in disbursements. This leaves a balance of only \$3135 in this particular ac-

County to Issue Time Warrants to Buy Right-of-Way

The Aransas County Commissioners' Court in order to purchase right-of-way for widening Highway 35 from the Refugio County line to the north end of the Copano Causeway has declared its intention of issuing time warrants.

The warrants to be used to finance the acquisition of the land, will not exceed \$21,000, and will bear interest at 2% per annum. They will mature serially with the maximum date July 1, 1961.

The land to be purchased is comprised of a strip of property 40 wide and 11.748 miles long.

count on which to operate the city between now and September 30, when the fiscal year ends.

Other departments are in somewhat better shape. The street maintenance balance is \$2045, with June collections amounting to \$20 and disbursements \$177. Schoolhouse refunding bond account shows a balance of \$2774, with collections of \$4.99 and no outgo, and the street improvement bond sinking fund has \$4361 in it, with a \$38 June income and no disbursements.

The waterworks and sewer revenue account is in the best shape of all, with a June 30 balance of \$16,066.80 and \$7644.77 on deposit by users of city meters. Total collections in June were \$7553.52, and expenses amounted to \$6118.94. The water and sewer revenue sinking fund shows a balance of \$3508.75, and \$15,000 on deposit.

In other business, councilmen once more took under consideration signing of a contract with Thomas Y. Pickett and Company, for re-evaluation of city property for the tax rolls, a project instituted by County Judge John D. Wendell and the Aransas County Commissioners' Court and concurred in by the trustees of the Aransas County Independent School District.

These two governmental agencies have employed Pickett and Company to do a complete survey of all property in the county for the coming fiscal year, and offered to let the city participate in the survey for a nominal amount.

Despite bargain rates of \$2700 and two years to pay for re-evaluation of the municipality's assessed property values, and a strong plea for city participation in the survey by Councilman Jack Horton and Mayor Hollis Collum for a resolution on the contract, Councilman Jimmy Hunt and V. A. Dully, Jr., voiced objections, and City Attorney Dick Hatch asked for time to study the contract.

Destruction of city and water lines by equipment of the contractor now operating on Loop 70 was discussed, and the council arrived at the conclusion that the city should be re-imposed for this, even if it took a civil suit for damages to collect.

Upon recommendation of Water Superintendent Tom Shults, the Council authorized him to advertise for bids on a flexible bucket machine to be used in cleaning sewers, and approved the city secretary's request for extra typing help during the two weeks it would take to prepare the tax rolls for next year.

A request by Fire Chief Dick Fox was approved, for financial aid in sending three firemen to the fire school at A&M this month, and expenditures totaling approximately \$335 were approved for this purpose to cover expenses and registration fees.

Councilman Jack Horton relayed a request from James Cleaver, in the Stivers addition, for some aid in exterminating snakes in his area. Councilman Horton said that Cleaver had reported to him that a number of water moccasins and rattlers had invaded the Cleaver backyard, and that eight or ten had been killed there. Cleaver asked that property owners with vacant lots, from which the snakes presumably came, should be forced to clean weeds and brush from their land.

The council also discussed the possibility of allowing Assistant Fire Marshal Elva Mullinaux to use the two-day radio now on one of the city pick-ups.

Lucas started cattle ranching in this area about 1888, and acquired enormous holdings of farms and ranches in Goliad, Refugio and Aransas Counties.

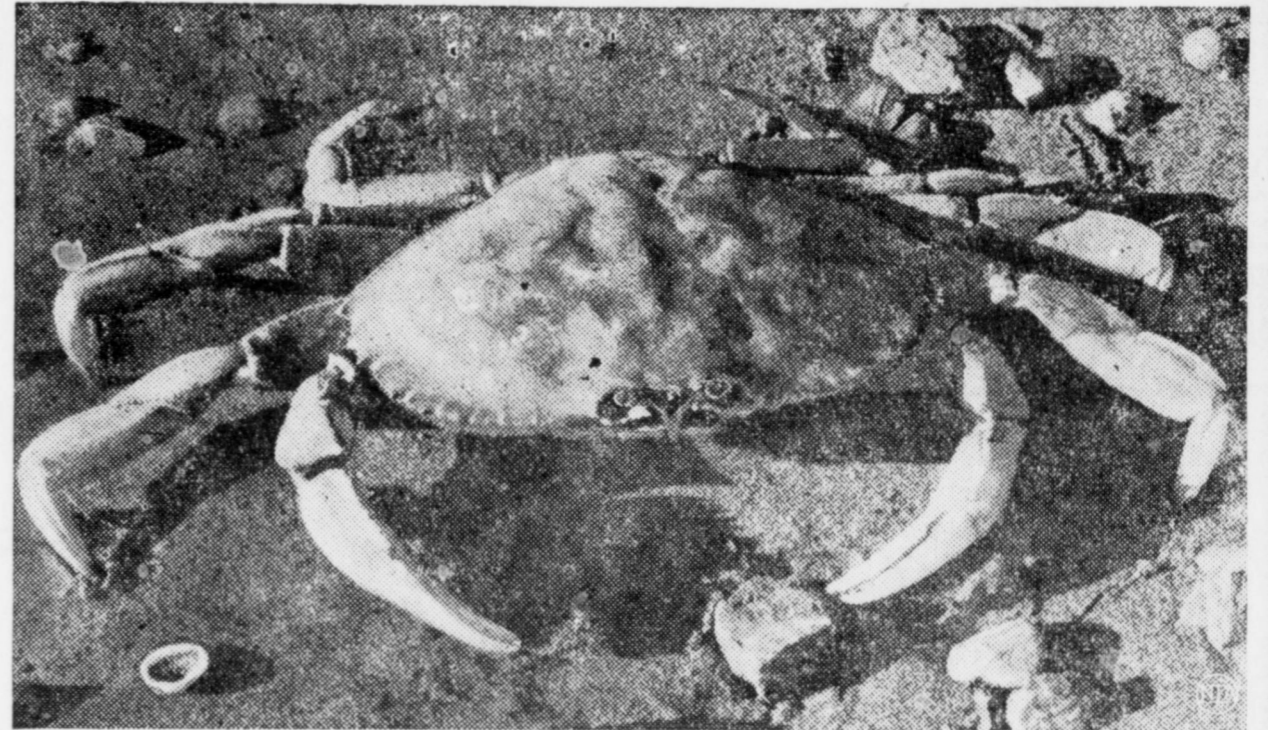
