

Do you know how to keep cool in the summer, why not use the following suggestions:

Vary the work schedule during the summer. Since more energy is used while working in the heat of the day, plan some housework for early morning hours or at night. Keep housework to a minimum.

If part of your home is air-conditioned, plan to use that room for as much of your work
