School of Fine Arts Show Here November 20-22

James Buchanan Winn, Jr., nationally famous muralist and architectural sculptor, will be the judge of over 300 paintings, pastels and watercolors expected at the fall show of the Rockport School of Fine Arts, to be held here Nov. 20-22, on the grounds if weather permits, or else, if the weather is inclement, in the gymnasium at Rockport Elementary.

Winn, whose home is at Winn Ranch, Wimberly, Texas, has completed outstanding assignments in Africa, Europe and America, and many examples of his art are found in banks and other buildings throughout Texas.

The show, which is confined to students in the 1958 and 1959 summer sessions of the art school, which is directed by Simon G. Michael, will draw together artists from as far north as Dallas and Houston, from as far west as California, and from as far east and south as Beaumont and Brownsville.

Among the more outstanding canvases to be exhibited will be those of Mrs. N. F. Jackson, Rockport; Dalhart Windberg of Victoria; Nancy Everett of Beeville; and Ruth Ashberry, formerly of Victoria, and now of Waco.

Michael, the school's director, has exhibited extensively both in this country and Europe, before coming to Rockport 10 years ago to start his school, and possesses the rare ability to teach what he knows to others, with the result that a number of his students are now teachers themselves, and that others have won prizes as far away as Salt Lake City, Utah, for canvases painted under his direction.

His success in this respect is attested by the increasing number of his students who take part in shows throughout the state, or have set up studios of their own. Entries have been pouring in from Abilene, Beeville, Bay City, Rockport, LaGrange, Freeport, Kingsville, Lake Jackson, Clute, Brazoria, Alvin, Cuero, Goliad, Kenedy, Woodsboro, Schulenburg, Corpus Christi, Galveston, San Antonio, Port Lavaca, Houston, Ganado, Refugio, Rock Springs, Sinton, Leakey, Aransas Pass, and from Los Altos, Calif., and between 300 and 400 canvases are expected, judging by the numbers entered for past shows.

There will be five classes—marine, still life, landscape, free composition and portrait—with a \$40 first, \$25 second, and \$15 third prize, as well as two honorable mentions awarded in each category. In addition, the top \$100 prize of the show will go to the most popular painting, chosen by votes of visitors to the exhibition.

Art Show Prizes Total \$500

When James Buchanan Winn, Jr., nationally famous muralist and architectural sculptor arrives in Rockport Friday morning to start judging the 300 or more paintings that will be on exhibit at the outdoor show of the Rockport School of Fine Arts, Friday through Sunday, Nov. 20-22, there will be \$500 in prizes and ten honorable mentions to be awarded painters with canvases in the show.

First prize in each of five divisions will be \$40; second prize, \$25; and \$15 for third, with honorable mention for the fourth and fifth place.

The prizes have been donated by a number of people and business firms throughout the area covered by classes taught by the school's director, Simon G. Michael.

Totah's Motel and Fine Foods of Victoria is the sponsor of the figure portrait class; Modern Abstract and Title Company, of Rockport, donated the prizes for the landscape winners; Central Power and Light Company of Rockport is sponsoring the still life contest; Security Subdivisions, another Rockport firm, the Marine section; and Michael himself has given the prizes for the fifth class, that in free composition.

Top prize of the show, for the painting chosen by votes of people attending the show is \$100, sponsored by Rockport's Silver Derrick Restaurant.

Exhibitors are limited to those completed by students of Michael during the past 24 months in the various towns in which he teaches and to the six summer sessions which he has taught here in the past two years.

Tuberculosis Directors Meet

The executive committee of the Coastal Bend Tuberculosis Association met Monday evening at the Commissioners court room at the Aransas County courthouse in Rockport. Dr. McIver Furman, president of the CBTA, presided at the meeting. Along with routine business conducted at this meeting the executive board unanimously approved a motion to encourage the Butt Foundation to conduct a study of contacts of known tubercular patients of Aransas County. This study would include a history of contagious contacts and a testing program of relatives, friends and neighbors.

Mrs. Edward Eitel of Corpus Christi reported that approximately 52,000 envelopes containing Christmas Seals had already been mailed to residents of the 5 county area. Mrs. Roy Hinton, chairman of the Aransas County Seal Sale, reported on the work of her committee. Other officers and members of the executive committee present included Judge John D. Wendell, Mrs. Audrey Jones, Dr. H. F. Elliot of Rockport; Dr. C. A. Shelby, Sinton; Dr. Philip Hudgins, Odem; Mrs. Bernice Hollan, Sinton; W. H. Zavits, Portland; Mrs. Felix Irwin, Corpus Christi.

A survey of the tuberculosis problem of the five county area discloses that there are 221 patients in TB hospitals, 24 patients being treated at home, and 687 patients, back from the hospitals as arrested cases, under drug treatment at home. Of this total number there are now 18 patients from Aransas County in TB hospitals.

Aransas, Kenedy, Kleberg, San Patricio and Nueces counties have joined to pool their experience and resources to fight TB on an area basis. The CBTA is conducting a fact-finding program to determine the extent of the TB problem in the five county area. The work includes Patch-testing programs in schools, X-rays for indigent patients, and establishment of case registers with information on the patient, his family, work history, economic status, education, training in the hospital, and other data to help the committee, in its work. An essential phase of the program is cooperating in the rehabilitation of the TB patient. A rehabilitation committee has been formed to work with other agencies in helping the patient to receive counseling guidance, economic aid, training, employment, or to fill whatever other needs the patient may have.

All of this work is financed by the annual Christmas Seal Sale which is now being conducted during the coming holiday season.

Champs Head for Kenedy Friday

Aransas County High School Pirates Win District Championship After 18 Years, and Head For Bi-District Game

It has been a long dry spell but the Aransas County High School Pirates, who, for the first time in eighteen years, are undisputed district football champions, are headed for Kenedy Friday night to tangle with the Lions, Champions of District 29 A, in the bi-district playoffs, with game time scheduled for 8 p. m.

Superintendents, principals and coaches of both schools decided that they would rather play the game on one of the home fields rather than a neutral gridiron, and Kenedy won the toss and the honor.

Tickets will be on sale in Rockport at Johnson's and Roaten's drug stores, at the high school office, and in Fulton at the Fulton Lumber Company up until noon tomorrow, Friday, Nov. 20. Adult tickets will be \$1.50 each, and will be in the reserved sections of the stand at Kenedy, if bought before noon, Friday, November 20. If tickets are purchased at Kenedy the night of the game, there is no assurance of good seats, and the price will be the same.

STUDENT TICKETS ARE FIFTY CENTS EACH, IF BOUGHT BEFORE NOON, FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 20, BUT AFTER THAT TIME THEY ARE \$1.50 EACH. Consequently those people having children that they wish to take to the game should be sure to purchase tickets for them here before the deadline, for after that the tickets will cost three times as much.

Band members and pep squad members in uniform will be admitted free.

All tickets, either adult or student, purchased at the gate in Kenedy will be \$1.50 each, with no assurance of good seats, so everyone possible should buy here as soon as the tickets go on sale.

Officials will be furnished by the Corpus Christi and Beeville chapters of the Southwestern Football Officials' Association. From the Corpus Christi group will come the referee and the umpire; the Beeville chapter will furnish the field judge, head linesman and statistician.

Time will be kept by one of the officials on the field, and his decision is final.

The proceeds of the game will be split 50-50 between the two schools, after costs of the officials and of printing the tickets have been deducted from the gate receipts.

School in Rockport and Fulton will be closed at 2 p. m. on the Friday of the big game, in plenty of time for people to drive to Kenedy.

The distance from Rockport to Kenedy is 100 miles, give or take a mile or so, depending on which route you take.

The simplest, for those not familiar with the country, is to go

west out Market Street and FM881, directly into Sinton, and from there to follow the San Antonio road through Beeville and Pettus to Kenedy.

Another route leads through Bayside and Woodsboro. At Woodsboro, cross the railroad track and the highway by the barbecue stand, and take the paved road that leads west. This leads into the Refugio-Beeville road, and from there the route is the same.

This route is probably a little shorter than the first. A third route, about as long as the second is from Bayside through Woodsboro, Refugio and Goliad. From Goliad there is a direct shot into Kenedy over State 239.

The best route is probably through Sinton. There will be less traffic over the other two routes. The probable starting line-ups for Friday's game with the Lions are as follows:

Coloma Oil & Gas Corp. No. 1 Heard Unit, Aransas County Fulton Beach Field well in Lamar Townsite Block 93, has been recompleted for a daily flow of 114 barrels of 41 gravity oil plus five per cent water.

Flow was through 11-64th-inch choke from 28-shot perforations at 7,114-18 feet and 7,123-28 feet on the lower tubing. The project has 5 1/2-inch casing on bottom at 7,158 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 1,500-1 and flowing tubing pressure 450 pounds. The well was originally completed in the B-3 oil sand but was abandoned and plugged in 1954.

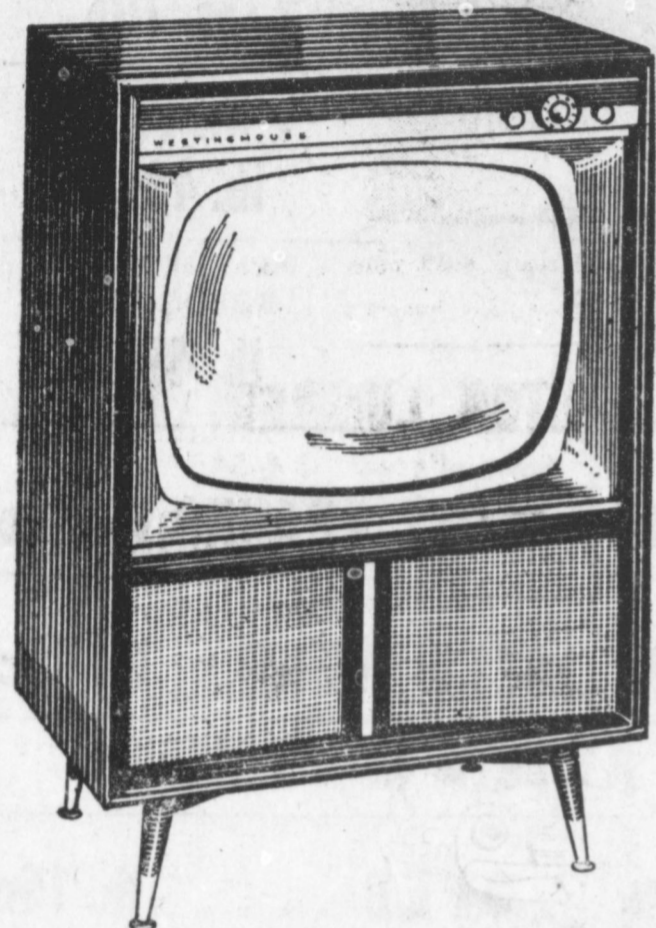

HISTORY

Rockport, Fulton, St. Mary's, Lamar and El Copano

Archibald McNeill originally settled in Montgomery County, Texas, which he represented in the Annexation Convention. He also represented that county in the First and Second Legislatures, and was its sheriff for one term. He went to California in the "Gold Rush," after seeing service with Captain Hay's Rangers in the Mexican War.

One of the proudest boasts of old St. Mary's was its Black Point Lodge No. 250, A.F.&A.M., founded May 16, 1860.

CHAPTER XII The Civil War

To the eternal credit of the

Mexican Republic, it opposed human slavery and prohibited the bringing of African slave into Texas by the colonists. However, the Americans evaded the law by passing their slaves as indentured servants, and thus the curse of slavery got root in Texas. The Constitution of the Republic of Texas recognized slavery as a legal institution and safe-guarded it to such an extent that congress was denied the power to emancipate slaves in the Republic, and no slaveholder could free his slaves without an act of congress, and no freed slave was permitted to reside permanently within the Republic. The constitution of 1845 contained like provisions.

There is no record, or any evidence for that matter, that the Irish Colonists of either Power or the McMullen colonists had or held slaves under any guise; and while there is no record of any slaves in Refugio County during the Republic, there is a possibility that there might have been a few, but, if so, as very few. It is quite likely that there were a few slaves in the county during the first two or three years of statehood. With few exceptions, these slaves were owned by the new comers and not by the original colonist families. The bulk of the slaves were brought in by the families who settled in this county during the middle and late 50's. It was then that some of the old families began to acquire slaves, principally for use as household and personal servants.

The first slave-deed of record in our deed records is dated March 24, 1851, it being from John Clark to his brother-in-law, Major John H. Wood. As the reader may be curious as to such matters, this deed is copied in full as follows: "KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS: That I, John Clark of the State of Texas and County of San Patricio, for and in consideration of the sum of Twelve Hundred Dollars in lawful money to me in hand paid by John H. Wood, of the County of Refugio, in the State aforesaid, the receipt whereof I hereby acknowledge, have this day bargained, sold and delivered, and do by these present bargain, sell and deliver unto the said John H. Woods: three negro slaves, viz "Jesse, negro man aged about Forty-one years, his wife Matilda, about Twenty-seven years of age, and their child Jim about Two years of age. TO HAVE AND TO HOLD said negro slaves, to him the said John H. Wood, his heirs and assigns, to his or their proper use and benefit, forever. And I, the said John Clark, for myself, my heirs, executors and administrators do hereby warrant and forever defend the title of the above named Negro slaves to the said John H. Wood, his heirs and assigns forever. IN WITNESS

WHEREOF I have hereunto set my hand and scroll for seal, this Twenty-fourth Day of March, One thousand eight hundred and fifty one.

JOHN CLARK (LS)"

This is a good example of the standard form of slave-deed used in Texas. However, it does not contain the usual clause, "warranted sound both in body and mind and a slave for life."

In 1852, we find a slave deed from Pierre Blanchette and wife, of Liberty County, Texas, to Susan Dugat, of the negress Charlotte, then eight years old.

Thereafter, appear no slave deeds until 1855, the period of influx of the new settlers. Thereafter, a number of these indentures appear of record.

The Ordinance of Secession was adopted February 2, 1861. To her everlasting glory, Texas was the only one of the seceding states which gave its citizens the right or opportunity to vote directly upon the question as to whether or not the State should secede. The convention ordered an election to be held throughout the State on February 23, 1861, to decide the issue. The issue was heatedly debated from the hustings. The vote over the state was 39,415 for secession and 13,841 against.

In Refugio county there was a respectable number of ranking citizens who opposed secession and remained Unionists in principal during the war. These included Thomas O'Connor, Thomas Welder, Captain James W. Byrne, Captain James B. Wells, George S. Sherman, Lucas Dubois, Sr., and Edward P. Upton. Colonel L. B.

Camp, who had signed an address to the people opposing secession, moved to St. Mary's at the beginning of the war. None of these Unionists, with the possible exception of Upton, did anything to retard the confederate war effort. Dennis and Thomas M. O'Connor, sons of old Tom, saw four years active service in the confederate army.

The list of leading secessionists of Refugio County is quite long. The most active included Joseph F. Smith and Youngs Coleman, who remained, "unreconstructed rebels" to the end of their lives, Alfred M. Hobby, Edwin Hobby, Judge Lieuen M. Rogers, Captain Henry Scott, Captain Daniel C. Doughty, James M. Doughty, Dr. Pulaski A. Thurmond, Colonel William McGrew, Dr. William P. McGrew, Judge Thomas Marshall Duke, Judge Samuel M. Robinson, Colonel Allen J. Heard, and Colonel Thomas C. Heard.

The county officers in 1864 and to the end of the war were: Dr. William P. McGrew, chief justice; William W. Holbrook, George R. Little, and Thomas Keydendall, justices. Holbrook joined the confederate army, and Major John H. Wood took his place on the court. Patrick Shelly, county clerk; General Jackson Brown, sheriff; F. M. Swift, assessor-collector; Samuel M. Robinson, treasurer, until 1865, when he was succeeded by C. P. Miles. A. L. Doughty, district

clerk; Henry M. Barlow, surveyor; T. C. Heard, coroner; Michael O'Boyle, Jacob Thomas and P. H. Moran, constables.

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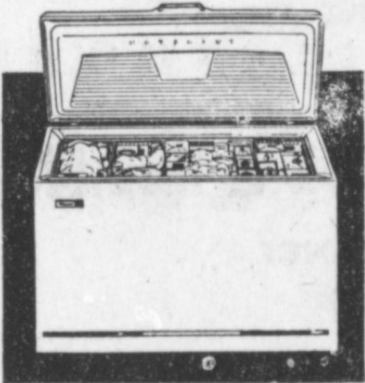

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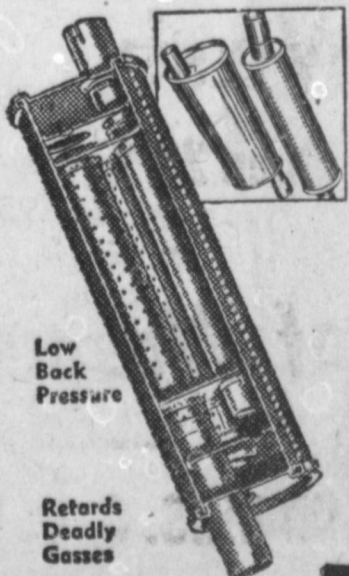

Pirates Beat Mathis, Win Championship

For the first time in eighteen years, the Aransas County High School Pirates are undisputed champions, after beating Mathis Friday night and throwing Coach Borchert into the shower in the field house with all his clothes on.

This week is being spent on sharpening plays for the game with the Kenedy Lions at Kenedy, Friday, Nov. 20, at 8 p.m.

Warden kicked off to Hollis London and, on the first play from scrimmage, Holland took the ball again and went around his own right end for six yards. Coffin made one before he was smeared by Warden and Barnard; Coffin's pass to Brown was incomplete, and then London punted to the ACHS 48, where Happner took it.

On the first play, Warden made three through center, then pitched a jump pass to Rouquette for 12 yards and a first down. On the next series of downs, Barnard went through center for four, Warden failed to gain and then Happner rambled 30 yards for pay dirt and the score was 6-0 in favor of the ACHS team.

Warden kicked off to London on the Mathis 15 and he ran the

ball back to the Mathis 35. Bill Adams made 1; Coffin's pass was incomplete; and then Coffin to Diaz netted 10 yards. Coffin went around right end for a couple; Adams made two before he was snowed under by Billy Boy Johnson and Weatherly; and then Coffin to Diaz netted nine and a second first down in the series.

From the ACHS 41, Hollis London carried for ten before Johnson and Gardner smeared him; then, from the ACHS 31 London carried twice for a yard each time, and a pass from Coffin to Villareal netted 8 and put the Mathis team on the ACHS 20. Then London made another ten yards, making it first and goal to go on the ACHS 10. Coffin was smeared for a three yard loss by Weatherly; two of Coffin's passes went incomplete; a five yard penalty was assessed against Mathis for delay of the game, and it was fourth and seventeen to go. Coffin's pass, intended for Villareal was intercepted by Tommy McCabe and ACHS took over on its own fourteen.

Pena made 1; Warden to Happner got tangled up with the head linesman, who couldn't get out of the way, and was spilled along with the ball carrier, who lost two yards. Pena made eight; then Snyder punted out on the fifty.

Mathis took over and Dias made two on a reverse; London was thrown for a loss of a yard; Coffin went to the weak side for two; then London punted to the ACHS

4, just as the quarter ended.

From the ACHS four, as the second quarter started, Happner made four yards; Pena failed to gain; Warden went around right end for three, and then Snyder kicked to the ACHS 40, where Mathis fumbled and Gene Gregory recovered for ACHS on the ACHS 38. 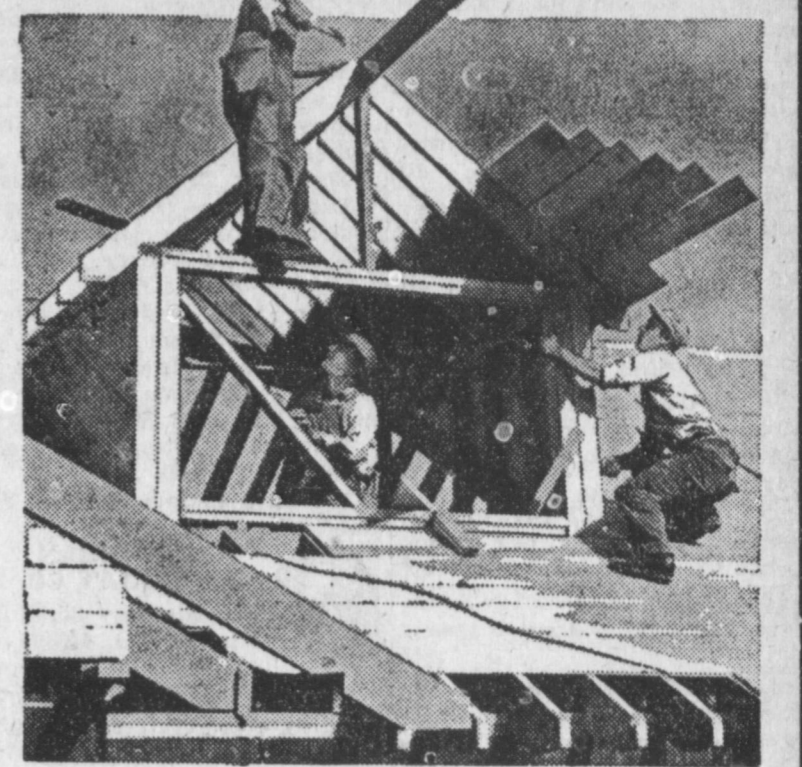

FARMERS MAY NOW QUALIFY FOR DISABILITY INSURANCE

The last quarter of 1959 is significant for area farmers, H. M. Cleveland, district manager of the Corpus Christi social security office reports. Most farmers have now attained disability insurance protection for themselves based on their farm self-employment coverage.

He explained that eligibility rules for disability insurance benefits under social security include a provision that a person must have 5 years of social security coverage out of the last 10 to qualify. Since 1959 is the fifth year that farmers have been covered under social security, those farmers who have reported self-employment income each year from 1955, now have protection.

Farmers who became totally and permanently disabled, are over age 50 and have the 5 years of social security coverage, are thus eligible for disability insurance as are other workers. To meet the disability requirement, a person must be so severely disabled that he is unable to do any gainful work.

Any farmer who meets the work requirements and becomes disabled should get in touch with the social security office, Cleveland states. Those who are between 50 and 65 may qualify for cash benefits. DISABLED FARMERS NOW PROTECTED UNDER DISABILITY PROVISIONS

Now, for the first time, farmers have the protection of the disability provisions of the social security law, said H. M. Cleveland, manager of the Social Security Office in Corpus Christi.

To be eligible under the disability provisions, one must have been covered by social security for at least five years out of the last ten years before becoming disabled. Farmers first came under the law in 1955. Those who have reported at least \$400 net earnings for social security credit from 1955 to date have now met this work requirement.

Farmers who want information about the disability benefits, as well as the retirement and family insurance, should get in touch with the social security office, Cleveland says.
