

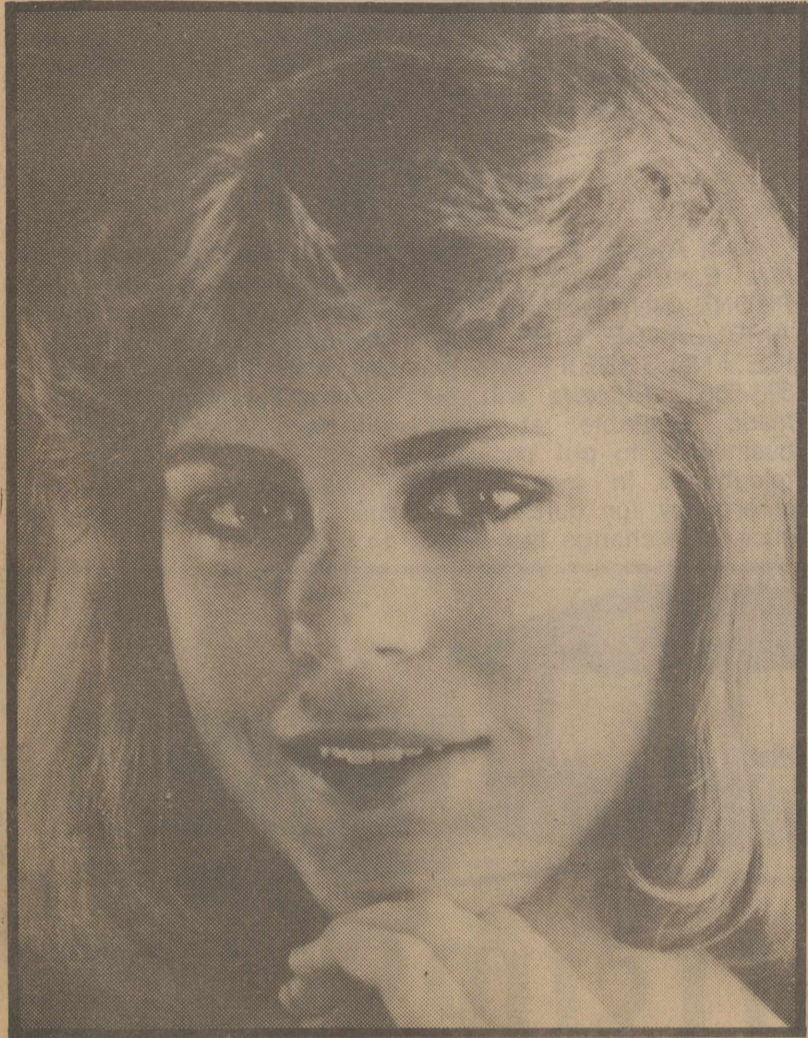

Annual Schoolboard Field Day Meeting

The Annual Field Day at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Research Field at Etter, Texas, will be August 20, starting at noon with a dutch treat barbecue lunch. The field day was announced by Dr. G.B. Thompson, Director of Research at the Texas A&M Center in Amarillo.

After the lunch, there will be a discussion on the Russian aphid by Dr. Jerry Michaels, TAES Entomologist. Dr. Steve Winter, TAES Agronomist from the USDA Research Laboratory at Bushland, will tell visitors about his work on the effect of grazing termination date on yield of wheat.

Later in the day, a field tour will enable visitors to see research plots according to Cecil Regier, manager of the Research Field. Corn and sorghum hybrid trials will be observed. In addition, research with surge irrigation will be discussed by Tom Marek, TAES Agricultural Engineer and Leon New, TAEX Agricultural Engineer. Insect control experiments in sorghum and corn will be explained by Dr. Jerry Michaels, and the effect of short irrigation sets on water use efficiency under conventional and no-till cropping systems will be discussed by Dr. Allen Wiese, TAES Weed Scientist.

The event is sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, North Plains Water District and North Plains Research Field Committee. A handout describing the research will be available for visitors.

The Stratford Independent Schoolboard met in regular session August 7, 1986 at 8:00 p.m. At this meeting Barry Briscoe met with the Board to discuss leasing the school owned land. This was tabled for further study.

The Board set cafeteria meals for students at the same price as last year. Junior High and Elementary Grades lunch \$1.15, and \$1.25 in High School and \$2.25 for adults. Breakfast price is \$1.00 for all grades.

The Board studied the current 1985-86 budget and amended it in the necessary areas. The total budget for the year was \$2,467,053.00, (expenditures) while receipts for the current budget were \$2,604,126.00.

In other business the Board approved a sprinkler system to be installed by school employees.

The Board studied the proposed budget for the coming year at length. After this study the Board approved the school budget for the 1986-87 school year in the amount of \$2,509,631.00. The total budget for the coming fiscal year will be a little over 1% increase over the past fiscal year. The Board set the tax rate for the coming school year at .65 cents per 100 dollar evaluation. Last years rate was .615. The total taxes to be collected for the coming year will be down by 3% due to the loss in taxable value.

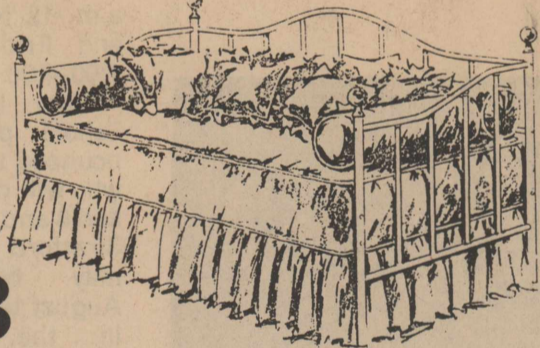

Kerrick is located on the Texas-Oklahoma border on Highway 287 between Stratford, Texas, and Boise City, Ok.

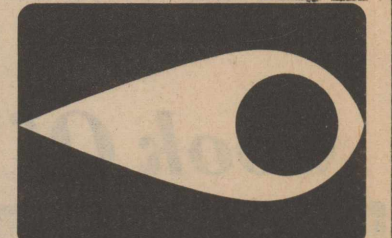
Girls Night Out

Sweet and Sour Meatloaf

1 1/2 lbs Ground beef
1/2 cup onions
1 tsp salt
1-5oz can tomatoe sauce
1 cup bread crumbs
1/4 tsp pepper

Mix and shape into meatloaf pan. Cook at 350 degrees for 35 to 40 minutes.

Pour sauce over meat the last 10 minutes of cooking.

Sweet and Sour Sauce

1-5oz can tomatoe sauce
1 tsp mustard
1 tsp vinegar
1 tsp Brown Sugar
1/2 cup white sugar

Mix well and pour over meat. This is also a good sauce to make sweet and sour chicken or pork. [Very good served over rice.]

Pecan Topped Chocolate Pound Cake

1 cup butter
2 1/2 cup sugar
3 cups all purpose flour
1 cup milk
1/2 cup shortening
5 eggs
1/2 cup cocoa
1 cup chopped nuts

Combine butter and shortening. Mix well. Gradually add sugar beating until light and fluffy. Add eggs one at a time. Combine flour and cocoa add to creamed mixture. Alternating with milk. Start to finish with flour mixture.

Pour in well greased 10 inch tube pan. Sprinkle pecans over batter. Bake at 325 degrees for 1 hour and 20 minutes or until it tests done. Cool in pan 15 minutes. Turn out and slice.

Sky High Biscuits

2 cups flour
4 1/2 tsp baking powder
1/2 tsp salt
3/4 cup butter or margarine
1 cup milk
1 cup whole wheat flour
2 tbsps. sugar
3/4 tsp cream of tartar
1 egg beaten

Combine all the flours and dry ingredients, cut in butter until mixture looks like coarse meal. Add egg and milk. Stir quickly. Knead gently on floured board. Cut out and bake at 450 degrees for 12 to 15 minutes. Makes about 20.

An application which does not contain the following information cannot be processed by the school; (1) The total household income must be listed by the amount received by each household member receiving income and the type of income it is (such as wages, child support, etc.) Or your food stamp case number if your household is on food stamps, (2) Names of all household members, (3) Social security numbers of all household members 21 years old or older or the word "NONE" for any household member who does not have a social security number, and (4) the signature of an adult household member.

VERIFICATION: The information on the application may be checked by the school or other officials at any time during the school year.

REPORTING CHANGES: If your child is approved for meal benefits, you must tell the school when your household income increases by more than \$50 per month (\$600 per year) or when your household size decreases.

REAPPLICATION: You may apply for benefits at any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a decrease in household income, become unemployed, or have an increase in family size, fill out an application at that time.

FOSTER CHILDREN: If you have foster children living with you, they may be eligible for these benefits. If you wish to apply for these benefits for them please contact the school and they will help you complete the application.

NONDISCRIMINATION: Children who receive free or reduced-price meal benefits are treated the same as children who pay for meals. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age, or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

FAIR HEARING: If you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the result of verification, you may wish to discuss it with the school. You also have the right to a fair hearing. CONFIDENTIALITY: The information you provide will be treated confidentially and will be used only for eligibility determinations and verification of data.

SPS Agreement Could Benefit Irrigators

Irrigation customers of South Plains Electric Cooperative, Inc. of Lubbock, Texas, and Bailey County Electric Association of Muleshoe, Texas, could benefit from an experimental rate structure agreed to by the cooperatives and Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS).

The rate structure is pending approval by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC).

The arrangement would allow the cooperatives to surpass their target demands for electricity without increasing their cost of electricity per kilowatt-hour or interrupting service to their irrigation customers, said J.C. Roberts, general manager of South Plains cooperative, and Duane Lloyd, general manager of Bailey County cooperative.

SPS supplies wholesale power to the cooperatives.

Under the existing rate structure, the cooperatives interrupt service to irrigation customers when a target peak demand is reached. This is done because the cooperatives' electric bills for the next year are based in part on the peak demand during each preceding summer. The concept is that classes of customers who cause the need for more power plant capacity to meet brief peaks in electric usage should pay their fair share for the cost of additional capacity, said Gary Gibson, SPS vice president-marketing.

The experimental rate structure is possible because there is ample electric generating capacity available due to the completion last year of SPS' Tolk Station power plant unit number two near Muleshoe, Gibson said.

Dry Spell Coming For Some Texans

A different kind of dry spell is coming soon for some Texans.

W.S. McBeath, Administrator of the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission today issued a reminder that the legal drinking age will rise to 21 on Labor Day. The present legal age is 19.

At 12:01 a.m. on Monday, September 1, possession or consumption of alcoholic beverages will be illegal for any person who has not reached his or her 21st birthday. The only exception is if the underage person is in the immediate physical presence of his own parents or spouse who is over 21. Possession of an alcoholic beverage by the underage person is a misdemeanor with a possible fine of \$25 to \$200.

It is also a crime for the underage person to present false identification or to misrepresent his age in an attempt to purchase alcoholic beverages, or to successfully make such a purchase even without misrepresenting his age. In either case, the first offense fine is the same as for possession. Giving Alcohol to a minor carries a fine of \$100 to \$500.

Sale of alcoholic beverages to an underage person is the most serious offense. A fine of \$100 to \$500 and a year in jail is the penalty for the

Under the new rate structure, prices effective September 1986 through August 1987 would be based on the target or actual peak demand --whichever is lower-- that occurred from June through August 1986. Thus, if farmers need to irrigate this summer more than the cooperatives' target amount, they wouldn't risk having their service interrupted simply because demand is exceeding the target.

South Plains Electric cooperative serves 5,570 irrigation wells. Bailey County Electric Association serves 2,449 irrigation wells. Bailey County Electric Association serves 2,449 irrigation wells.

This rate structure would be instituted on a one-year basis. After one year, the electric cooperatives and SPS will review the effectiveness of the program.

The two electric cooperative and SPS applied to FERC for the new rate structure on July 9. A ruling is expected later this summer. FERC regulates wholesale sales by SPS to electric cooperatives.

South Plains Electric Cooperative provides electric service to portions of the City of Lubbock, and in the counties of Crosby, Hale, Hockley, Lubbock and Lynn.

Bailey County Electric Association serves customers in Bailey, Castro, Cochran, Lamb and Parmer counties.

SPS provides electric service to a population of about one million in a 52,000-square-mile area of eastern and southeastern New Mexico, the South Plains and Panhandle of Texas, the Oklahoma Panhandle and southwestern Kansas.

first violation. A second violation can result to the same jail term and or a fine of \$500 to \$1,000.

McBeath also cautioned that the age change will affect persons entering package stores. Liquor stores may not allow underage persons to even enter the store, and most such establishments have warning signs prominently posted.

"Many young people do not realize it is a criminal offense to ignore the warning signs and enter a liquor store," said McBeath. "It is criminal trespass under section 30.05 of the Texas Penal Code, which is a class B Misdemeanor."

Another common misconception is that drinking age violations only apply to public places. "That's not true," said McBeath. "It will be just as illegal in a party barn, a fraternity house or a car parked on private property," he said.

McBeath urged voluntary compliance on the part of both licensees and underage former customers. Anyone who has a question about the upcoming change can obtain clarification from the nearest district office of the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission, or at the main office in Austin, Telephone 512-458-2500.

Work On Child's Poor Eating Habits

By Susie Spurlock County Extension Agent

Parents often worry about children who refuse to eat many foods, dawdle over food, play with it, fail to swallow food, or show other signs of being a finicky eater.

One of the best ways to change a child's poor eating patterns is to make mealtime a happy, fun time. Make the table and food attractive and serve food that the child likes.

Involving the child in planning for the meal or preparing food may also increase interest in eating.

Sit next to the child and set a good example. But if

the child refuses to eat or shows other negative behaviors, ignore them. Avoid getting into a power struggle about eating.

Don't comment on slow eating. After an appropriate time, remove the plate if the child says he is finished. Don't offer snacks or treats until the regularly scheduled time. And don't comment or lecture on what the child hasn't eaten or force the child to sit in front of the food until it is eaten.

In the meantime, when the child does taste a new food or eat appropriately, comment

positively.

Nutrition experts recommend against giving food as a reward for good behavior. This gives a confusing message. For example, if

you hold back dessert until the child eats the entire meal, he'll get the idea that dessert is better than the other foods.

Improving eating habits is a worthwhile goal. But remember that habits are learned and can take quite a while to change. Be patient, consistent and expect the child to sometimes relapse into earlier behavior.

Texas Retirement Insurance Explained

Joan Holshouser from the Texas Retirement System for Teachers spoke to a group of retired educators and other interested persons at the First National Bank of Dalhart on July 28. She explained the three options for health care insurance which are offered to teachers and their spouses and dependent children. She answered questions of a general nature and then counseled persons with individual problems. She carefully explained the benefits of each option, its costs and how it would help the individual teacher. She counseled persons with individual problems. Ms. Holshouser also explained the history of the program and how it is funded by the state, by interest from teacher retirement funds, and by active teachers who will benefit from it later.

Those who wish to enroll in TRS Care 3, which offers the most benefits, must do so NOW. They can move from Option 3 to Option 2 or Option 1 at a later date. After implementation of the plan on September 1, 1986, the state will see how the program can be improved. In the middle of August, all retirees will receive a packet of materials explaining the option which they have chosen.

She urged members of the audience to write to Governor White, Lieutenant Governor Hobby, Speaker of the House Gib Lewis, Senator Sarpaulis, and Representative J.W. 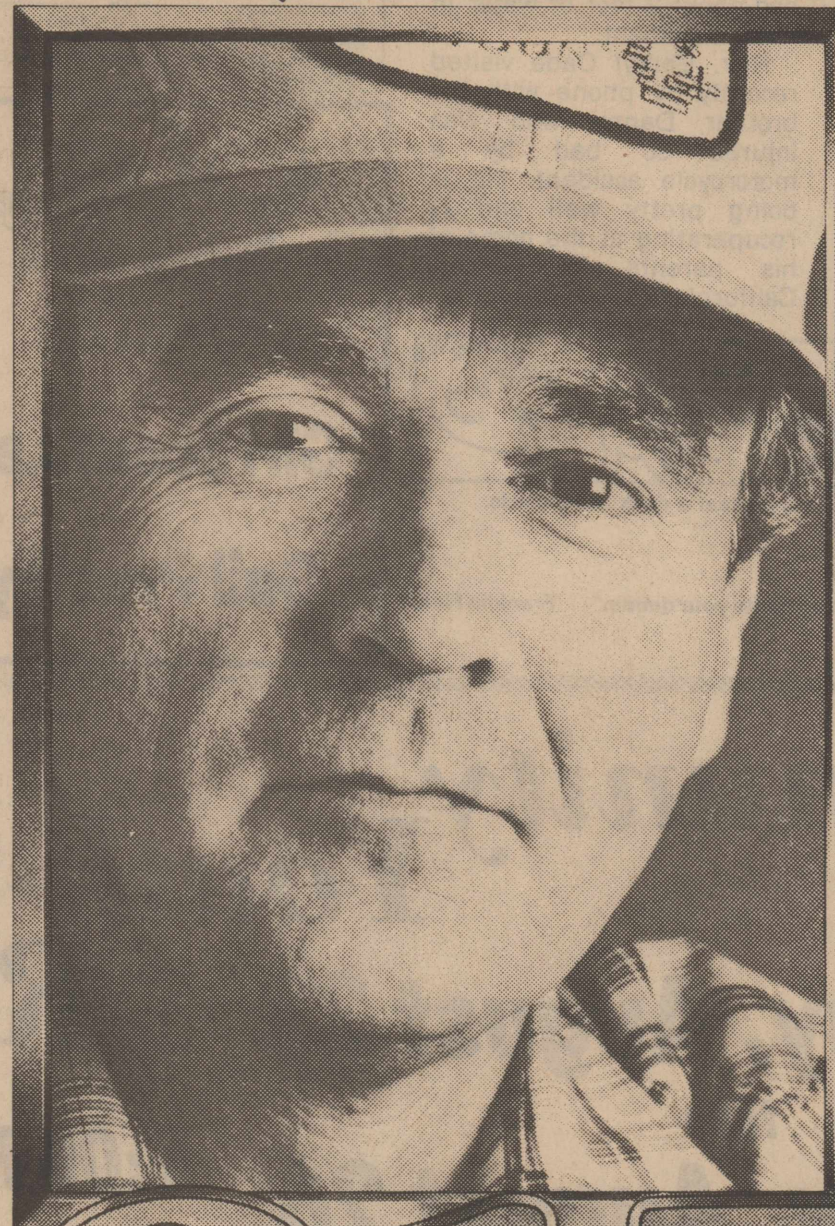

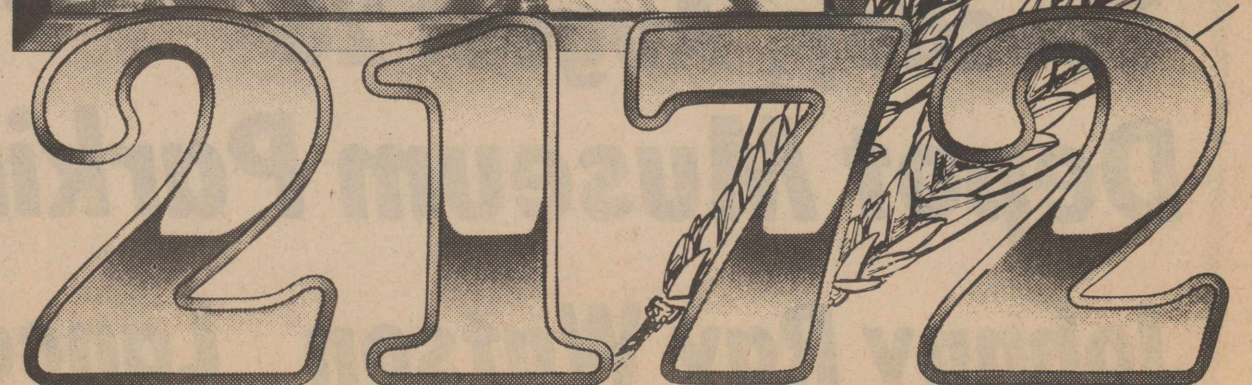

No one can entirely take your place when it comes to giving tender loving care to your beloved and precious plants. However, by making proper arrangements with someone who has your best interests at heart, well in advance of the day you leave on your vacation, the deprivation suffered by your plants in your absence can be minimized.

There is no questioning the wisdom of having a very responsible person take over the chores of irrigating the gardens and lawn and watering individual house plants. Some people are lucky enough to have an attentive neighbor who is both a good friend and a competent plant care person. However, do not assume that your neighbor will apply the right amount of water at the correct time. If you are so fortunate as to have a friend who is willing to care for all your indoor and outdoor plants, but refuses to accept payment for services, then it would be considerate of you to offer to care for the potted plants that can be easily moved over to your friend's house.

You may decide to have someone who is familiar with your plants and how you care for them take the responsibility of their care in your absence. It is also probably a good idea to hire a competent lawn care service to mow the grass while you are gone and pay to have it done properly. You might find a young person in your neighborhood, who you know to be considerate of others, reasonably bright and capable of following closely your clearly written and spoken directions. This person would be a good choice for tending to your

plants.

At least a week in advance of your departure on vacation, write carefully worded instructions on the exact procedures that you wish to have carried out while you are gone. A day or two before you leave have the person who will care for your plants come to your home and go through the procedures that you have written down in detail.

This way the person will feel confident that he or she is doing what you want to be done and exactly how you want it to be done while you are away. Specify how much water should be applied or how long the hose should be allowed to run on special plants that are in containers, any special plants that take more water than others, and trees that you want to have receive an extra quantity of water. If it does not rain, your garden will require two to three inches of water per week applied in at least two irrigations. One inch of water is equivalent to 62 gallons per 100 square feet.

Before you leave your landscape be sure that all the weeds are pulled, that the beds are mulched and all spent flowers and declining foliage are removed. Apply controls for insects and disease before you leave town. This will keep your plants in better health by reducing competition from weeds, keeping the plants' vegetation healthy and conserving soil moisture.

The time and effort that you have spent in planning for the care of your garden landscape while you are gone will make your homecoming much more pleasant and gardening for the rest of the season much more rewarding.

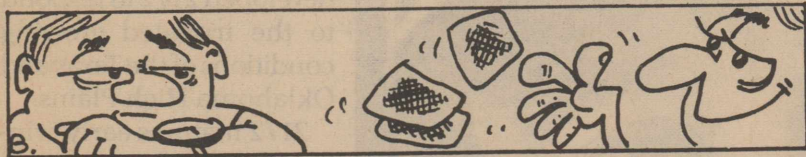

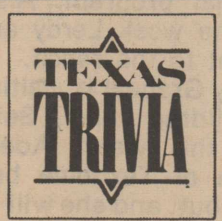

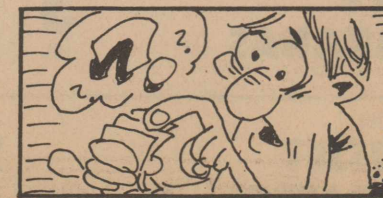
