

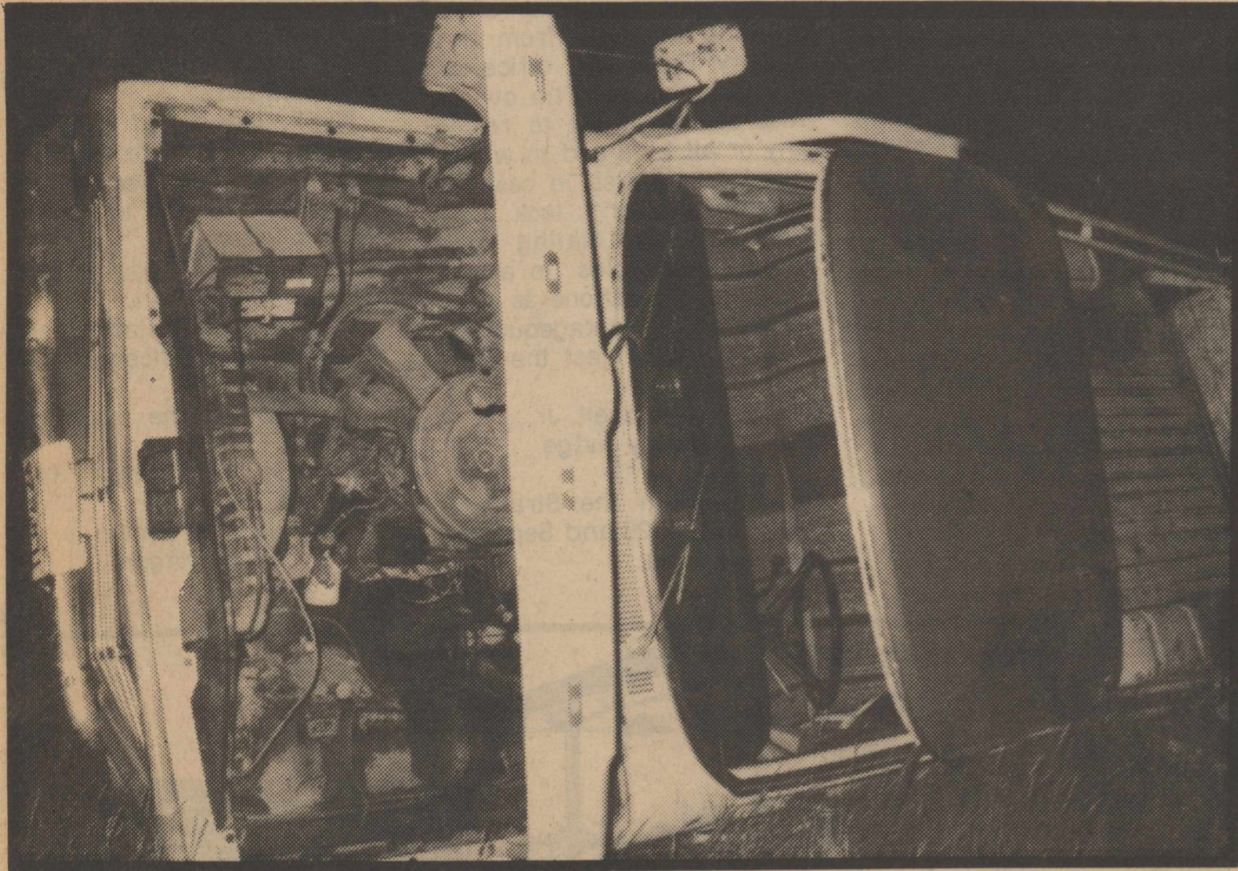

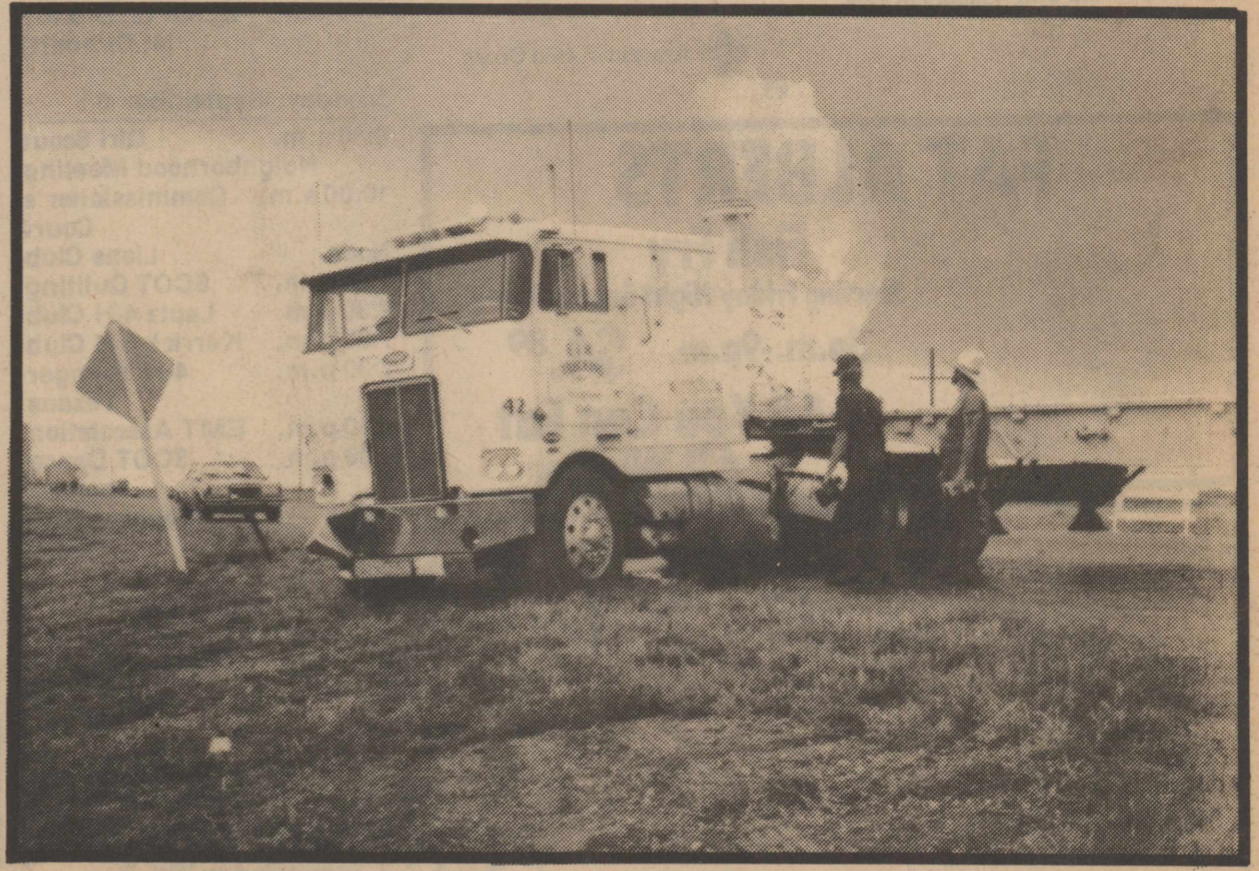

Accidents In Sherman County



Charles Michael Maddox 30 of Texhoma was injured in a vehicle rollover on Highway 54 Sunday morning at 1:05a.m.. Maddox was traveling North on Highway 119 when he crossed highway 54 and rolled over 4 times coming to rest on its side 192 feet from the edge of the pavement, close to the railroad tracks. He was taken to Guymon Memorial Hospital.



Wednesday a 1978 Peterbilt driven by Morris Sarensen 56 years old from Westminster, Colorado was south bound on 287 and lost control on the wet pavement and crossed the north bound lane causing the truck to jackknife. A 1981 Peterbilt with livestock trailer driven by David Lee Kemp of Plainview was north bound and was forced off the road into the right ditch and hit a highway sign. Both drivers escaped injuries. The accident occurred at 1:10 p.m. in light mist, 10 miles out on 287 south. There is road construction at the sight of the accident.

City Council Minutes

August 7, 1986

Stratford City Council met in regular session Thursday, August 7, 1986 at 7:30 p.m. with Mayor Leland Lewis presiding and the following Council members present: Ronnie Pickens, Kirk McWilliams, R.J. Hill and Wanda Riffe. Kyle Lewis, City Attorney, was also present.

Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved as read.

Doug Reese, manager of Southern Union Gas Co., met with Council for the second reading of the Rate Schedule T-1. This new rate will provide transportation services to present and new customers who choose to obtain their own gas supply. A motion was made by Wanda and seconded by R.J. to accept the second reading of the rate schedule and approve it. Motion carried.

Kent Dallas, AEF representative met with Council to discuss new insurance for City employees, Bob Bell, United of Omaha representative, was also present. After

some discussion, a motion was made by Kirk and seconded by Ronnie to stay with United of Omaha. Motion carried.

Ordinance #249, amending Ordinance #240 regarding claims made against the City was discussed. A motion was made by Kirk and seconded by Wanda to pass Ordinance #249. Motion carried. TML interlocal agreement was also signed.

A motion was made by Wanda and seconded by R.J. to set the 1986 City tax rate at .54918. Motion carried.

Kevin Globier met with Council to discuss the City's water supply system. Mayor Lewis appointed Ronnie to get the bank's intention on the well in the Sherman Addition. Kevin is to get figures together on the cost of an elevated storage and report back to Council.

The 1986/87 City budget was discussed. Wayland's salary was increased to \$2,100.00 per month. A motion was made by R.J. and seconded by Wanda to

adopt provisionally the 1986/87 City budget with this change. Motion carried. A Budget Hearing will be held on Sept. 4, 1986.

The cleanup program was discussed. The time is up on the property at 101 S. Maple. A motion was made by Ronnie and seconded by R.J. to have the City cleanup the property and charge back to the property. Motion carried.

A motion was made by Wanda and seconded by R.J. to pass a resolution regarding sales tax on out-of-state mail-order companies. Motion carried 3 for 1 against.

City bills were reviewed for payment. A motion was made by Kirk and seconded by Ronnie to pay all bills except for the July rebill on Sherman County bill. Motion carried.

A motion to adjourn was made by Kirk and seconded by R.J. Motion carried, meeting adjourned.

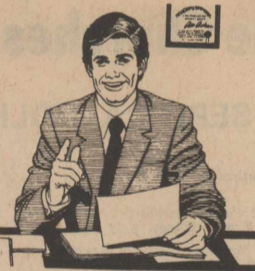
A bridal shower was held in the home of Mrs. George Ballard of Amarillo August 10. Hostesses were choir members of Southlawn Baptist Church.

TES hours are Monday through Saturday, 10:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m.

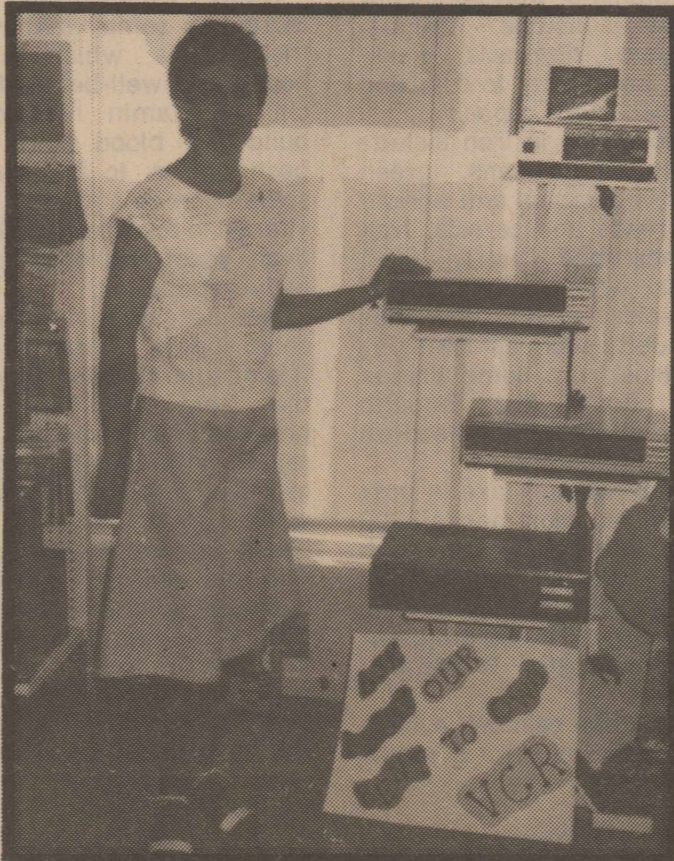

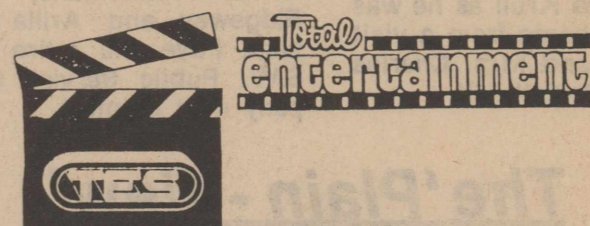

Tips & Topics

To meet the many demands placed on them at home and in the workplace, you'd think that most women would want to be in the best possible state of health. But evidently, this is not the case.

Research studies indicate that today's woman is not getting sufficient amounts of certain vitamins and minerals, including calcium, iron, vitamin B-6 and folacin.

Although women are smaller than men, those of child-bearing age need about twice as much iron. Iron is a mineral required to form hemoglobin, the oxygen-carrying part of the blood. Without enough iron, iron-deficiency anemia results. Symptoms of iron-deficiency anemia include fatigue, paleness, dizziness, weakness, sensitivity to cold and reduced work capacity.

Foods rich in iron include meats, dry beans, green leafy vegetables and enriched breads and cereals. Iron is absorbed better from meals when a source of ascorbic acid is also included, such as tomatoes or citrus fruit. Some women who don't eat enough iron-rich foods may need an iron supplement.

Many women take in only half of the recommended 800 milligrams of calcium each day. This is of special concern, since many experts believe that the 800 milligram recommendation is actually too low.

Too little calcium over a long period of time is one of

the main factors linked to the painful, crippling condition called osteoporosis. Calcium is lost from bones, so they become very fragile and break with the slightest movement. The condition most often shows up in elderly women.

Osteoporosis may be prevented by a calcium-rich diet and regular exercise. Milk and milk products are the best sources of calcium. Two and three-fourths cups of milk provide enough calcium to meet the current recommendation for 800 milligrams per day. Non-dairy sources of calcium include collard and mustard greens and salmon and sardines with edible bones.

Many women may be lacking in some vitamins in their diets which affect health and well-being. Folicin, a vitamin needed to build red blood cells, has been shown to be low in some women's diets. This vitamin is found especially in liver, yeast and deep green leafy vegetables.

Another vitamin often in short supply is vitamin B-6. It is needed to form enzymes that help the body use proteins for building and repair. Vitamin B-6 is found in Meat, liver, wheat germ, whole grain cereals, soybeans, peanuts and corn. The best source of all these nutrients is food-not vitamin pills or supplements. Eating a variety of foods from the basic food groups daily can help every insure that she is not missing any of these

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
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

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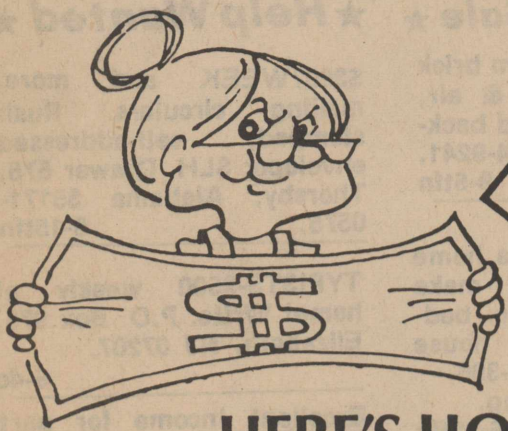
