

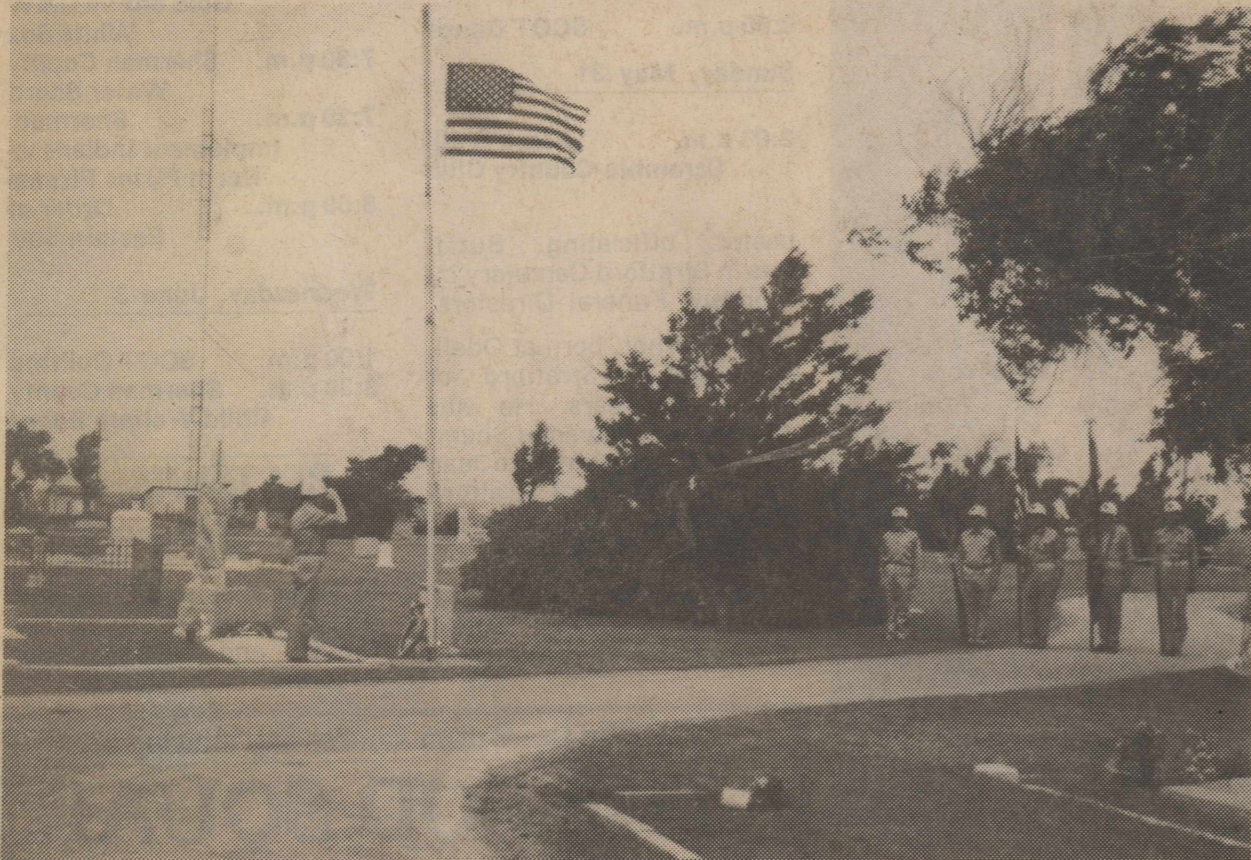

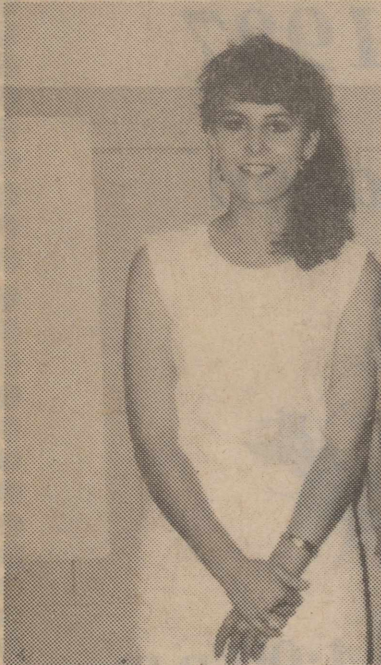
## Summer Reading Program

Researchers in family relationships identify a sense of humor or laughter as an indicator of strong families. When family relations become strained or the family experiences difficult financial times, laughter is harder to generate, or may cease to exist.

Recent medical studies indicate a connection between immunity and the mind. For instance, deep laughter releases substances into the body that seem to block pain. Some physiologists have found that stressful events often precede illness. Then, control over stressful events is important.

and anxieties into absurdities. With humor, we choose to accept the world the way it is and laugh at it instead of getting hung up on the way we know it "should" be.

Laughter is also the body's way of realizing that despite everything that has happened to us, we are not doomed. Laughter allows hope.

There are great moments of mirth in every family that conjure up scenarios of dealing with very serious problems in unconventional ways. Humor often defuses anger and heals pain.

When families come together in shared laughter, they enjoy a deep feeling of common humanity and unity. Laughing at your troubles presents us with an offer we can't refuse.
