

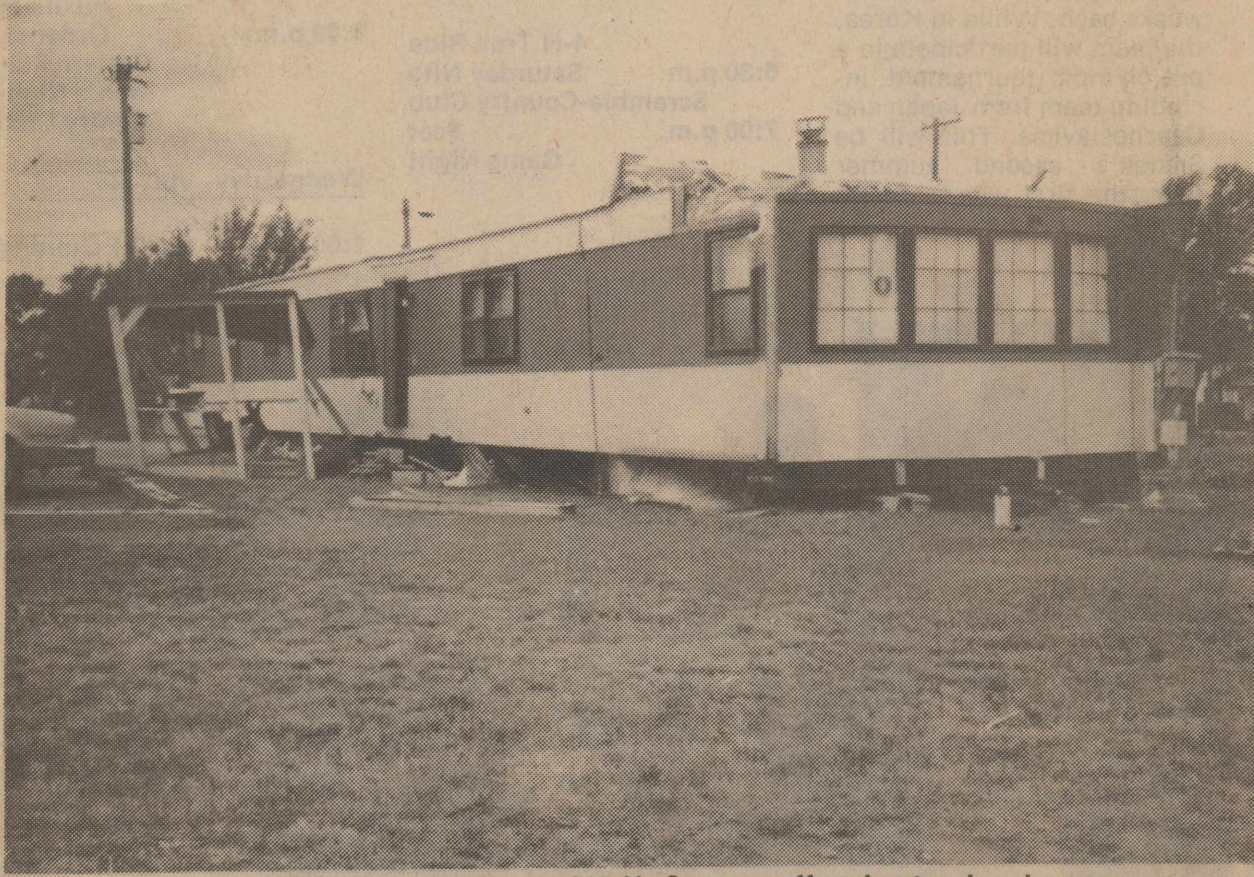

## City Council Minutes

Stratford City Council met in regular session Thursday, July 2, 1987 at 7:30 p.m. with Mayor Doug Reese presiding and the following Council members present: Wanda Riffe, Bill Roberts, Eddie Haggard, Don Williams, and Ronnie Pickens. Kyle Lewis, City Attorney, was also present.

Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved as read.

Building restrooms at City Park was discussed. To build on the existing slab using concrete blocks, fiberglass roof and stainless steel fixtures would cost approximately \$5,600.00 Wayland is to do some more checking on fixtures. A motion was made by Wanda and second by Bill

to keep the port-a-potties thru the month of August. Motion carried.

The drainage on Purnell Street was discussed. To run a six foot slab to drain the water would cost approximately \$1,360.00 Curb and gutter will be \$6.00 a running foot. A motion was made by Don and second by Wanda to table the matter until Wayland can check with the landowners to see if they will pay for the curb and gutter. Motion carried.

The drainage on South Wall was discussed. To run an eight foot concrete slab from the existing curb and gutter across the street at a cost of approximately \$540.00 making everything drain to the East, and take culverts completely out. A

motion was made by Ronnie and second by Bill to run the 8 ft. of concrete and start fixing the drainage to the East. Motion carried.

The cleanup program was discussed. Council was in agreement to send second letters to property owners not in compliance with the ordinance.

City Bills were reviewed for payment. A motion was made by Bill and second by Ronnie to pay all bills. Motion carried.

A motion was made to adjourn, motion carried, meeting adjourned.

## Glider Pilots To Gather In Dalhart For Annual Meet

Glider pilots from as far away as Florida and Pennsylvania will gather in Dalhart beginning July 18

for the 3rd Annual Texas Panhandle Badge and Record Soaring Camp.

As many as two dozen of

the pilots and their crew members will bring high performance gliders, also known as sailplanes, to Dalhart for a week of attempts to set distance and speed marks in their racing aircraft, using only the Texas Panhandle's rising currents of warm air to remain aloft.

"During July and August, the Texas Panhandle has some of the finest soaring conditions in the country and pilots will come from a long way off just so they can fly here and have a shot at some long flights," said Steve Sherry of Dalhart, one of the camp's organizers and a glider pilot himself.

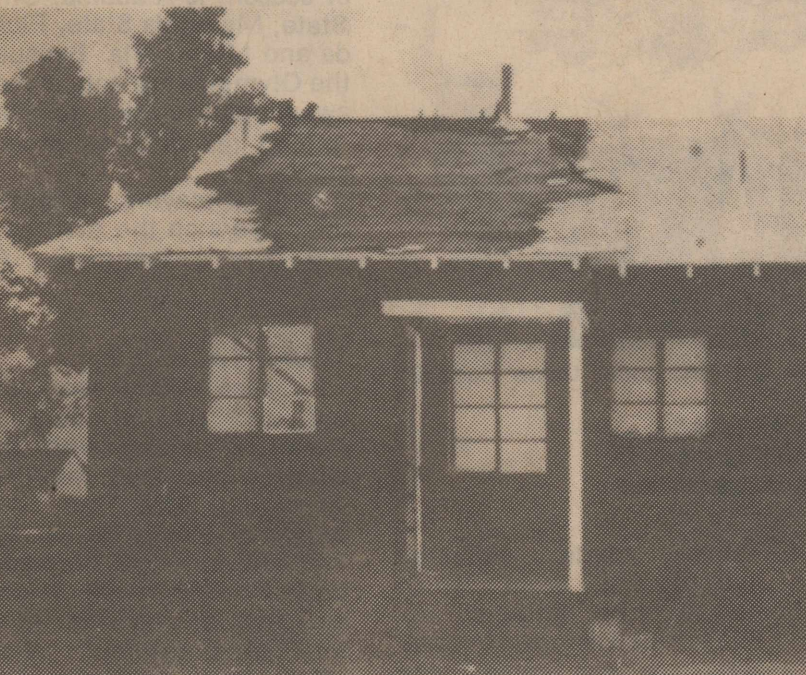
The camp is sponsored by Dalhart Soaring, which is based at Miller Field outside of Dalhart.

As in years past, the public is invited to observe the meet and will be able to take rides in a glider.

Since the first Texas Panhandle Badge and Record Soaring Camp was held two years ago, a unique flight has evolved as the ultimate soaring challenge in the Texas Panhandle.

Because of Dalhart's location, it is possible on a day marked by superb soaring weather to make a 221 mile flight in which the sailplane takes off from Dalhart and passes through

TO: All owners or working interests, overriding interests, royalty interests, and other types of interests in natural gas wells which flowed into or delivered natural gas to Transwestern Pipeline Company during the years 1965 to 1970 in Cimarron and Texas Counties in Oklahoma and in Dallam, Sherman, Moore, Hansford, and Hutchinson Counties in Texas. A portion of said gas was exchanged by Transwestern to Panhandle Eastern Pipeline Company, and helium was extracted from said gas.

The Court is presently holding settlement funds attributable to helium-bearing natural gas produced from wells in Cimarron and Texas Counties in Oklahoma and in Dallam, Sherman, Moore, Hansford, and Hutchinson Counties in Texas during the years 1965-1970. The Special Master to the Court is in the process of preparing an allocation of those helium settlement proceeds to determine how much should be paid to the owners of each such well. The Court may award fees and expenses to the Special Master out of these helium settlement proceeds. If you have questions, the Special Master's proposed allocation will be on file by July 1, 1987, with the Clerk of the United States District Court, Room 204, U.S. Courthouse, 401 North Market, Wichita, Kansas 67202, and will be available for inspection during regular business hours. It contains a detailed explanation of the allocation, and provides information concerning all wells and payees. The Special Master's allocation will propose distributing the helium settlement proceeds based upon each well's annual natural gas production, for those wells which the Special

Master finds delivered natural gas from which helium was extracted by Panhandle Eastern. If necessary, you can contact the Special Master, at the following address: Jim H. Goering, 700 Fourth Financial Center, Wichita, Kansas 67202, Telephone: (316)267-6371.

If you have objections to the Special Master's allocation, payee listings or any other matter pertaining to the Transwestern-related helium settlement funds, you must file your objections in writing with the Clerk of The District Court, Room 204, U.S. Courthouse, 401 North Market, Wichita, Kansas 67202, on or before August 1, 1987. A hearing will be at the United States Courthouse, 401 North Market, Wichita, Kansas, at 11:00 a.m. on August 13th, 1987 to take up any such objections, to determine if the allocation and payee listings should be approved, and to establish a payout procedure. Upon completion of the allocation of Transwestern helium settlement proceeds, the Special Master is hereby Ordered to forward to each payee listed in the allocation that payee's portion of the computer printout detailing the settlement funds to which the payee would be entitled if the Special Master's Allocation is approved by the Court. The former All-Stater from Stratford reports to San Diego the beginning of Sept. to begin workouts with AIA team. The bulk of the team's schedule is played against college teams in November and early December. five states--Texas, New Mexico, Colorado, Kansas and Oklahoma--before returning to Dalhart.

Two pilots made the demanding circuit last year. Landmarks designated in advance are photographed from the air using a sealed camera to later verify that the flight was made.

The landmarks, or turn-points, are at Clayton, N.M.; Campo, Co.; Elkhart, Kansas; Boise City, Okla., and return to Dalhart. The record time around the course is 3 hours and 54 minutes, held by David Larence of Lakeland, Fla., who flew a German-built ASW 20 an average speed of 56.67 miles per hour.

He is expected back again this year to attempt to shorten the time and defend his title.

Dave Lund of Boulder, Co., also successfully made the flight last year in a Mini-Nimbus in 4:29.

"We think this five-state course is something unique in soaring in this country," Sherry said. "There is no question it is a difficult flight, but I wouldn't be surprised to see a new record for the flight this year. There are some very competitive pilots coming."

The Panhandle region is ideal for soaring because of the cumulus clouds that develop in the morning and grow larger as the afternoon progresses. The building clouds generate strong columns of rising air in which the sailplane pilot circles until he reaches the base of the clouds.

Then he glides his motorless aircraft--sometimes at speeds well in excess of 100 miles an hour--along his intended flight path until he encoun-

Should the weather conditions change and no more of the rising air, known as "lift", be found, the pilot will eventually have to land his craft in a field or at an airport nearby.

The pilot's crew, following on the ground, arrives and the sailplane is disassembled and driven back to the airport in a special trailer.

Members of the public who want to see the pilots readying their gliders and being towed into the air by a propeller driven towplane should plan on arriving at the airport between 10 A.M. and noon C.D.T. any day between July 18 and July 25.

Miller Field is located six miles northeast of Dalhart near U.S. Highway 54.

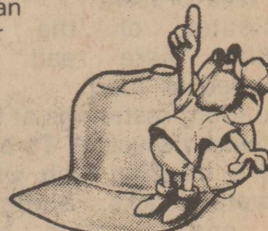

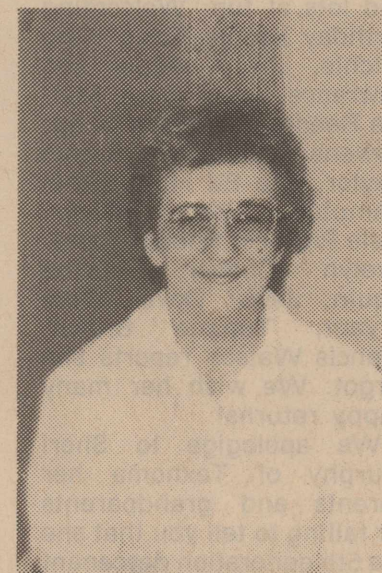
## 1987 Outstanding Women Of The Year

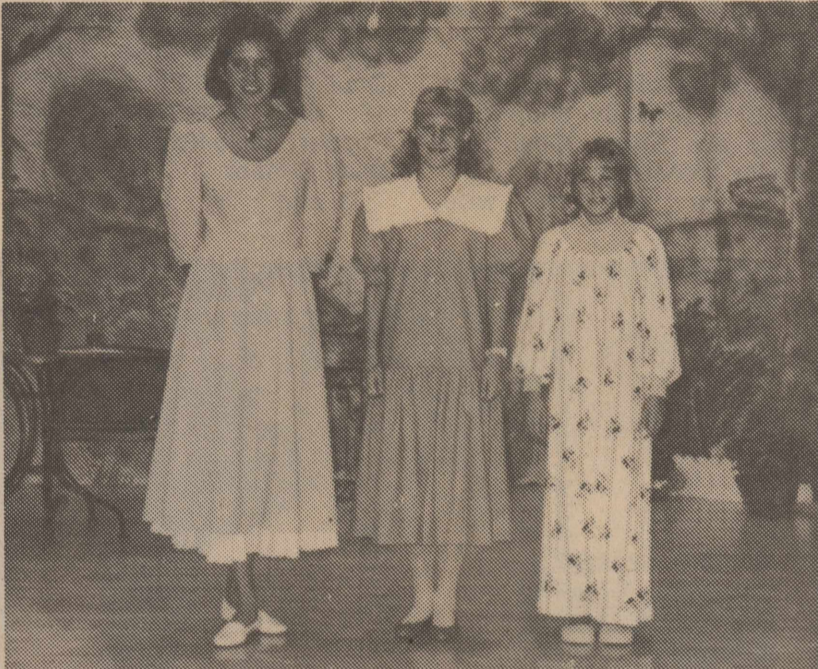
