

areas of Stratford have been infected with ticks. Ticks are blood suckers on warm blooded mammals therefore they love people and pets. We need to watch our children very close for these pests, because they can cause problems. Examine your children very closely when you bathe them for these pests.

Ticks are flat, usually brown and about one-fourth of an inch long; they have eight legs. In some cases they can transmit germs of several diseases, including Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever, which occurs in the East as well as the West. They adhere tenaciously to the skin or scalp. There is some evidence that the longer an infected one remains attached, the greater is the chance that it will transmit the disease.

First Aid: Removal of ticks by using tweezers or by applying heat to them, as with a lighted cigarette, may leave tick parts in the wound or may injure the victim's skin. A better method is to cover the tick with heavy oil (mineral, salad or machine)

to close its breathing pores. It may disengage at once; if not, allow the oil to remain in place for half an hour. Then remove the tick carefully with tweezers, taking time so that all parts are removed. Gently scrub the area thoroughly with soap and water, because the tick may have left disease germs on the skin. If you find a tick in the ear, I would suggest that you do not try to get it out, but have a doctor remove it.

The Stratford Independent School Board met in Regular Session on August 6, 1987 at 8:00 p.m.

Minutes of the previous meeting were approved and the Board paid the August

Why "Christians?" By Derrel Lewis

Evening Worship 6:00 pm Acts 11:26b "And the disciples were called Christians first in Antioch."

> From the time of Jesus birth until Paul's ministry at Antioch some forty to fifty years later, Jesus followers had not been referred to as Christians. Jesus had taught those who walked with him, the ways of God. Many had experienced persecution for their faith but until Antioch none had been called Christians. Why all of a sudden were they given that

> The word Christian is from the Greek words Christoians. which properly translated means "Little Christs". Barnabus and Paul had taught the church there for a year. They had learned so well and their lifestyles reflected so much of Jesus that their advisaries in derision called them "little Christs". In Romans 9 Paul tells us the redeemed are predistined to be conformed to the image of God's son. The Christians at Antioch were fulfilling that plan to the extent that even those who mocked them could recognize they were like Jesus.

God's plan has not changed. It is still his intent that we who are redeemed should be like Jesus. Are we? Years ago I read in the newsletter of Central Baptist Church in Pampa, the following question; "If you were arrested and put on trial for being a Christian, would there be enough evidence to convict you?" We use the word Christian often and without a great deal of serious thought. It is not a label to be worn without giving it meaning and honor.



REPORTING CHANGES: If you list income information and your child is approved for meal benefits, you must tell the school when your household income increases by \$50 or more per month (\$600 per year) or when your household size decreases. If you list a food stamp case number or AFDC number, you must tell the school when you no longer receive food stamps or AFDC for your child.

November 3, 1987 Texas voters will say "YES" to pari-mutuel horse racing in the Lone Star State. Pari-mutuel horse racing is the world's most popular spectator sport. Forty-one states, including every state surrounding Texas, have pari-mutuel horse racing. Pari-mutuel horse racing would be more than an exciting sport for our state, it would be a \$2 Billion a year industry and...

There will be Jobs for Texas: 11,000 new jobs for Texans in all job categories; 8,000 construction jobs; 7,000 new farm related jobs; unlimited new jobs for the tourism industry, restaurants, hotels, motels, horse breeding and training facilities, veterinarians, real estate sales personnel, insurance agents, manufacturers, suppliers, retailers and on and on.

There will be Tourism for Texas: Millions, millions and millions of Texas dollars go out of state each year to New Mexico, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Louisiana as Texans take their dollars to watch pari-mutuel horse racing. Texas would enjoy a halt of Texas dollars leaving and new dollars coming into Texas from out-of-state tourist(after all, the best racing would be in Texas.)

There will be Taxes for Texas: 11,415 each hour in new tax revenue; \$274,000 each day; \$100,000,000 annually in pari-mutuel taxes paid to the Texas Treasury (according to Bob Bullock, Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts). 5 million in sales taxes from concessions sales at the race tracts; and \$7 million annually in race track property taxes.


