[Only signed nominations will be considered] Please return this [or similiar form] to the Chamber of Commerce office by noon, Wednesday, Nov. 4, 1987. to file for an annual rate decrease of approximately \$13 million, or 2.8%, for its residential, commercial, industrial and other retail customers in Texas, primarily due to savings resulting

from federal tax reform. In addition, SPS is requesting to credit to its Texas retail customers \$11 million in fuel-cost savings and interest.

The lower rates and the one-time credit could be effective by December, said Sam Hunter, SPS vice president of rates and economic research.

Currently, SPS is conferring with the cities it serves in Texas and with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT) on the amount and timing of the rate reduction. In Texas, cities have original jurisdiction over base rates within their city limits. The PUCT establishes base rates in rural areas and regulates the fuel-cost portion of electric rates.

Effective with SPS's current fiscal year, which began September 1, its federal income tax rate was

Pari-Mutuel Horse Racing - can We Afford to Vote No?



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

dropped to 34% from 44%. Although some corporate tax credits and deductions were eliminated by tax reform, the net effect is a smaller tax burden, Hunter said. Taxes are included in the cost of providing electric service.

"The fuel-cost savings resulted from several factors Hunter said." "First, we obtained lower prices for coal and natural gas. Second, because of the relatively mild summer, we did not have to operate older, less efficient power plants as much as in the past. Third, we have continued to improve the efficiency of our plants."

SPS recently was cited as seventh best among the 100 largest investor-owned electric utilities in the United States, in terms of generating efficiency.

In New Mexico, SPS is preparing to file for a rate reduction of \$2.65 million, or 2.1%, because of tax reform, Hunter said. Fuel-cost savings have been passed through to SPS customers in New Mexico by monthly automatic fuel-cost adjustments, which are not allowed in Texas.

Wholesale customers of SPS--rural electric cooperatives and municipal utilities-in Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma are expected to receive a rate decrease of \$13.2 million, or 6.9%, and a one-time credit of \$5 million, Hunter said. SPS

Multiply this by appr. three million dollars each racing day for nearly eleven months which is a lot of moolah; and the state gets the cream right off the top without a dime of investment.

Finally, it boggles the mind to imagine how Texas would have prospered since 1937 when pari-mutuel was forcefully rescinded through the efforts of a short-sighted governor. For three years the income from tracks made it possible to pay bills, and breeding farms flourished especially King Ranch. It's sad to relate that a percentage of the handle was earmarked for education.

AGAINST greyhound racing in our state. The Texas Humane Information Network wants Texans to know the cruel facts about racing.

Greyhounds are trained to run with the use of live lures. Rabbits, chickens, puppies and kittens are used as 'bait' for racing dogs - trainers allow their dogs to rip this 'bait' to shreds to encourage speed and aggression. Over 90% of greyhound trainers openly admit to using live lures, claiming that it is the only way to train properly.

Hundreds of thousands of greyhounds are bred - less than half of these show racing potential. Unsuccessful animals are destroyed, thus promoting the idea that racing dogs are inanimate objects, and not sensitive creatures. The Humane Society of the United States estimated that this needless destruction of life amounts to the massacre of 50,000 dogs annually.

Successful racing dogs have an average lifespan of only 4 years. By this time most have had a series of painful racing injuries such as lacerations, dropped and torn muscles, ruptured tendons, fractured bones, and sprained ligaments ultimately resulting in their destruction, as well.

The truth demands a NO vote to Referendum 2 on November 3.


Three people are employed by Olson Automotive, they are; Gloria Slater, Rusty Hembree and Glenda
