

Your New Social Security

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is one in a series of articles giving the pertinent details of the new provisions in Social Security,

Income received from the ministry will automatically be covered by social security under the new social security amendments.

Until the 1967 change in the law, a member of the clergy could be covered under social security under an individual, voluntary arrangement; if he wished social security protection he signed a form stating that he wished his income from the ministry to be covered. He then paid a portion of his salary as his social security contribution on the basis of that of

a self-employed person. As of January 1, 1968, however, income from the ministry will be covered automatically on the same basis as that for other wage earners and self-employed persons, unless the clergyman has objections based on con-

science or religious principle. As under the old law, a clergyman covered by this provision reports his income and makes his tax contributions as if he were self-employed, even though he may be working as an employee. He will pay his first social security taxes on in-

come from 1968, The new provisions do not apply to those elergymen who selected coverage under the old law. They will continue to be

If a clergyman who had not already chosen to come under social security before 1968 does not wish social security coverage he must file an application for an exemption and a statement that he is opposed to receiving social security benefits or other public insurance based on services as a clergyman, by reason of conscience or religious principle. The application must be filed with the Internal Revenue Service by April 15. 1970, unless he enters the ministry in 1969 or later; case he will have until April 15 of the second year after the year in which he became a clergyman to request exemp-

The new provision does not affeot members of religious or-ders who have taken a vow of poverty. As before, they are not covered by social security. For further information about social security for clergymen, ask at your social security office for leaflet SSI-9.



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Cut Calory Intake To Trim Waistline

Counting calories is a favorite pastime among those of us who want to lose weight.

The term "calors" is used as a unit in expressing the energyproducing value of food. When we say that a tablespoon of honey contains about 100 calories, it means that the honey, when utilized by the tissues of the body, will release that amount of energy to be expended in bodily activity.

The usual weight-reduction goal of one or two pounds' loss per week is achieved by a daily intake of 500 to 1,000 calories less than the intake needed to maintain the weight at which reducing was begun.

The American Medical Association's home health book, Today's Health Guide points out that 1,000 calories represent the smallest practical intake that can previde the recommended daily allowances of essential minerals and vitamins through usual food sources For children, the minimum figure on which to lose weight is close to 1,600 calories, with 1.800 often recommended to ensure a margin of safety.

But all of us are different, and caloric needs are an individual attair. They should be worked out in consultation with your physician. He can help you arrive at a reasonable figure, permitting you to lose seeight steadily and gradually, and at the same time maintain good health and not go

Liquid formula diets unques tionably have helped many persons to lose weight. Although some of these preparations combine the merits of economy, acceptability and nutritional balance, they lend themselves to short-term, intensive



weight loss. This only postpones the day of reckoning when the dieter must return to usual food-

Calory charts will help guide you in determining what you can eat, and in what quantity, to maintain your desired daily intake, Some diet specialists now recommend five or six small meals a day, rather than two or three large ones. Others favor periods of complete lasting at the onset of the diet for an excessively overweight

Whatever program your physician prescribes for you, there is one important thing to remember -raiories do count. To lose weight, we must expend more energy than we take in,



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

The Good Earth

in and out of the clouds today According to the calendar spring has arrived, but it seems winter is inclined to linger on few more days. was a heavy frost last night. I hope the damp air has protected fruit trees from being killed.

Flowers are pushing through the earth, as if they feel spring is here. Peach, pear, plum and apricot trees are in full bloom ... Faces have taken on a brighter look...Birds wake us each morning with their sweet call ... a Red Bird (Cardinal perches on our neighbor's aerial, high above our bedroom window and serenades us with a song that seems to say .. "fish are biting".. I get a great urge to grab the old fishing pole and head for the lake, but one blast of the cold blustery wind changes my mind in a hurry.

Vegetables, such as carrots, beets, radishes, parsley and lettuce should be planted as soon as the ground is dry enough to till. Our neighbor has already planted his whole garden. If spring has really arrived they will be a jump ahead of most Haskell residents, when it comes

to fresh vegetables. Our family likes oak leaf lettuce; it keeps fresh and sweet long after other lettuce has become bitter due to hot weather. Oak leaf lettuce never heads but the leaves make attractive garnishes for salads and meat

The bulbs we planted the first of February are covered in buds and should be in full bloom within a week. We have planted bulbs at three different times, about two weeks a part, and if the late ones send up blossoms as well as the ones planted the first of February did, we should have blossoms over a long period of time. Our yellow crocus have been blooming for two weeks. There are a number of that have just burst through the soil so we should have a long time to watch these

interesting flowers. Be sure to plant Gladiola as soon as weather permits; to have a continuation, of blooms plant Gladiola corms every two

We waited until late to plant our ranuculus as I was afraid the tubers would rot because of wet weather.

I visited the nursery not long ago and became so enchanted with the row after row of bedding plants, I could hardly leave rows of celosia, candy tuft, petunias, marigolds, celosnapdragons, and many other plants I do not recall at this time, lined the shelves of the nursery. I had Mrs Conner-reserve forty petunia plants to go in our new garden. We have already planted eleven snapdragon plants
