

#### Smallpox Can Be Eliminated

Austin, Jan. 24- Smallpox can b eliminated as a cause of illness and death if every person would be vac cinated against this disease at least every five years, declared Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer. There were almost eight hundred cases reported to the State Department of Health in 1934.

Smallpox occurs most frequently among young children under 14 years of age. The incubation period averages from 8 to 14 days, and the discase begins suddenly with a severe heaache and a high fever. The severe headache and the intense pain in the loins, back and extremities are more characteristic of smallpox than of any other disease occuring in temperate climates. At the end of 3 or 4 days of these preliminary symptoms an eruption appears which, within a few hours becomes distinctly raised above the general level of the skin. With the appearance of the eruption the fever subsides and the patient becomes more comfortable. In contradiction to chickenpox, the eruption does not occur in crops, but goes through its development in a characteristic fashion nearly simultaneously all over the body.

At present there is an increasing lack of vaccination among school children, and they contribute a menance to our State. Is it right to sit complacently by and allow this disease to gain foothold, when a very simple weapon is in a position which would make the occurance impossible? Every community is in a position to determine the amount of smallpox it wishes to have. Vaccination is an economical measure easily within the reach of all and brings protection. The disease is within human control and our advice to the people of Texas is to get vaccinated if you have not been within the last five years.

**Smallpox Can Be** Eliminated

Austin, Jan. 24- Smallpox can b eliminated as a cause of illness and death if every person would be vac cinated against this disease at least every five years, declared Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer. There were almost eight hundred cases reported to the State Department of Health in 1934.

Smallpox occurs most frequently among young children under 14 years of age. The incubation period averages from 8 to 14 days, and the discase begins suddenly with a severe heaache and a high fever. The severe headache and the intense pain in the loins, back and extremities are more characteristic of smallpox than of any other disease occuring in temperate climates. At the end of 3 or 4 days of these preliminary symptoms an eruption appears which, within a few hours becomes distinctly raised above the general level of the skin. With the appearance of the eruption the fever subsides and the patient becomes more comfortable. In contradiction to chickenpox, the eruption does not occur in crops, but goes through its development in a characteristic fashion nearly simultaneously all over the body.

At present there is an increasing lack of vaccination among school children, and they contribute a menance to our State. Is it right to sit complacently by and allow this disease to gain foothold, when a very simple weapon is in a position which would make the occurance impossible? Every community is in a position to determine the amount of smallpox it wishes to have. Vaccination is an economical measure easily within the reach of all and brings protection. The disease is within human control and our advice to the people of Texas is to get vaccinated if you have not been within the last five years.




COUNTY COUNCIL MEETS FEBRUARY 9th 193
