We begin to feel that life itself is a heavy load on us and the more we think the heavier it feels to us. We want to get away from thinking of life—anything at all that occupies our mind is a temporary relief. Some of us work, others play, others read, write, make money and others travel. Just to be doing something to keep our minds occupied in order to forget life—and we call this pleasure. But, in reality it is only a stimulant thru which we try to forget the inevitable death. But the end comes nearer and nearer; the thought becomes treacherous; and the fear becomes eminent. We are facing the problem of life that has puzzled humanity at all times. We want more than a few miserable years during this short life.

Our relief comes from hope and faith, that the end at the grave is not the end; so we resign ourselves into what we believe to be a mysterious power controlling our destiny, and we try to encourage and help one another while we are traveling our mortal life so we can pass this period with a peace of mind and try to laugh our fears out, which is the best thing we mortals can do.

Those of the human race who have adopted the hope of the future life, and the faith in the recompensation of their actions have got the best of it, and have evidently gone thru life with a much happier mood.

"HARDEN OFF" TOMATO PLANTS

"All 'spindling' tomato plants result from crowding and excessive watering. Plants of this type are too tender to transplant directly from hotbed to garden. Such plants should be hardened off."

"Sandstorms have made it impossible for me to set out my tomato plants when they are large enough. Now I have 'Spindling' tomato plants. Before transplanting I am 'hardening off' these plants by watering them just enough to prevent serious wilting, and also increasing the ventilation for about eight to ten days before transplanting." reports Mr. O. W. Lowrance, cooperater of the Jayton H. D. Club.

To have hardy tomato plants with a good rooting system it is better to remove plants from hotbed to a cold frame when the second set of true leaves appear then transplant to garden when they are of size.

"Tender greens, New Zealand spinach and Swiss chard are mapped out on my leafy vegetable garden territory for summer leafy vegetables," says Renelle Fuller, garden demonstrator of the Clairemont 4-H club.

"Try soaking the new Zealand spinach seed over night before planting and you will find that they come up much better. When the spinach has attained a growth of about 5 inches in height thin it to at least ten inches apart in the row. Crowded spinach does not produce well," she adds.

These vegetables are our hot weather vegetables in the leafy variety and to plant them about the first of May is not too late. Tender greens can be planted up until about the middle of June They do not seed as rapidly as mustard greens.

"HARDEN OFF" TOMATO PLANTS

All 'spindling' tomato plants will grow on crowded excessive water. Plants of this type are too tender to transplant directly from hotbed to garden. Such plants should be 'harden off.'

"Sandetorms have made it impossible for me to set out my tomato plants when they are large enough. Now I have 'Spindling tomato plants' Before transplanting I am 'harden off' these plants by watering them just enough to prevent serious wilting, and also increasing the ventilation for about eight to ten days before transplanting," reports Mr. O. W. Lowrance, cooperator of the Jayton H. D. Club.

To have hardy tomato plants with a good rooting system it is better to remove plants from hotbed to cold frame when the second set of true leaves appear then transplant to garden when they are of size.

"Tender greens, New Zealand spinach and Swiss chard are mapped out on my leafy vegetable garden territory for summer leafy vegetables," says Renello Fuller, garden demonstrator of the Clairemont 4-H club.

"Try soaking the new Zealand spinach seed over night before planting and you will find that they come up much better. When the spinach has attained a growth of about 5 inches in height thin it to at least ten inches apart in the row. Crowded spinach does not produce well," she adds.

These vegetables are our hot weather vegetables in the leafy variety and to plant them about the first of May is not too late. Tender greens can be planted up until about the middle of June They do not seed as rapidly as mustard greens.
