Amid Baseball and Church, Cross Plains Overcomes, to Recover-and Rebuild

On Easter, Methodist preacher devastated in Cross Plains, James Senkel, says that through "faith, we have a future".

Meanwhile, those who had their homes also leveled by the disaster of the firestorm on December 27th and who have somewhat recovered via help given by some-such as Baptist youth minister Kevin Cassidy and eg. a little tractor- David and Bethany Parker, and their children, are planning to celebrate their overcoming way. For example, the Parkers are planning to "invite everyone who helped, for an open house." Meanwhile they want their house finished by Aug. 3, their fifteenth wedding anniversary, pretty quick recovery huh?

Also church groups and other volunteers across Texas, New Mexico, and Oklahoma have assisted in rebuilding homes and structures. Volunteers are coordinated and directed by City Manager Debbie Gosnell and are scheduled through September. In addition monetary donations and volunteer work have poured into Cross Plains.

One-hundred and sixteen homes were destroyed by the fires leaving hundreds homeless.

Truly at Easter the city has come together and "come back to life."

According to Ronnie White the First Baptist Church pastor, "From the death of winter and of the fire, we see so much new life," White said. "The fields once blackened by fire are now beautifully green with new life, which symbolizes to us a new beginning." According to esti-

mates the Cost of rebuilding a home is \$75 to \$85 per square foot, and with many residents trying to cut "labor costs, which make up about half of the total cost" Gosnell said that Cross Plains is also short on volunteer labor from plumbers, electricians and those who work in the air conditioning and heating businesses.

With currently about 10 homes under construction and four in the "planning stages" in Cross Plains, Seven families have put in mobile or modular homes rather than build "from the ground up".

Seven mobile homes and two travel trailers have been delivered by FEMA for fire damaged residents, according to Gosnell.

The city will be paid 75/25 in matching funds to remove debris from the disaster, which has been declared so by FEMA as of last Monday, ie., a debris removal disaster who made the funds available.

Donations to match the government's 75 percent portion will be needed and appreciated-"our 25 percent match [will be supplemented by donations which] would be greatly appreciated, according to the City Manager.

To date about \$145,000 has been spent by the city on the clean up, said Gosnell.

State Regulates Placement of Campaign Signs Along Highways

Texans take pride in their beautiful state, especially during the spring when everyone can enjoy the beautiful wildflowers that grow along the highway rights of way. However, during campaign season, the landscape blooms with a special kind of flower * the political sign.

Texas Department of Transportation officials want to make sure citizens and candidates are aware of the laws regulating their placement on state highway right of way.

Under Texas law, it is a class C misdemeanor to place any sign on state highway right of way. The penalty for violating this law is a fine of up to \$500 per sign.

It is legal to place a campaign sign on private property adjacent to state highways with landowners' permission.

Restrictions require that signs be constructed of lightweight material and limited to 50 square feet in size. Signs may be placed as early as 90 days prior to an election and must be removed within 10 days after an election.

TxDOT officials say the laws are intended to reduce clutter along highways so that official traffic control signs and vehicles approaching intersections are clearly visible for the safety of all the traveling public.

According to Mary Beth Kilgore, Abilene District public information officer, signs in the public right of way include posting signs on trees, telephone poles, traffic signs, and other objects on

the right of way.

"TxDOT's regulatory authority allows the immediate removal of a sign placed on state highway right of way without prior notice, if the sign is not authorized by state law or approved by the department. Signs posing potential safety hazards will be removed as soon as possible by TxDOT employees, a county sheriff or a constable, depending on jurisdiction," Kilgore said.

If you have questions regarding placement of political signs in Callahan County, call TxDOT's Callahan County maintenance section at 325/854-1353, or Kristy Gardner, the Abilene District's highway beautification coordinator, at 325/676-6831. Texas is subject to the Federal Highway Beautification Act of 1965. Under the federal law, if the state fails to control signage visible from interstate and other federally-funded highways, Texas may be subject to sanctions of up to 10 percent of its federal transportation construction funds.

Legislative Issues Focus Of Media Visit With Senator Fraser

Everyone agreed that Tuesday's visit by Texas State Senator Troy Fraser, (R-Horseshoe Bay) was necessary but too brief.

It would have taken hours to cover every aspect of the topics touched on, which included a sweeping telecommunications bill authored by Senator Fraser, the upcoming property tax relief special session, water rights, and others.

Senator Fraser and staff members Janice McCoy, Chief of Staff, (Capitol Office), Daniel Womack, Legislative Assistant (Capitol Office), and Blake Woodall, District Office Coordinator (Abilene Office) were making

comprehensive tours of his 21 county Senate District (District 24), he said, trying to visit four to five counties a day.

Eastland, Callahan, Erath, Comanche, and Taylor are among the counties of District 24.

Earlier on Tuesday, the Senator met with Eastland community leaders.

He and his staff traveled on to Stephenville after speaking with H. V. O'Brien, and staff members Viola Payne and Margaret Hetrick.

Local media representative listened with interest as Senator Fraser spoke about Senate Bill 5, the telecommunications bill he authored, which passed last year.

SB 5 implements rules to allow new competitors into the video and cable business, and expands opportunities for Texans to get high speed Internet over their existing power lines.

"This bill creates a fair and balanced approach to creating additional competition in all aspects of the communications industry. This is a huge step forward for the Texas consumer and will bring in billions of dollars and thousands of jobs to the state," Fraser said.

Broadband over power lines (BPL) is a new

Thursday, April 20, 2006 emerging technology, he further explained, which delivers Internet connections just like cable and DSL but through existing electric outlets.

"BPL gives consumers greater choices by offering them the opportunity to have phone service over the Internet via the power lines," Fraser continued. "This new technology will increase competition while encouraging new competitors to enter the marketplace, and will help drive down costs while allowing all customers, including those in hard-to-serve rural Texas, more choices. What this means is that Eastland would have the same level of Broadband Internet as Dallas."

Senator Fraser said that Ft. Hood is now being made a BPL 'hot spot', which will give every individual on base High Speed Internet, simply by plugging in to an existing electric outlet.

Texas SB 5 is also becoming a national model for telecommunications legislation, Fraser added.

The Idle American

Commentary By Dr. Don Newbury

If You Find It, He Will Come
Eyes twinkling and scooting about in his power-driven wheelchair with the confidence of a race car driver, 89-year-old Virgil Love was still laughing about the Easter egg hunt. It occurred the day before at Fort Worth's Bethesda Gardens Assisted-Living Center.

"The women think they pull a fast one on us, but we know how they do," he cackled. "They sneak out several hours before the hunt to locate the eggs. Then, when it's time for the real hunt, they brag to the heavens about finding more eggs than the men. So what? All they win are bragging rights and a few tiny candy bars."

Twice widowed, the long-time General Dynamics employee recalls a boatload of Easter egg hunts, and nearly that many eggs. Dwarfing such memories, however, are thoughts of a different kind of hunt 77 years ago. It stretched into hours and across several months, but the single prize he sought was not to be found.

Oh how he wanted to find that special baseball, the one handed to him by Babe Ruth himself. It was signed by the Bambino and another baseball immortal, Lou Gehrig. Virgil had hoped to keep it all his life. Instead, he owned it for only two weeks, and what happened was enough to make a child divorce his mother!...

To better explain this piece, flip back the calendar to 1925. Mr. and Mrs. Virgil J. Love, Sr., are farmers near Hillsboro, TX. They have six children, three of whom are outstanding baseball players. One, Ruel Reece Love, Sr., wows the sports world, pitching for Austin College before professional play with the Oklahoma City Indians and Atlanta Crackers.

In 1925, he signs with the New York Yankees, and all is right with his world—for a while. Sadly, during that first season with the Yankees, Ruel's life changes with one pitch in batting practice. Babe Ruth hits a screaming liner that decimates the pitcher's ankle. The promising athlete's major league career is over; he returns to Texas. He pitches some for the Dallas Eagles in the Texas League, then later designs and manages golf courses, including Woodhaven in Fort Worth.

Now, jump to 1929. There was mighty big news in Waco, TX, that year. The vaunted Yankees would visit for an exhibition game with the Waco Cubs of the Texas League. (Rex, another of the Love siblings, was on the Waco team.)

The elder Love was invited to come to Waco to meet Babe Ruth. Virgil Jr. went along, too, and the 12-year-old could hardly wait to meet the baseball star and take his first elevator ride. It was in the ALICO building, a 22-story structure erected in 1910 and for many years the tallest structure west of the Mississippi River.

"I feared for my life," Virgil confessed. "I clung to my dad's leg on the elevator, and when we got off, I wasn't sure how we'd get back down. For all I knew, we'd take the stairs, or maybe the fire escape."

The Yankees were lodged at the Raleigh Hotel. The Loves, Sr. and Jr., were welcomed to the Babe's room. Early on, Ruth was serious as he apologized for what he called "stopping the career of one of the best pitchers that ever came up to us."

Then, he turned to young Virgil. "He had a box of new baseballs wrapped in tissue, and tossed several to me," Virgil remembers. He wrote "Lots of Love to Little Love," and signed it 'Babe Ruth.' Then, he yelled for Gehrig to come in from the next room.

"Lou was all business," Virgil said. "He shook hands with me while reading what Babe had written on the ball. He drew an arrow around it, scrawling 'Me, too' .Lou Gehrig."

Virgil clung to the ball all the way home, where he asked his trusted mother to put it away for safe-keeping. Two weeks passed before he told her he'd like to see it. His mom choked up a bit, explaining that the day before, several kids playing baseball in the backyard, lost their only ball. It was no real loss, this depression-era ball with cover long gone and strings hanging from the core.

Virgil Jr. went along, too, and the 12-year-old could hardly wait to meet the baseball star and take his first elevator ride. It was in the ALICO building, a 22-story structure erected in 1910 and for many years the tallest structure west of the Mississippi River.

Who knows what happened? Some claimed it was lost in the weeds. Virgil tromped the area for hours until pitch darkness, a fruitless search continued for several months. Of course this is better remembered than his Easter egg hunts!

Maybe someone out there found it and would like it returned to its rightful owner. If you found it, he will come, even if it means rolling a "fer piece" in his wheelchair. He's the only member of the family still living and would love to have it back.

*Okay, for those who HAVE to know, the Yankees won, 13-3.

Emergency Conservation Program Funding

WASHINGTON, March 15, 2006-Agriculture Deputy Secretary Chuck Conner today announced that UDFA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) will allocate close to \$20.1 million in Emergency Conservation Program (ECP) funding to 26 states affected by Natural Disasters.

"The Emergency Conservation Program is an important tool for farmers and ranchers to rehabilitate and strengthen environmental stewardship of their lands," said Conner. "These funds will help farmers and ranchers rehabilitate farmland damaged by floods, drought, wildfires and other natural disasters in recent years."

E.C.P. gives producers resources to remove debris from farmland, restore structures, provide water for livestock in drought situations and grade and shape farmland damaged by a natural disaster. Locally-elected F.S.A. county committees implement ECP for all disasters other than drought, which is done by FSA's national office. Eligible producers receive cost-share assistance of up to 75 percent of the cost of approved practices, as determined by F.S.A. county committees. The \$20.1 million in E.C.P. funds allocated today are from unused funds from various states.

Among the 26 states receiving the funding announced today are Texas and Oklahoma, which are continuing to face drought and severe wildfire conditions. Texas will receive more than \$3.9 million, while Oklahoma will receive \$2.7 million. F.S.A. is allocating \$20,142,400 in E.C.P. funds to 26 states including \$1,916,800 in drought disaster funds in Texas.

Producers can contact their local F.S.A. office regarding E.C.P. sign-up periods, which are set by the county F.S.A. committees. For a producers' land to be eligible, the disaster must create new conservation problems that, if left untreated, would impair or endanger the land and affect its productive capacity. Conservation problems that existed before the applicable disasters are not eligible for E.C.P. assistance.

Emergency Farm Fire Loan Applications Being Accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans caused by extreme wildfire threat that occurred on December 1, 2005, and continuing, are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) office located in Anson, Richard G. Young said.

"Callahan is one of 9 primary counties in Texas recently named by the President of the United States eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from extreme wildfire threat that occurred on December 1, 2005, and continuing."

Richard G. Young said, "Farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 100% of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue the agricultural business, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 3.75 percent."

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for

a FSA emergency loan," Richard G. Young said. Farmers participating in the Federal Crop Insurance program will have a figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under the emergency designation will be accepted until September 11, 2006 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Richard G. Young said.

FSA is a credit agency of the United States Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who meet U.S. citizen requirements and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizenship requirements are met by holding a majority interest.

The FSA office in Anson is open from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday - Friday.

Work Begins on Wind Turbines in Shackelford/ Callahan County and Clyde I.S.D.

Although, the main activity for consists of a future from 340 wind turbines to be located inside Shackelford County, approximately 60 of the turbines are slated for construction in Callahan County. Since December 2005, the Mesquite Wind Farm, now known as the Lone Star Wind Farm, the first phase of an over-all three-phase overall project being overseen by RES-America will probably be finished by the end of 2006. This project alone is estimated to increase the school district's property values from \$151 million by at least \$285 million. A second phase is reported to allow increasing the total projected tax valuation from \$285 million to \$570 million. (Reports from the Clyde Journal). The Clyde C.I.S.D. district includes the parts of Shackelford and all of Callahan County where the project is under construction. The land owners involved in the initial phase of this project are the Guy, Davis, Hughes and Arbuckle Ranches.

The R.E.S.-America just last year recommended increasing the proposal to an around 200 to 400 turbines which will be located in southwest Shackelford County and northwest Callahan County. Horizon Wind Energy is the owner of the Lone Star Wind Farm project and Larry Mills is the engineer who is coordinating all the Construction and Project Manager for Horizon. Last week Mills said "We're not in full swing yet," however around 60 people are involved in the project already, with plans to bring brought in as work progresses through the phases.

He states the 32 of the wind turbines are to be constructed on the east side St. Hwy 351 with the final seven to be located on Louis Bob Davis' property, around the hub of the present activity of construction.

The other 68 towers are to be located west of Highway 351 from the easternmost present activity, in an east west line from south to the Hamby area, in other words-west of Hwy 351.

Of these-some 100 turbines are located in the Clyde school district, where the first concrete foundations for the wind turbines north of Hamby in Shackelford County were poured two Thursday's ago, March 30.

Of the wind turbines themselves are not be lowered this summer, the yearlong project will be completed before 2006.

The initial phase being completed consists of 100 even being built from just north of the Hamby area to within a few miles of "Nine Mile Hill" south of Albany.*With propeller blades attached their height will be a formidable 400 feet.
