5000 People Guests Of Lee Harrison at Spur Barbecue Honoring Gov., R. R. Com., and State Senator.

Yesterday was grand and glorious day for thousands of people who met in Spur as the guests of Lee J. Harrison, formerly of Kent County, but now one of the most successful independent oil operators in Texas, who makes his home at Big Spring.

Besides the folks of this section there were many guests from other parts of the state, chief of whom were Governor James V. Allred, Earnest O. Thompson, chairman of the Railroad Commission, Senator G. H. Nelson of this the 30th Senatorial District, representatives from Amarillo and Lubbock Newspapers, and many other distinguished guests from near and far.

Barbecue dinner was served to everyone beginning at 11:30. After all were fed the great crowd went to the Charles A. Jones Memorial Stadium where after several preliminary talks were made, Senator Nelson was introduced to the crowd and delivered one of the best and most enlightening addresses we have heard in years. The Senator is quite an orator and a deep student of the needs of Texas in a legislative way, and his address which lasted near an hour apparently met with the approval of a great majority of those who heard him.

Senator Nelson's address was followed by an address by Railway Commissioner Thompson. The Commissioner is one of the most interesting speakers we have ever listened to. He knows his work and knows how to explain it and does not hesitate to talk just why being a Rail Road Commissioner is a man's job. His speech was with him from start to finish and proved it by their cheering.

Governor Allred arrived a little late, but it could not be avoided, as he had flown from Dallas to Paducah and delivered an address there at the Old Settlers Centennial Celebration, and from Paducah on to Spur, and both flights had to dodge rain storms and fly slow at times on account of the showers.

But the Governor's being late did not interfere with the crowd enjoying themselves. And there were Three Gentlemen present from Amarillo who were entertainers of extraordinary ability and the songs they sang which ranged from Negro spirituals to Cowboy Ballads kept folks interested and happy.

When the Governor arrived he was greeted with "The Eyes of Texas Are Upon You" led by the gentlemen from Amarillo and joined in by the entire gathering. He was immediately escorted to the speakers platform and presented with two lovely baskets of flowers and then introduced to the crowd by District Attorney Chapman. The Governor was in a happy frame of mind and delivered an address that seemed to please everyone. He explained the financial situation of the State, the Old Age Assistance law of the state and some other things a lot of folks have been worrying about. At the close of his address he was asked to pitch out the first ball for the boys who were lined up to play a game of Soft Ball, and he did so with much pleasure. From Spur he took off to Floydada where he was billed for an address at night. All the speakers seemed to be in the best of good health and spirits. They seemed to feel certain that Texas was leading the nation back to healthful prosperity and all true Texans should take the work planned by the Fathers of Texas 100 years ago and drive on to the glorious future that awaits this young state.

Of course there were many other things that took place during the day of enjoyment but they were of minor importance. The Legion Boys had charge of the feed and they did a good job and no mistake about it. Kent County Winner In Centennial Country Home Contest

The new home of Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Buckelew was adjudged the winner of the Kent County Centennial Country Home Contest by the local Home Demonstration and County Agent's and will be judged by the District Agent's within the near future for prizes within the district. This contest is being held all over the entire State of Texas.

The Buckelew family moved to Kent County eleven years ago and settled on the place where they now live. Eight years ago Mr. Buckelew terraced his land, a fact which he believes has had a very important bearing on the success of his farming operations. For ten years they lived in a small three room house and carried water from a cistern located outside of the house for all domestic uses. The lawn had six trees but no grass. A new house was built last October. It consist of five good sized rooms, a bath and a hall. It has a built in kitchen cabinet and sink. It is equipped with running water. It has three large clothes closets and two linen closets. There are three outside entrances to the house. There is a nice cistern inside the house. The lawn has seven trees and a number of shrubs. A substantial sheet iron poultry house is located near the house.

Mr. Buckelew farms this place with a tractor, and one team of mules. He and Mrs. Buckelew have fifteen cows four hogs, and about two hundred white leghorn chickens which furnish them with ample dairy, meat, and poultry products for home use. They have approximately twenty tons of maize stored in the barn and ten thousand bundles of feed stacked near by. They killed four hogs this year and have about fifty gallons of lard left from last year. They canned fifty quarts of meat and approximately four hundred cans of fruit and vegetables last year.

Extend Time For Final Sign Up of Work Sheets

The State Committee has extended the final date for signing up work sheets under the soil conservation program to June 10.

Importance of signing up work sheets should not be overlooked. The State Committee and State Agricultural Council passed by resolution urging all farmers to sign up work sheets. Uncontrollable weather conditions and crop losses alone make such a procedure advisable. Many growers are actually in compliance and eligible for grants who are not aware of the fact.

All communities are urged to make a final drive for a complete sign up as June 10th is the last day and there will be no further extension of time.

Rain and More Rain

Most every day this week we have received rain. Sunday, Monday, and Tuesday good rains fell in different parts of the county. The ground is filled with water and the farmers are going to have a great time in keeping the weeds and grasses under control. It is going to be a great corn year for all those who planted corn. Crops that managed to get up and growing between rains are doing well. Many have had to plant over but none we have talked to are complaining. Cotton planted even in the first week of June has plenty of time to make a bale to the acre and so long as the frogs sing we feel certain bumper crops are to be counted on. And did you ever see the pastures looking better? The Spring round ups are underway and cattlemen are more than pleased with their calf crops and the condition of their herds.

Muddy Streets

Yes, the streets are muddy, and in places almost impassable. We would like to see them all graded and taken out of the mud and made good like city streets should be. But how can we do this when we only have a few dollars in the street fund. Warn out the street hands, some say. That's fine but how much good could street hands do with hoe and shovel? Talk is cheap but it takes money to build streets the same as it does to buy whiskey. If the property owners will supply the city officials with the money, we guarantee to have the streets worked over and made passable for most all kinds of weather.

DAILY SHOWERS

It seems that each day is determined to not be out done by the day before in so far as the rain goes. Thursday being no exception to the rule of the weather and Jayton and the territory immediately surrounding the town received another half inch. This will bring the total for this place for the month up to at least a foot of rain in this land of so called drouths. This is some rain fall for the month of May. The Rain God was good to the Spur folks on this date as in that town just the very highest sprinkle fell.

Vernon Texas, May 27 — T. L. Rouse 41, editor and business manager of the Vernon Times, a weekly newspaper, died in the local hospital at 4:30 p. m. today about three and one-half hours after suffering a stroke while operating a linotype machine at his place of business.

Physician ascribed his death to cerebral embolism, or blood clot. Shortly after falling from the chair in front of the machine he was operating, he was discovered in an unconscious condition by L. F. Blair, a printer of the Times force. Blair called an ambulance and Mr. Rouse was taken to the hospital. He died shortly after reaching there.

Thompson Opens Race At Big Rally At Alvord

Alvord, May 27 — A campaign opening that promises to rank in size and enthusiasm with ceremonies usually attendant upon the opening address of an extremely popular governor or United States Senator for re-election is in prospect here Saturday when Earnest O. Thompson starts his campaign for re-election to the State Railroad Commission.

Attendance of between 5,000 and 6,000 people at the opening of Thompson's campaign in Alvord, his birthplace, is freely predicted.

For the thousands who will attend the event, friends of Thompson have planned a free barbecue at noon, and to prepare it they have secured Texas "Barbecue King," John Snyder, of Amarillo. So famous is Mr. Snyder for his barbecue that he was taken to Washington several years ago to prepare a barbecue in celebration of the election of Bascom Timmons. Famous newspaper writer from Amarillo, as president of the National Press Club.

Ten or a dozen beebes, will be barbecued for the Saturday rally.

Music all day by bands from Amarillo, Memphis, Wichita Falls, and Denton is assured, while Thompson's opening speech at 3 p. m. is expected to draw people from every section of the state.

Death Given One In Fatal Beating of Aged Spinister

Haakell, Texas, May 21. — Judge Dennis P. Ratliff granted a change of venue Thursday in the slaying trial of C. Matura, charged jointly in the death of Miss Rebecca Coursey, 78, of O'Brien, who was beaten fatally two weeks ago.

The action was taken after Clarence Abston, the other defendant in the case, had been given the death sentence by a jury, the first such punishment to be imposed in Haakell County.

Matura's case was transferred to Aspermont, Stonewall County, and set for trial June 1.

The two men were arrested after Miss Coursey was found lying in a pool of blood in the house where she had lived twenty-five years, selling butter and eggs. She lived several days after the alleged beating but was never sufficiently conscious to name her assailants.

Matura was the chief witness against Abston.

FUL RUBBER TILES AND CONDITIONING MAKE FOR COMFORT OF FORD EXPO VISITORS

A cool, comfortable stroll is assured the millions of persons who will view the Ford Exposition Building during the Texas Centennial which opens in Dallas, June 6. The walk through the building is to be made of restful rubber tiles, 27,000 square feet of it.

No matter what the temperature may be outside, the interior of the Ford building, equipped with the most modern ventilating and humidity system, will provide cool, fresh air. Temperature inside will be maintained at 10 degrees to 15 degrees lower than the outdoors, as prescribed by health authorities. The difference between inside and outside temperature is the maximum to which visitors can be subjected without discomfort.

Two machines, with a total of 10 tons refrigeration, will shoot fumes of cool air down from the roof where it circulates through tiled water coils. The air is returned through floor ventilators. The conditioning system was installed at a cost of approximately \$125,000.

Visitors will find numerous drink-water coolers conveniently placed in the building. Also there will be first aid and rest rooms for all. A graduate nurse will be on duty in the building is open and a physician will be instantly available.

Feminine guests were especially considered in several arrangement features. A spacious court boasts spreading shading trees and shrubbery. Easy chairs and benches are so arranged that the visitors may face a large band shell. Beyond this lies a lazy blue lagoon. "Roads of the Southwest," a Ford feature, wind around the water course, all within sight of the court.

Side walls and ceilings of the structure have been treated with acoustical effects to tone down noise. It is believed by Ford officials that 6,000 persons may view exhibits in the building at one time without sacrificing any degree of comfort. Information clerks will be located at the entrance. They will be qualified to answer all questions pertaining to Ford exhibits and also direct visitors concerning other exposition buildings and exhibitors.

At the request of the business men of Jayton and the ladies who are interested in the public square and try to keep it looking reasonably well, we are asking folks to not pasture or tie their milk cows on the square for it does not look well to the traveling public and those who would like to stop in the shade of the trees for a rest. — City Commission.

In the first part of one the clubs will have achievement day to display the demonstrators bedroom and the work of the club to the county.

The following girls are serving as bedroom demonstrators this year: Juanita Ybarra, Harmony, Jo Edd Wade, Clairemont, Margaret Ship, Girard Club No. 1, and Polly Thompson of Girard Club No. 2.

COTTON CARDED FOR LIGHT WEIGHT COMFORT

Two pounds of cotton given her by her grandmother, were corded by Mildred Osman, cooperator in the Clairemont 4-H Club to use in a light weight comfort.

The cotton was covered with cheese cloth at a cost of thirty five cents, and tacked with twine string that she had on hand. Mildred bought enough of good grade of lavender broadcloth for one dollar to cover the comfort, and thread to tack the comfort for nine cents.

For a total cost of one dollar and forty-four cents, Mildred has a comfort that is light and fluffy, but warm. The air spaces in the loose cotton will hold more warmth and make a warmer cover than a closely quilted cover. The comfort is tacked about every four inches. This keeps the cotton from packing so closely together when it is washed.

PROPER CLOTHES STORAGE PROVIDED FOR FIVE CENTS

"Mother built this closet with a small cost of five cents for tacks," Margaret Ship, bedroom demonstrator because she thought it would take so much money to fix up the room as she would like, but her mo-

ther got and with scrap lumber built the frame of the closet (which extends to the ceiling. Strong cardboard was nailed to the frame to form the sides. A deep shelf with a door in the upper part of the closet provides space for extra quilts and blankets. The main part of the closet is provided with a rod for hanging clothes, and above this rod there is a shelf with stands for hats. White paint left from previous painting was used to give the inside of the closet a light finish. The Outside of the closet and the walls of the bedroom will be kalsomined a cream color.
