Mr. and Mrs. R. V. Black have an unusual and attractive yard.

The first thing that catches one's eye as they enter the yard, is two pecan trees surrounded by white wrought iron fences. The mail box rests on a stand of wrought iron of the same pattern as that of the fences.

To the left of the walk stands two large iron wheels, connected by an axle, with a raised arm that supports one large iron pot and two small bean pots of iron. Cactus of several kinds are growing in the pots. In the center of the raised arm is a large iron bell, flanked on either side by sad irons. Directly above the bell hangs the name plate of the Blacks.

Two pot-bellied stoves, near the porch, holds iron tea pots. Both small and large iron pots parade across the front of the house. Plants of many different flowers are growing in the pots. Near the porch, a statue of a monk stands as if in meditation.

When the flowers come into full bloom the yard will really be attractive, even without blossoms, the scene, created by Mr. Black with his pots of plants, is eye catching.

Mrs. S. G. Cobb, Mrs. Earl Atkinson, Mrs. Paul Kuentler and I went with Mrs. R. C. Couch Sr. to Stamford to see their Garden show. As we went up the steps of the library where the show was held, we

were greeted by a realistic farm scene... A mesquite tree towered over a scarecrow made from straw and dressed in old clothes. An owl and a crow sat on bales of hay at the feet of the scarecrow. A bale of hay, with an arrangement of yellow irises in an old copper cowbell, acted as a table from which visitors were registered. Theme of the show was "Big Country Roundup."

The Junior Gardeners showed great talent in their entries. Two arrangements especially appealed to me... The Subject Was... Little Stray.

One arrangement was a lonely Florida rose partially hidden in a bed of lacy Schott leaves. I could almost see the little doggie hiding until some cowboy took the wanderer back to the herd. The other arrangement was of one lonely rose sitting bravely in a dead tree.

Mrs. James Ward of distinction arranged a display of daisies, gerberas and twisted stalks of the show. Stanford won the judges division. The show was in excellent condition and the blossoms were in full.

Sign-Up For Medicare Before Age 65 Month

Persons who will reach age 65 in the next three months are reminded to sign up for Medicare before the age 65 month by Social Security.

"Although the law provides a seven-month period," states R. R. Tuley, Jr., district manager of the Abilene Social Security Office, "only those who sign up in the three month period ahead of age 65 have their doctor bill insurance part of Medicare effective with the first day of that age 65 month."

"Signing up in the month 65 is reached makes protection effective the first day of the following month. Signing up in the three months after reaching age 65 delays the protection for up to two months after enrollment," he added.

A representative of the Abilene office of the Social Security Administration will be in Haskell on every Thursday at the City Hall Annex at 10:00 a. m. or, such sign-up action may be taken in the Abilene office, located in the post office building, from 9:50 on Mondays through Fridays, with extra open hours from 5 p. m. to 8 p. m. every Tuesday.
