

Low-acid vegetables include asparagus, beets, carrots, corn, greens sweet potatoes, beans and peas. The USDA research has shown that processing time for these vegetables can be generally lowered, which will give the housewife better-flavored canned goods with better texture, and still render the vegetables safe from bacteria that cause food spoilage.

Quoting an example, Miss Jones says that a pint of greens was formerly processed 95 minutes. She now tells housewives to process the pint of greens only 45 minutes, to conform with the now USDA recommendations. Another big change is on sweet potatoes. Processing time for a pint of yams has been cut down from 95 to 55 minutes.

Extension Circular 223, "Can Vegetables in a Pressure Canner", has been revised to give the new processing times. Miss Jones advises homemakers to ask their local county home demonstration agents for a copy of the folder.

Pills Rank With Disease As Death Dealers, Doctors Hear

Chicago. - Medicine in the near future is going to change its teachings and include economics and sociology so doctors can better keep people from getting sick.

This prediction was made to the American College of Surgeons Forcasts Drop Tuesday by Dr. Wilson G. Smillie, professor of public health and preventive medicine, Cornell University Medical College, New York

He explained that the causes of death are rapidly changing. And he declared that medicine, pills and drugs are now substituting for tuberculosis, pneumonia and the great infections which for thousands

of years were man's worst enemies. The new diseases, he said, are degenerative, those of aging, like hearts and arteries, and also the chronic diseases, which do not kill but, which for no apparent good reason keeps millions of people constantly ailing. This latter class of disease, he said, affects mostly men and women in their 30's and 40's. He said the amount of chronic disease is astonishing.

The doctor of the future, he said, will consider his patient's home life, well people as the sick. College Station, - A call to custom combine operators to be ready for the 1947 wheat harvest is being average and at present is teaching District Superintendency to accept made by the Texas A, and M. College Extension Service.

J. B. Kidd, farm labor field assistant in charge of the Extension wheat harvest program, announces that more "outside combines will be reader, but checks the work for needed this year than ever before". Texas wheat and small grain acreage is eight per cent larger than the record acreage of 1946.

"The wheat crop is in better condition at this time of the year than in many seasons", says Kidd. "The subsoil moisture is good and Texas County agricultural agents report 98 per cent of the wheat in good condition, . the other two per cent in fair condition. Some green bug damage is reported but the present prospects are for a bumper Texas wheat crop".

Kidd also urges combine operators to plan to bring their trucks to the harvest Independent truckers. not attached to combine outfits, may be needed, he says, and harvest labor of all types will be in great demand if the crop develops as !!

Washington. - Secretary of Agiculture Clinton P. Anderson said Monday that the price of wheat may drop to \$2 a bushel when the new crop starts moving to market this summer.

He made his prediction before the House Agriculture Committee. He urged that Congress set up some kind of a long-range surplus food distribution program - prehaps an allotment plan-to siphon off surpluses during emergency periods. NAVAL RESERVISTS

Washington, April 24 - President Truman satd today that enlistment of an adequate number of Naval Reservists will make the peace of the Nation and the world more secure as he focused attention on Naval Reserve Week, May 18 to 25, in a statement which wished the reserve force "every success in its mission which is so vital to the future of this nation."

Pointing to the "distinguished record of the Navy throughout 172 years of service," the President said that "We are especially proud that in the two mots recent wars this Navy maintained its magnificent standards when predominatly composed of men and women who learned their naval duties under the stress of an emergency already existing." Those Navy veterans, he said, form the nucleus of the trained Naval Reserve.

To their ranks, he added, "we must add others in order that our peacetime Naval Reserve may be maintained a high efficiency and adequate strength." The reserve week will constitute a special enrollment effort, Mr. Truman said.

Not alone for one short moment in which, stunned and dazed, he could give up life, hardly aware of its relinquishment, but through days of deadly languor, through weeks of agony that were not less agony because silently borne, with clear sight and calm effective against houseflies. courage he looked into his open

What blight and ruin met his anguished eyes, whose lips may tell-what brilliant, broken plans, what baffled, high ambitions, what bit- say. ter rending of sweet household ties! behind him a proud, expectant nation, a great host of sustaining friends, a cherished and happy mother, wearing the full, rich honors of her early toil and tears; the wife of his youth, whose whole life lay in his; the little boys not yet emerged from childhood's day of frolic the fair young daughter; the sturdy panionship, claiming every day an every day rewarding a father's lov and care; and in his heart the eager rejoicing power to meet all demands. And his soul was not shake:

His countrymen were thrilled with instant, profound and universal sympathy. Masterful in his mortal weakness, he became the center of a nation's love, enshrined in the prayers of a world. But all the love and all the sympathy could not share with his suffering He trod the wine-press alone. With unfaltering front, he faced death. With unfailing tenderness, he took leave of life. 
