



But stores charging the same 'nominal" rates can and do levy significantly different references are concealed in their various methods of arriving at the monthly balance on which credit is levied.

Some stores apply their credit charge to the opening balance on your bill before deducting any payments you have made on credits for merchandise reduring the month. On \$200 opening balance, with payments of \$100 and a monthly charge of 1½ percent, the charge would be \$3, or an annual rate charge of 36 percent. On the other hand, some stores deduct all payments and credits and charge only for the amount of money you actually owe on the previous month's balance, Thus, an opening bal-ance of \$200, with \$100 payments and a monthly rate of 112 percent, would result in a charge of \$1.50 or an annual rate of finance charge of 18

percent Recognizing how the billing methods can distort "nominal" percentage rates, the law will require any revolving creditor who does not use the last method, to disclose his catalogue initial contract and bills that "the balance is determined without first deducting all

credits during the period." Starting July 1, 1969, persons who sign home-improvement contracts or any retail installment scheme involving a lien on one's residential property, will have the right for the next three business days to cancel the agreement without penalty Any down-payment must be fully refunded. After receiving a cancellation notice, the seller must come for his merchandise within 10 days or forfeit all claim to it.
