Swing Of Southwest Farm Markets

(USDA)- Lower prices for poultry, hogs and some other livestock marred otherwise steady to strong southwest farm markets last week, according to the Production and Marketing Administration, U. S. Department of Agricuture.

Carlot movement of tomatoes and eppers from the Lower Rio Grande Valley. picked up sharply. Tomatoes sold strong at \$6 to \$6.50 per lug box of U. S. No. 1 green wrapped 6 by 6 and larger sizes. Peppers moved slowly at barely steady prices of mostly \$3 to \$3.25 per h thel basket of 216 inch minimum No. 1's. Colorado onions and otatoe, and Louisiana sweet potatoes strengthened some. Unsettlad conditions in the wheat

market during the past week left prices a little higher in the Southwest. Feed grains stregthened too, as continued active demand for corn found only moderate offerings from the new crop. No. 1 hard wheat closed Friday at \$3.07, No. 2 white corn around \$3.10, yellow corn \$2.66, Superintendent Hinds No. 2 white oats \$1.31, and No. 2 milo \$3.75 in bulk carlots at Texas common points.

Rice held steady the past week, with fairly active domestic and foreign demand. Southwest feed prices wed mixed trends but a weaker tone prevailed. Hay continued about unchanged. Current peanut haulings ved largely to government warees, while a few went to shellers t support prices. Interesting Notes From Early Edition Of **Clairemont** Paper

A very interesting copy of "The Weekly Western Courier" has been took an estimated \$300.00. Jayton's found by A. E. Richards, and H. L. Bass, publishers of the Aspermont Star.

This copy of the Weekly Western Courier, Volume 1, No. 24 is datelined "Clairemont, Texas, Saturday, September 2, 1893." It lists J. N. Hutchison as the editor, and carries this slogan right under the name of the paper "Earnestly supporting right, fearlessly condemning wrong.

Half of the front page is devoted advertisements from Clairemont, Colorado City, Snyder, and Abilene merchants. The first column is devoted to editorial comment, and two columns is given to headline news.

The two inside pages is what is known as "patent pages" containing a serial story, feature items, and such like, which the editor got from a syndicate already printed. And on the back page, are a large number of patent medicine advertisements d personal items.

The editor of the Western Courier s very plain spoken. On the subject of national politics, he comes up with this bit of statistics. "The defeat of the Bland silver bill was a decided victory for the Republicans, inasmuch as 10 more Republicans voted against it than democrats voted for it. True, 6 more democrats than Republicans opposed it, but 86 more Democrats than Republicans favored it. Populists voted for it." From a Chamber of Commerce
