## Pre-Kindergarten and Kindergarten Registration at Baird Elementary School

Baird Elementary School will hold a Pre-Kindergarten and Kindergarten registration for the 2006-2007 school year beginning on Thursday, August 3, and ending on Friday, August 4th. The registration will be held at the Baird I.S.D. Cafeteria from 8:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. each day.

### Pre-Kindergarten:

The Baird I.S.D. Pre-Kindergarten program will operate on a half-day basis during the 2006-07 school year. Students will be enrolled in an A.M. group (7:45-11:30 A.M. or a P.M. group (10:45-2:30 P.M.) All Pre-K students will be served lunch in the school cafeteria from 10:45-11:30 A.M. MORE INFORMATION ON THE HALF-DAY SCHEDULE WILL BE PROVIDED AT THE TIME OF REGISTRATION.

According to Texas State Law, a child is eligible for enrollment in Pre-Kindergarten if the child is 4 years of age as of September 1, 2006, and is 1) unable to speak and comprehend the English language; 2) educationally disadvantaged; 3) homeless; or 4) identified with special needs. In order to qualify for the program based upon #2, students must meet the criteria of financial need as determined by a formula provided by the state (which is based

Editors loved to have "overset," a term describing excess lines. Usually, they were timeless and short items to complete pages in future issues.

My files bulge with little items I've tucked away, like unto overset. They are not stand-alone column topics, but nuggets too good to toss aside. You may wish to call it potpourri; I don't have a clue whether it's more "pot" or more "pourri." (Columns may rarely get more random than this, but here goes.)

I join legions of Dallas fans whose eyes still moisten at recollections of how close the Mavericks came to winning the National Basketball Association championship.

Rumor has it that Dallas diehards may press for a recount in Florida, but—chad-hanging and rim-hanging

aside—Miami still wins.

I'm not sure that Dallas had the best team in the NBA, but will always believe the Mavs to be better than Miami. Alas, the scorebook says otherwise.

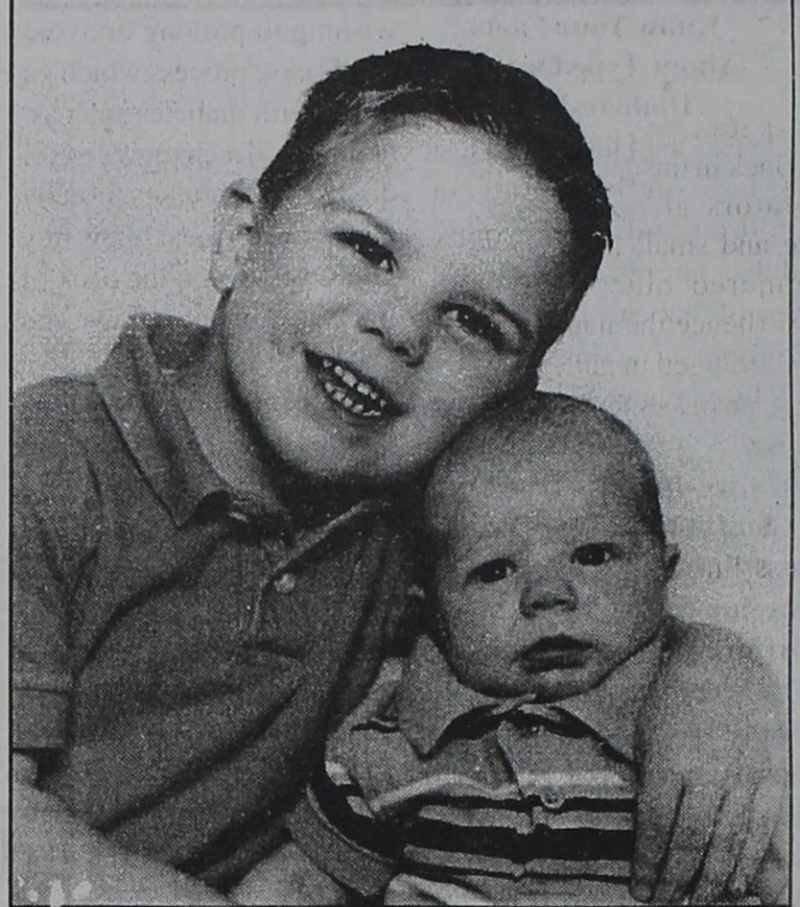

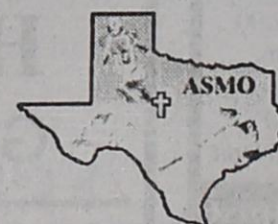

## KNOW YOUR FACTS

### "Know Your Facts About Type One Diabetes"

Type One Diabetes (Type 1) is usually found in children and some young adults. The old name for this type of diabetes is "Juvenile Diabetes." Since young adults can have this disease, a more universal name had to be established.

In Type 1 Diabetes, the body does not produce insulin - remember this is different than Type 2 Diabetes where the body does produce insulin; however it is not effective. Sugar is our body's basic fuel source and insulin is required to take the sugar from our blood into our individual cells for utilization.

Medical conditions which go along with Type 1 Diabetes are: high blood sugar (hyperglycemia) and low blood sugar (hypoglycemia) and Ketoacidosis (where the body is trying to cope with too much sugar and no way to use it while ketone acids are building up to dangerously high levels causing fainting or coma, rapid breathing, fruity breath odor). All diabetics whether Type 1 or Type 2 are going to be at risk for kidney disease, vessel disease, vision disturbances, neuropathy, possible symptoms of dementia and a myriad of other ailments which cascade down from the effects of abnormal blood sugar in the body.

Since Type 1 Diabetes is caused from non-insulin production in the pancreas, this means insulin shots are required or the use of an insulin pump which dishes out a metered dose at preset times throughout the 24 hours to keep blood sugars within reasonable levels.

Not keeping a tight control on your blood sugars will cause undue kidney damage which may end up resulting in the need for dialysis and a kidney transplant. These are two very serious treatments which may be avoided by keeping regimented controls on your blood sugar. The old adage of keeping blood sugars between 80 - 120 is a broad base for blood sugar levels; however, now many endocrinologists want blood sugars under 110.

Tight control is considered the best for any diabetic

wishing to prolong or avoid the disease process which go along with diabetes such as: kidney disease, vessel disease, eye diseases (usually due to impairment of the tiny blood vessels on the back of the eye), neuropathies and skin disorders.

Tight control means taking your blood sugar more frequently and taking multiple injections per day or the use of an insulin pump. The ADA does not recommend anyone attempt this on their own - better yet - discuss this and all other treatment plans with your

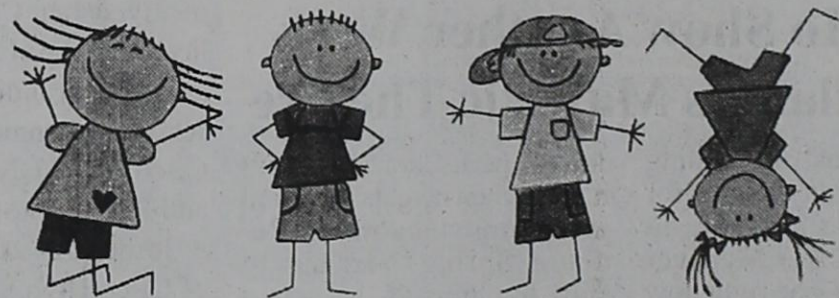

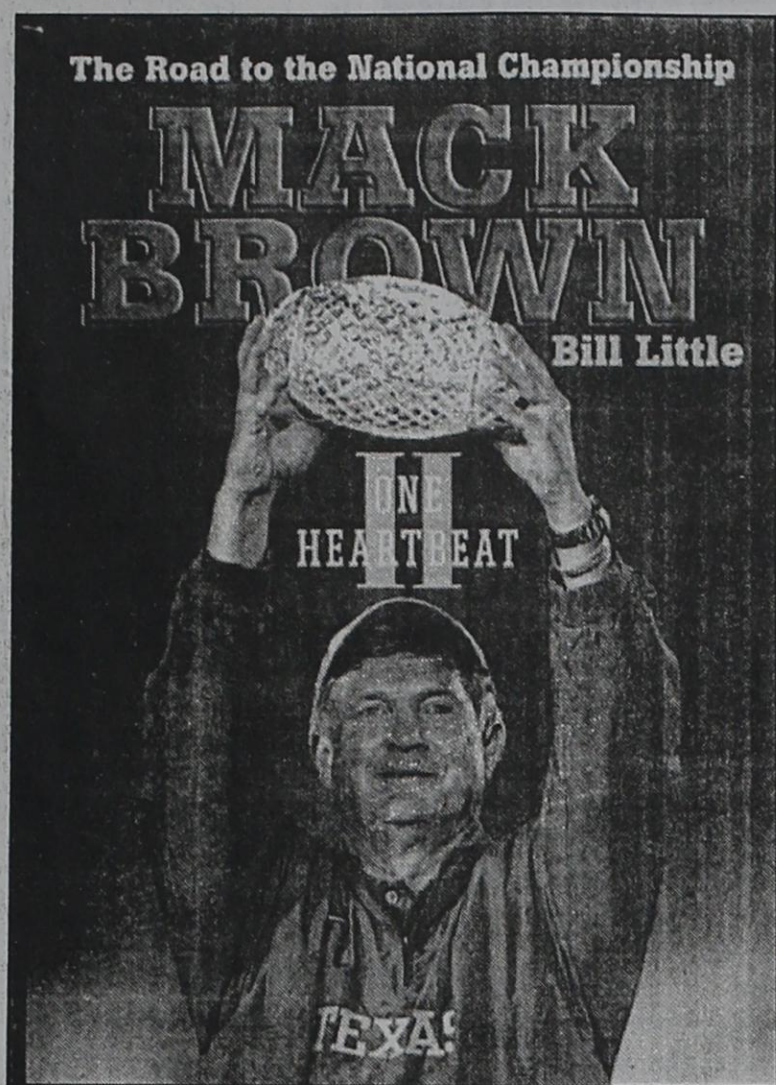

# Guest Slot

ARE WE all aware that Eastland County will celebrate its 150th year of creation 2008? It was organized in 1873, and many remember the celebration we had for that 100 year event in '73. In 2007 Eastland City will mark its 110th year. All worth remembering and noting.

UNDOUBTEDLY, A number could testify to the following copyrighted story by Celia Hagert in the Texas Lone Star FORUM. Hagert is a senior policy analyst at the Center for Public Policy Priorities in Austin.

OUTSOURCING OF PUBLIC SERVICES IS NOT WORKING  
The state's attempt to change the way Texans in need get health care, food, and temporary cash assistance has been a disaster.

Last June, the state outscored the enrollment process. As a result, over the last six months, more than 100,000 kids have lost their health insurance. And as of May 9, nearly 7,000 Food Stamp applications were backlogged, leaving thousands of families without food.

Lured by the private sector's promise of saving money, the state signed a five-year, \$899 million contract with a private company, prepared to lay off 2,000 state employees and launched the new system in Travis and Hays counties.

It all sounded so good. Clients would benefit from state of the art technology and no wait times at overcrowded offices and taxpayers would save hundreds of millions of dollars.

Unfortunately, this was not the case. The problems began almost as soon as the contractor took over. Technical difficulties and staff problems arose, and the promised savings never materialized.

Last month, the state postponed extending the new system to more counties and asked 1,000 state workers to stay on the job.

The outsourcing model was flawed from the start. It promised savings not from more effective or efficient ways to help clients, but by replacing trained stated employees with fewer, lower-paid, and less-skilled staff.

Admittedly, the old way of doing things had its own problems. For years, state offices have been understaffed and run with outdated technology. But things have gotten worse with the new system.

The rush to outsource misses the point. No matter who runs the enrollment process or how it is structured, the only way to ensure the vulnerable Texans aren't slipping through the cracks is to hire sufficient staff to run the program.

workforce to enroll people in services. Despite growing numbers of Texans in need, the state actually cut eligibility staff by 40 percent between 1997 and 2004. This almost doubled staff workload and compromised client services. Disruptions in benefits were common, often resulting in lawsuits.

Instead of making enrolling for benefits easier for people, the outsourcing experiment has made it more difficult. As a result, Texas' poorest families won't get health care, food, or temporary cash assistance they rely on.

Gambling with the well being of the 4 million Texans who are depending on public services is financially and morally reckless. It's time for Texas to hire enough staff to do the job right and focus on helping low income families for a change.

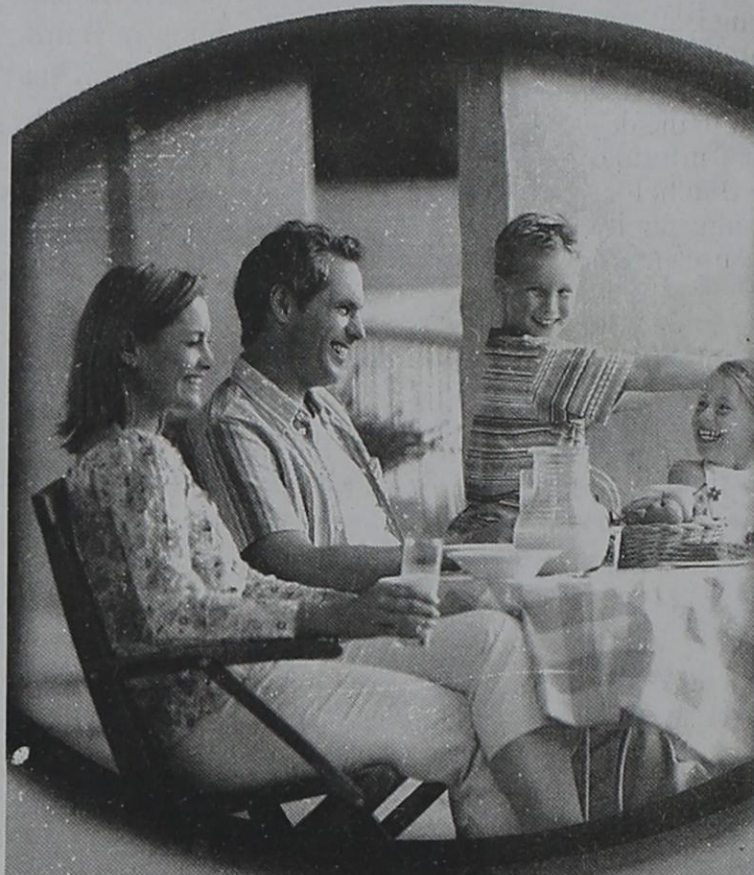

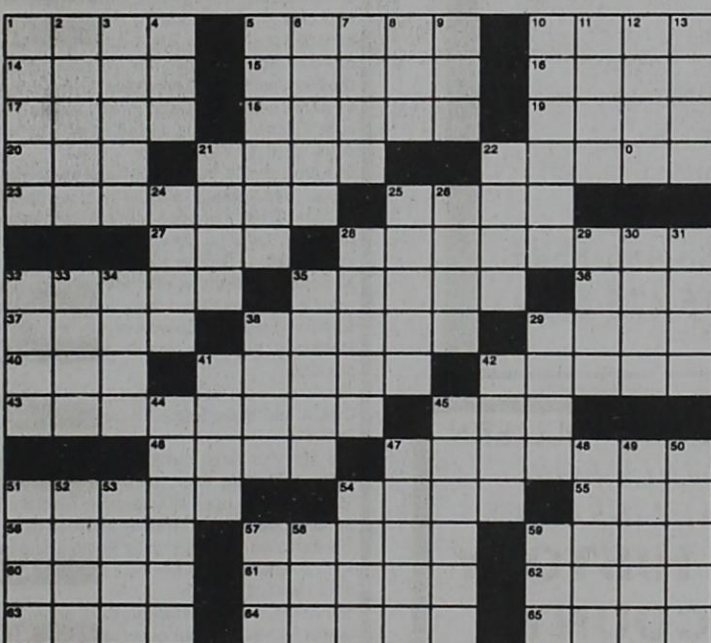
