

# Haskell, Rule Voters Reject Millers Creek Water Proposal

Late information from the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority states that even though the water contract proposition was disapproved by Haskell and Rule, a new contract will be drafted by the Authority and towns still interested. This means that Haskell automatically will still be allowed to participate in this new contract.

Voters in Haskell and Rule turned "thumbs down" in participating in proposed water contracts with the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority last Thursday while Munday and Goree approved the issue.

The Water Contract Proposition was defeated in Haskell by a mere 23 votes. Mayor H. V. Woodard said that the vote in Haskell reflected the desire of the majority of those voting and that with majority rule the outcome would have to be accepted.

Mayor Woodard stated that "in all probability Millers Creek lake would be built."

Final vote on the issue was Haskell, 385 for, and 408 against; Munday, 288 for, 35 against; Rule 71 for, 225 against; Goree, 80 for, 56 against.

The measure would have authorized each town's council to make contracts to buy water to be stored in the Millers Creek reservoir by the Authority. It was designed to meet the needs of the cities in Haskell, Knox, Baylor, Stoneville and Throckmorton counties for the next 50 years.

The Millers Creek plan was necessitated by the fact that present water supplies contain nitrates in amounts higher than recommended by the State Department of Health.

Also the State Department of Health had advised that it will be unable to approve the four cities' water supplies so long as they use the untreated underground water.

Had the measure been approved, the water authority would have collected a 50-cent tax on property within limits of the four cities for two years and water supplies would have been the responsibility of the water authority.

## ASC Community Committeemen To Be Elected

According to Lloyd Feemster, ASCS office manager, approximately 4,500 ballots have been mailed to interested producers of Haskell County for the purpose of electing 18 committeemen and 12 alternates who will act as delegates to the county convention and serve as community committeemen for the 1969 program year.

"Any producer who has farming interests in the county and did not receive a ballot may secure one by contacting the county office," Feemster said.

Ballots must be postmarked or delivered to the County ASCS office not later than September 18, 1968.

Ballots will be tabulated September 20, 1968, at 9:30 a. m. at the County ASCS office. Counting of the ballots will be open to the public.

The 18 community committeemen elected will meet in convention September 25, 1968, to elect the county committeemen for the 1969 program year.

The new committee will take office in October of 1968.

## Checks Now Ready To Mail To Producers

The ASC office, Haskell County, is in receipt of most 1968 program payments, according to Lloyd Feemster, office manager.

These checks are in the amount of approximately two to three million dollars.

Feemster said that checks will be in the mail to the producers in most cases by not later than Friday, September 13th.

Aging folks need "growing food" just like the kids do. One grows "old" when he ceases to produce new body cells, so you can totter at 60 or be a young 80, depending largely on how well you eat to repair yourself.

To a larger extent, you can control aging by persistent good or bad habits. You make the choice.

Many older citizens need better diets. For a recognized standard that provides information for choosing the right food, your county home demonstration agent or your local committee on aging can help you obtain this Daily Food Guide.

There are two angles to this growing-older problem. One is physical, and the other is mental. Food has a lot of bearing on both angles. Some of the old ideas must be discarded if the good protective foods are going to be eaten regularly.

Don't get food-cranky about what you eat.

Don't try to live on "tea and toast" or "bread and butter."

Don't let vitamin pills suffice for food unless your doctor prescribes them.

Don't be a "meal-skipper."

Don't refuse to try new tex-

tures in food. If chewing is difficult, cube-it, chop-it, mash-it, or grind-it, to help the work of your teeth.

Don't be a snacker. Three "squares-a-day" can add the variety in foods necessary.

Don't be an over-eater. We need less food as we add years.
