Fred Monke, 86, former Mayor of Weinert, stockholder of the Haskell National Bank, and director for 18 years, passed away, Friday, September 6, at 5:00 a. m. in Rice Springs Care Home, following a lengthy illness

Funeral services were held Saturday, September 7, at 2:30 at the Trinity Lutheran p. m. Church here with Rev. Gary Bruns, pastor of Faith Lutheran Church, Sagerton, officiating. Burial was in Willow Ceme-tery, Haskell, with Holden-McCauley Funeral Home in

charge. Mr. Monke was born October 20, 1881, in Litchfield. Illinois. In 1903, at the age of 23, he went to Big Sandy, Montana, and into Calgary, Canada where he was engaged in ranching until 1905. He later went to LeMars, lowa, where he became interested in farming.
