James (Skinner) Connolly, about 62, pioneer Tahoka resident, became the area's first holiday weekend fatality last Friday night as the car he was driving collided with a cotton trailer about three miles west of Clairmont.

Connolly was a well known cattle buyer and had lived in Tahoka for the past 27 years.

Connolly's wife, about 60, also was injured in the mishap and was treated at the Prohl Clinic in Tahoka for a broken collar bone and numerous bruises.

Thanks to mom, life was really fine.

A little before 12 that night Mrs. Ellis, noting the silence, went into Henry's room. His lights were blazing but the boy was asleep in a chair drawn close to an open window. She walked quietly over beside him. A whole month—thirty arduous days devoted to being good—he had worked for this night, and now he was asleep with the sum total of his dreams in his lap and fists. Soundly sleeping, he lay back in the chair, in one hand a noise-maker; clutched limply in the other, a large horn. The box in his lap contained piles of confetti, while reams of paper streamers were laid neatly over the chair arms. There was a ridiculous paper hat crushed into the chair back by his head, and, on the table near him, there was another horn. It had a white card tied on it labelled simply "For mother."

So, she thought, with tears in her eyes, a little man's play for one night had included his mother. She shook him gently, settled his hat more perkily on his head, and picked up her own horn. Noise seemed suspended in the air.

the Connollys, Frank Brown, also of Tahoka, and Jet George, driver of the pickup which was pulling the cotton trailer into which the Connolly car crashed, were not injured enough to require medical treatment.

Jet George was enroute home with his cotton trailer when the accident occurred.

The accident occurred as Connolly and his wife and Brown were driving east from their home on their way to a Christmas visit to see relatives and friends in Hill county.

Apparently Connolly, driving a 1939 tudor Chevrolet, was momentarily blinded by the lights of the pickup George was driving and after sideswiping the pickup crashed into the left side of the cotton trailer. The Chevrolet driven by Connolly was badly wrecked as the result of the collision.

Connolly lived about 25 minutes after the crash, but was dead before an ambulance from Jayton arrived.

The ambulance from the Robinson Funeral Home in Jayton took the victims to Tahoka where Connolly was taken to Stanley Funeral Home to await funeral arrangements.

Connolly's death marked the first and only traffic fatality for Kent county during the holiday season.

### W. B. ARMSTRONG INJURED IN CAR ACCIDENT

W. B. Armstrong was badly bruised and suffered several cuts about the face in addition to a slight skull fracture as a result of an accident last Friday noon about four miles north of town. Armstrong apparently lost control of the car he was driving, a 1936 tudor Ford, left the highway, knocked down a telegraph pole and finally came to rest against the rail of the railroad track.

Armstrong was found by his son-in-law, who summoned help from passing motorists. Armstrong was carried to Nichols Hospital, Spur, for treatment. He was alone in the car at the time of the accident and obviously no one witnessed the crash.

The front of the Ford was badly mangled and the force of the impact bent the rails on the rail road and knocked several ties loose.

Armstrong has been pulling bolls here this fall and was living with his son-in-law at the Lynn Shaffer farm.

Kent County's first oil and gas producer from the Canyon reef line—Chapman and McFarland No. 1 Cogdell—has been completed for 11½ barrels of oil per hour, flowing from open hole at 6,800-39 feet.

Size of the choke used on the completion test, the gravity of the oil and the gas-oil ratio have not been officially reported.

The completion test was taken following the washing of the pay zone with 500 gallons of mud acid. After the load and residue from the acid had been swabbed out the well kicked off and flowed at the average rate of 11½ barrels of pipe line oil per hour for an extended period. No formation water was developed.

Operator ordered the well finished and put on production, using the latest flow of 11½ barrels of oil per hour at the potential test.

That was at the rate of 276 barrels per day.

Top of the Canyon reef was picked at 6,796 feet. The new discovery is eight miles north and east of the nearest completed oil wells from the Canyon on the northeast side of the North Snyder field in central-north Scurry County.

The well is 16 miles north of Snyder and 467 feet from south and west lines of section 716, block 97, H&TC survey.

### WILDCAT STAKED IN NORTHWESTERN KENT

Three miles south of the Dickens County line in northwestern Kent County, William Herbert Hunt Trust Estate of Dallas will drill an 8,500 foot Ellenburger wildcat as its No. 1 Girard Trust Company, 660 feet from south and east lines of section 93, block 1, H&GN survey.

Drillsite also is 10 miles west of Girard, 25 miles northeast of the Polar Ellenburger pool in southwestern Kent and 26 miles due north of the J. A. Chapman Producing Company et al No. 1 D. M. Cogdell, southern Kent Canyon line discovery which was completed Tuesday.

Five and a half miles northwest of the Chapman et al No. 1 Cogdell, deepening between 7,600 and 7,700 feet for a test of the Ellenburger is scheduled at the Drilling and Exploration Company, Inc., et al No. 1 Wilson Connell, section 19, block 5, H&GN survey. Drilling continued Wednesday below 7,238 feet, in Pennsylvanian lime and shale.
