HOW TO TURN A HOUSE INTO A LIVABLE HOME

Interest in home building is shown as new houses appear on lots and farms over the county.

Plans and blue prints for various sized homes are available from the County home demonstration agent. There is also available an outline and specifications for various areas to fit family needs. All who are planning new homes are welcome to pick up these plans and help from this office. To make a house a home, it has to be adapted to the family who lives there. Ages of the family members must be taken into consideration, as well as where they work and how they play. As the family changes so should the living areas of the home.

When the family contains pre school children, the home maker will want to keep a close watch on the youngsters so the large kitchen is best divided by a food bar peninsula, with the food and laundry facilities on one side and a family room on the other. A window overlooks the playground outside.

The back entry to the house leads into a room where the children and the man of the house can change their clothing and wash up. There is a provision for hanging outdoor clothing and a closet for storage. A bath adjoins this room. A desk and file case are in the room so the farmer or rancher can duck in, write a check or record a feed ration then go back outdoors without tracking up the remainder of the room. This room remains unchanged through the years.

When the family reaches the overlapping stage, with some children too young for school and some in school, a piano may be added for the older

Kent County Okayed For Copper Tubing Center

Citizens of Kent County and other interested persons met in the district court room Thursday night and heard representatives of the firm of Ernst and Ernst report on the economic survey they made for the Kent County Development Corporation in relation to the feasibility of installing a plant and going into the manu-

facture of copper tubing. Attending the meeting and participating in the discussion of the report were Herbert House of Kansas City, H. J. Kraig of St. Louis and Adrian Alter of Dallas all of the firm of Ernst and Ernst. And Herb Jack of Shreveport and Herb Seifert of Houston. Earlier in the evening they

had made a more detailed report to the board of directors in the county court room. It is a bit difficult to report on this meeting, because of the opening statement to the group Herb House, with whom the Kent County group contracted to make the report, stated that "this entire meeting is off the record and this

information not to be published." But here is a summation of his report. Supporting the feasibility of the project were these favorable things about Kent County: Low taxes, free land available for building site, available mar. power, reasonable wage scale, and in the center of a rapidly growing area. Also it is well removed from any other plant, and well located in reference to the marketing area.

Some of the caution signals were that the copper tubing business is highly competitive and the market has a tendency to fluctuate considerably. They stressed in their report that the success or failure of any venture in the sale of copper tubing would hinge greatly on good sound management.

They suggested that the key to making money in the copper market was not so much in the production, but in the buying of the copper itself. They did not recommend, but suggested two alternate approaches to the program.

One, they said would be relatively safe and easy to facilitate. That would be to form a small, close private stock company, raise one or two hundred thousand dollars, at first and become a copper broker. In other words, establish a warehouse and sales office and buy and sell copper. This way they could establish a business and make an entry into the market, and as the business proved profitable they could gradually go into the production, or build a plant to produce the copper tubing. The other alternative was to go all out, in the initial program and erect a \$1,650,000 plant for the manufacture of copper tubing.

Also this suggestion as to the ways of financing it. Employ a competent securities attorney, and get stock brokers to handle the stock. About 25% of the stock could be held by the company, to insure control, and the rest to be sold to the public.

As the Chronicle goes to press, no decision has been announced as to the plan they have chosen, or what the program will be. The general summation of the report is that a plant in Kent County is feasible and if financing can be obtained, and with good, sound management, it can be operated so that within a reasonable time it will show good profits.

Between the two meetings the guests and the directors of the Kent County Development Corp. were served steak dinners in the basement, by Mrs. Agnes Marrs, Mrs. Gordon Hamilton and Mrs. Dean Young.

NEW SCHOOL BOARD HAS FIRST MEETING MONDAY

The Jayton School board had its first meeting after the elections Monday night, and organized by electing officers.

New members of the board were Jon Allen, Kelley and Jack Williams.

Bearl Murdoch was named to the position of president with Bilby Wallace as Vice president. Jon Allen, Kelley was named secretary.

First action of the board was to accept the report of the election judges and declare the maintenance tax as to have carried by a vote of 129 to 119. An order to that effect was presented to the board by Ransom Galloway a representative of Southern Securities of Lubbock.

It was agreed that the teachers would be paid this month just before Easter, which would equalize the pay period.

The bills for the month were presented to the board by Supt. Champion. They were ordered to be paid. They included \$2684.39 out of local maintenance, 1340.12 for the expense of the lunch room, and \$500.00 to Southern Securities for legal fees in connection with the maintenance tax.

Galloway explained to the board the details of the so called Senate Bill 116. Under this law, which the voters passed Saturday, if the bonded indebtedness of a district is not more than 7% of the assessed value, the board can levy a maintenance tax not to exceed 1.50 and enough tax

State Draft Quota For May 218

The state quota for Texas draft boards in May calls for 218 men the state selective service director announced this week through the local office.

This call compares with a quota of 244 for April and 228 for March. The May call is the state's share of a national quota of 6000 men all for the Army.

It was also announced that local boards would send rosters for pre induction physical and mental examinations in May.

The April quota will be filled with men who are at least 22 years old on May 1, except volunteers and those termed legally delinquent who may be younger.

RICE ANNIVERSARY RECIPE QUEEN

Charleston, S. C.—The growing of rice in America reached its 275th anniversary year with appropriate recognition in the city where rice was first planted in 1686.

With the Rice Council of Houston, Texas, as sponsor of the event, Charleston staged a pageant re-enacting the historical event when a ship's captain brought less than a bushel of rice seed to the Carolina colony.

The seed was planted by an early settler and from this beginning the great rice plantations of the Carolinas and Georgia were founded. Later the rice industry moved westward to Texas, Louisiana, Arkansas, Mississippi and California.

This year's rice crop is estimated at 5½ billion pounds.

Among the features of the observance recognizing rice as the oldest non-native American food crop, was a contest among homemakers of Charleston and the South Carolina lowcountry to find an official 275th anniversary recipe.

Mrs. E. Delance Poston of Johnsonville was judged winner. Her recipe:

275th Rice Anniversary Prize-Winning Recipe

Red Rice and Peppers
4 slices bacon or ½ cup sausage, or boiled shrimp
1 cup chopped onion
1 cup chopped green peppers
1 medium can tomatoes
4 medium green peppers
1 small can tomato paste
1 cup rice
¼ teaspoon celery salt
¼ teaspoon garlic salt
1 bay leaf
Dash each of thyme, tabasco sauce, and pepper

Cut bacon in small pieces; fry until crisp in heavy skillet, OR fry sausage until brown. Remove.

Saute onion and peppers in bacon fat, or fry onion and peppers in sausage fat with ¼ cup water. Add tomatoes, tomato paste, seasonings, rice and meat. Cover tightly and cook slowly for 30 minutes.

Clean 4 medium green peppers, removing core. When rice is done, stuff peppers with mixture and bake in baking pan filled ¼ full of water until peppers are tender. Peppers can be topped with grated cheese the last few minutes of baking. Boiled shrimp can be substitute for the bacon or sausage.
