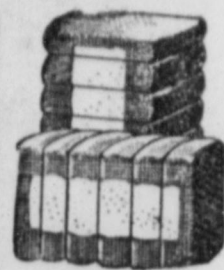

THE WALLS GOING UP ON NEW BANK STATE BUILDING

Concrete was poured on the vault Wednesday at the site of the new Kent County State Bank in Jayton.

Also brick and tile were put on the lot Wednesday and the brick masons should be on the job soon putting up the walls.

The brick is a sort of chocolate brown, with a bit of minged effect.

The building will be 30x60 ft and will be on the west side of the park in Jayton.

The bank will begin operations with \$75,000 in capital stock and \$75,000 listed as surplus.

Directors of the bank are Huber Lewis, H. Charles Lewis, Bill Jones, Thos. Fowler and Thos. P. Johnston.

A Denison firm that specializes in the construction of bank buildings and fixtures has the contract for the building.

The foreman on the job is from McAlester, Okla. He has been using all local labor on the building thus far, while doing the foundation and the concrete work.

The Jayton girls will play baseball on Tuesday, June 4 beginning at 7:30 p. m.

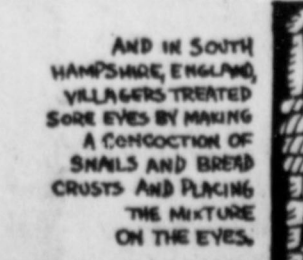

4H Girls Are Learning to Cook
By Mrs. Agnes M. Marrs Home Demonstration Agent
4-H Girls are learning about nutrition as well as learning to cook. Beverly Johnson and Linda McAtee took members of the Rising Star Home Demonstration Club that everyone should have at least 5,000 international units of vitamin A when they prepared broccoli with avocado spread recently. They pointed out that one serving of broccoli gave that amount of vitamin A in addition

to 2 milligrams of iron and 111 milligrams of ascorbic acid, or vitamin C. The daily dietary allowance of ascorbic acid for one person is 70 milligrams, 90 milligrams for growing girls and boys.
They also stressed the importance of getting the daily dietary requirement for good nutrition for the dish they prepared is given.
Broccoli with Avocado Spread
Cook frozen broccoli. Bring to boil one cup of water and one-half teaspoon salt. Add frozen broccoli. After broccoli begins to boil (after it has completely thawed), boil for 5 to 8 minutes... only until it is tender. Arrange broccoli in bowl with toasts so that spears will remain intact. Pour over it the avocado spread:
One avocado, one-half teaspoon salt, one-eighth teaspoon course-ground black pepper, two teaspoons lemon or lime juice, one teaspoon instant onion soup mix, two tablespoons mayonnaise or dairy sour cream.
Cut avocado into halves; remove seed and skin. Mash or sieve fruit. Add remaining ingredients; mix well. Spread over stems of avocado to make attractive dish. The two shades of green make an appetizing looking dish. Just try this dish; it is very delicious.
Members of the Rising Star Club enjoyed this demonstration and praised the girls for their fine work. In appreciation for this demonstration, the club presented them gifts.



No Defaults In Texas Farm Home Loans

L. J. Cappelman, State Director of Farmers Home Administration recently stated "The rural housing loan program was started in Texas some 12 years ago and the records of the program show that it has been a success.

Up to Dec. 31 last year some 2,730 loans have been made and not one penny has been lost or written off.

Loans under this program are made only to those who cannot obtain financing from conventional sources. As a result the 2,730 Texas families who obtained these loans had to be extra diligent in meeting their repayment obligations.

This repayment record of rural housing loan borrowers is a tribute to the judgment of the 654 Texas FHA County Committeemen who assisted in evaluating the soundness of these loans he said.

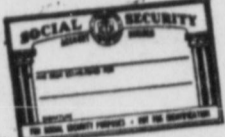

Blend the above ingredients together; pour over this mixture one cup of boiling water. While this mixture cools to lukewarm, dissolve one yeast cake or one package dry yeast in one half cup warm water. Stir in the above mixture when it is lukewarm. Mix in enough flour to make a stiff dough.

Turn onto breadboard, lightly dusted with flour and knead for about ten minutes. Put into a greased bowl to rise (cover bowl with saran wrap to keep from drying out).

When dough has risen about an hour, punch down and turn onto doughboard and knead again for about ten minutes. Return to bowl to rise one more hour. Again turn onto board and knead another ten minutes. Make into rolls and place on greased pan to rise until dough in bulk. Bake in 375 degree oven until nice and brown. Take from oven and butter rolls immediately. Luscious!!

Lemon Chiffon Butter Crunch Pie by Mrs. E. E. York, Jayton HD Club.

One small can frozen lemon juice, one-third cup water, one-half cup sugar, one package unflavored gelatin (one teaspoon, four egg yolks, slightly beaten, grated rind of one lemon.

Blend all except the grated rind together and cook over a medium low heat, stirring constantly. Cook until mixture comes to a rolling boil and then cool. Stir in grated lemon peel. Then fix the butter crunch.

One half cup butter, one stick one half cup brown sugar, one half cup chopped pecans, one half cup sifted flour.

Mix above ingredients, and spread in oblong pan. Bake about 15 minutes in moderate oven. When done, take a fork or spoon and make a crumble out of it, about the size of peas or beans.

Then make a meringue from the four egg whites. Beat egg whites until foamy, and add one half teaspoon cream of tartar and 1.2 cup sugar. Continue

beating until whites are stiff but not dry. Then fold egg whites into the filling, lemon juice mixture. Sprinkle bot-

tom of square pyrex baking dish with the crumble; add days in refrigerator. This can also be frozen. Another one which is delicious.

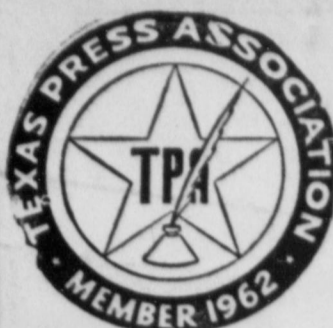

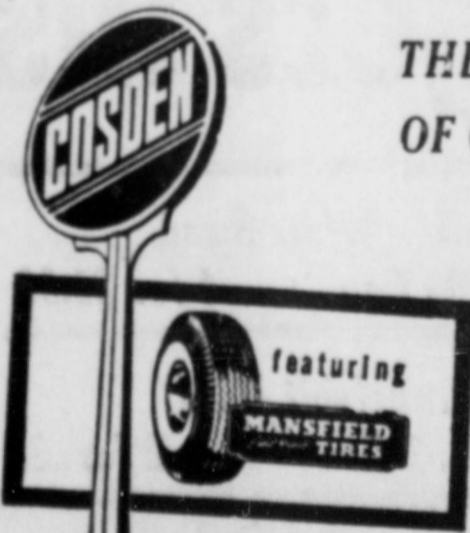

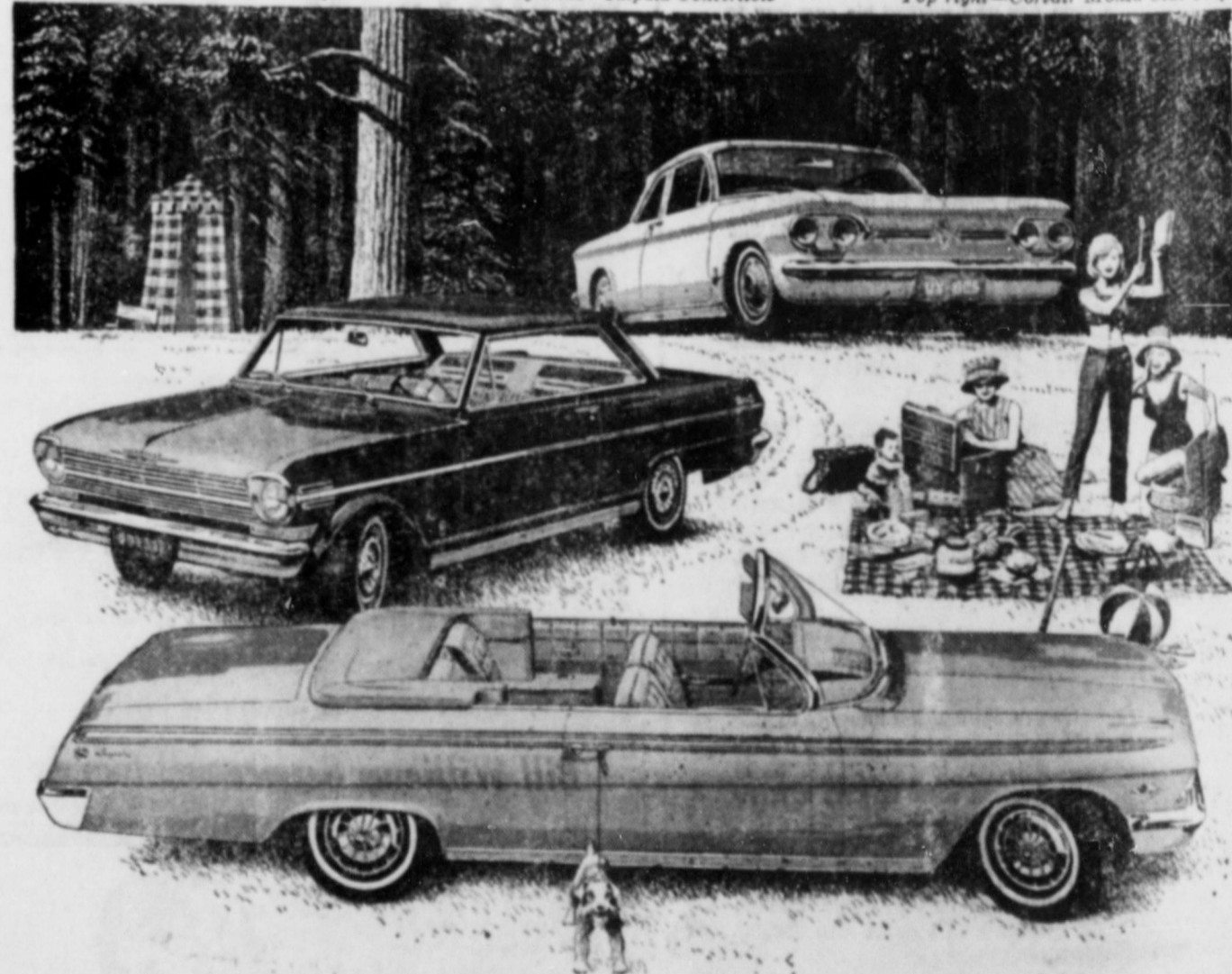
