Tech Has Inviting Schedule for Fall Football Fans

A newcomer, three South-west Conference foes and a long-time rival will be met in Jones Stadium at Lubbock by Texas Tech's Red Raiders this year.

On the football card for the first time is University of Colorado, Big Eight champion and Orange Bowl participant. The Buffaloes will be a Dad's Day opponent at 2 p. m. Nov. 17.

Both co-champions of the SWC, University of Texas and University of Arkansas, will be played here.

Texas' Longhorns collide with the Red Raiders at 7:30 p. m. Sept. 29, and the Razorbacks come to Lubbock for the finale at 2 p. m. Nov. 24. Third SWC member performing in Lubbock will be Southern Methodist, a Homecoming foe at 2 p. m. Oct. 27.

West Texas State, only team on the 1952 schedule still being played by Texas Tech, will open the Red Raiders' season at 7:30 p. m. Sept. 22.

Season tickets are still available, according to Puk Robison, athletic director and business manager. Prices are \$20, \$22.50, \$25 and \$30, depending on the location. Mail orders, including a 25-cent mailing fee, should be sent to the Texas Tech Athletic Office.

Although season ticket orders are being given priority, single game orders will be filled after Sept. 1 in the order received. Reserved seat prices are \$4, \$4.50, \$5 and \$6.

NEW PROGRAM MAKES BIG INCREASE IN FHA LOANS

The Farmers Home Administration of the U. S. Department of Agriculture loaned to farm families and other rural people in Kent and Scurry Counties a record total of \$350,910.00 in fiscal 1952 year that ended June 30, the local supervisor Joseph E. Box said this week.

The average amount covered the following types of loans: 16 initial operating loans, 23 subsequent operating loans, 4 subsequent emergency loans, 6 farm ownership loans and one rural housing loan.

Collections of principal and interest on all types of loans totaled \$265,073, as compared to 245,983 the previous year.

Three recent improvements more adequately equipped the FHA to meet farm credit needs this year according to Mr. Box. A positive, vigorous policy toward the promotion and preservation of the family farm; broad expansion of the agency's programs by the Agricultural and Housing Acts of 1961 and an increase in the supply of appropriated and insured funds.

Farmers are receiving larger amounts of credit each year, Mr. Box said. "The upward trend in farmers' credit needs stems from the continuing rise in farm costs and the pressing need to make adjustments and improvements in farming methods to stay in business.

The county office which services the local Kent and Scurry County area is located in the County Court room in Jayton each first and third Thursday, and in the Diamond M Building in Snyder.

Bobby Hamilton was notified by telephone from Washington late Thursday that final approval has been given to the Jayton Television project, and they can now begin on the actual erection of the equipment.

The plan is to put a large antenna on the city water tower to pick up channels 11 and 13 and then to re broadcast their signals.

It is said that this will put out a good strong signal out as far as 10 miles from town.

It is a voluntary program, with more than \$3000 already subscribed by persons of the community.

Plans are to have it ready in about two weeks, Hamilton said.

Funeral services for Doyle Robert Allen, 37, were held Wednesday in Sudan. He was the son in law of Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Leech of this place. He was electrocuted at Ruidosa as he attempted to raise a TV antenna and it came in contact with a hot wire. He was buried in the Sudan cemetery.

Wheat Referendum Carries Here

In the Wheat Referendum held late Thursday there was a very light vote in Kent County. Of the 22 ballots cast 17 of them were in favor and 5 were against the program.

It required two thirds majority to carry.

It some of the West Texas Counties it did not carry.

Veteran Service Officer Here 24th

The Kent County Veterans Service officer, who comes to Jayton twice each month to advise veterans with their service problems, is changing his schedule this month.

He will be here on Monday the 24th rather than the 17th as usual.

This change is made so that he can attend a convention, according to County Judge Dean Young.

SCS NEWS REPORT

IMPORTANT TESTS MADE ON GROWTH OF GRASS

For the past several years, grassland managers and conservationists have made extensive studies of various grasses to determine the effect of top removal on the under ground parts of the grass plant.

A number of grasses have been clipped at different heights to represent various degrees of grazing pressure.

All of these studies have shown that for most of the native grasses, approximately 50 percent of the top can be utilized without serious injury to the root system. Leaf and stem removal in excess of 50 percent results in lesser density of roots as well as reduction in depth that roots will penetrate into the soil, continuous close removal of tops will result in complete stoppage of root growth to the extent the plant will die especially during dry periods.

Soil Conservation Service technicians at Seymour made an interesting study a few years ago in the comparison between amount of grass cover, depth of moisture penetration and forage production.

The study was made on a deep hardland range site following a 6 inch rain in October. Three areas within a few yards of each other were selected. Amount of cover on each was determined by clipping and weighing the air dry material. On one plot with 2000 pounds of cover per acre

moisture penetrated to a depth of 32 inches; on another with 1500 pounds of cover depth of moisture was 19 inches; a third plot, with a cover of 500 pounds, had a moisture penetration of only 9 inches. In August the three plots were again clipped and weighed.

Plot 1 with 300 pounds of cover per acre had grown 6900 pounds of forage, plot 2 4200 pounds and the third plot had grown 600 lbs.

Moderately grazed ranges usually produce over three times as much forage as a heavily grazed one, even when vegetation composition is the same.

It takes moisture in the ground to grow forage, it takes cover on the ground to get it there. It is the rain you keep the counts.

Your local Soil Conservation Service office, assisting the Duck Creek district will be glad to help you develop a sound grazing management plan on your farm or your ranch.

RAILWAY SEEKS ORDER TO CLOSE LOCAL STATION

Officials of the Texas Railroad Commission held a hearing in Jayton Thursday morning, at which time officials of the Fort Worth and Denver Ry. Company asked permission to close down the station here except during the cotton shipping part of the year, possibly three months in the fall.

They showed statistics to show they are losing money on their operations except when hauling cotton.

This will basically effect the small shipments or less than

carload. But there has been very little of this type of hauling done in some time.

If the station is closed, and more than likely it will be, the business here will be handled by the Spur office, they said.

The chief way this move will effect the town, is that we will lose the agent here, and that one salary will be one less in the community.

Mrs. Frances Dobbins, is the local agent. If the office is closed there will no longer be a job here for her.

HEAVY RAINS SOAK THE VAST WEST TEXAS AREA

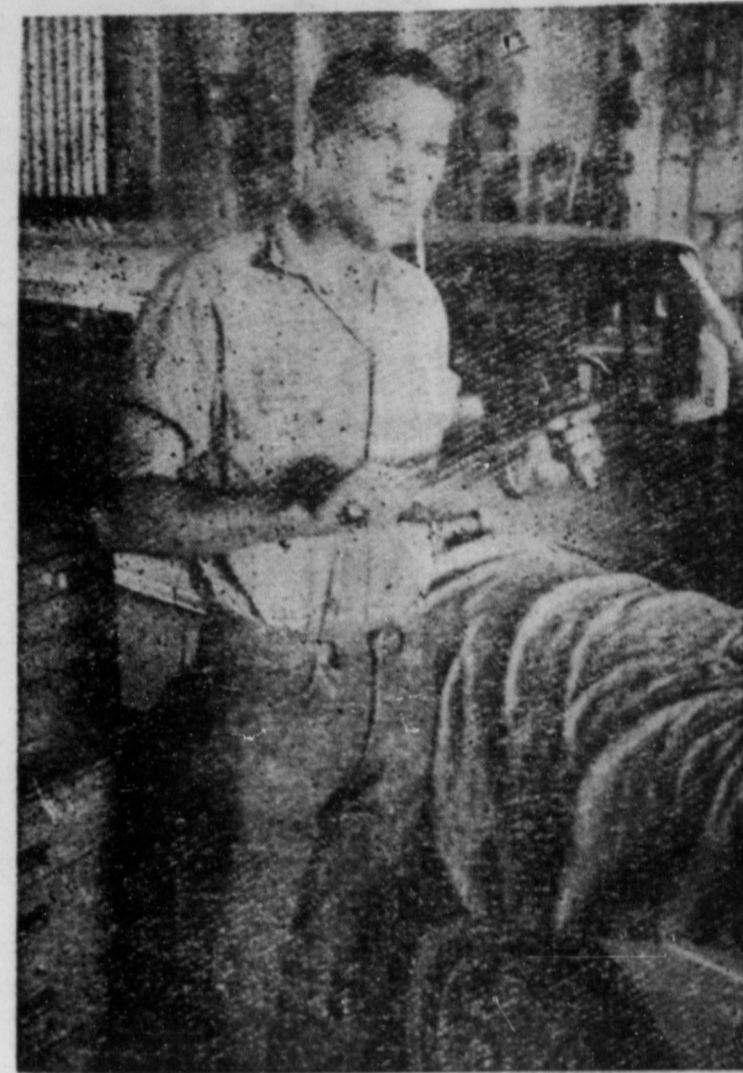

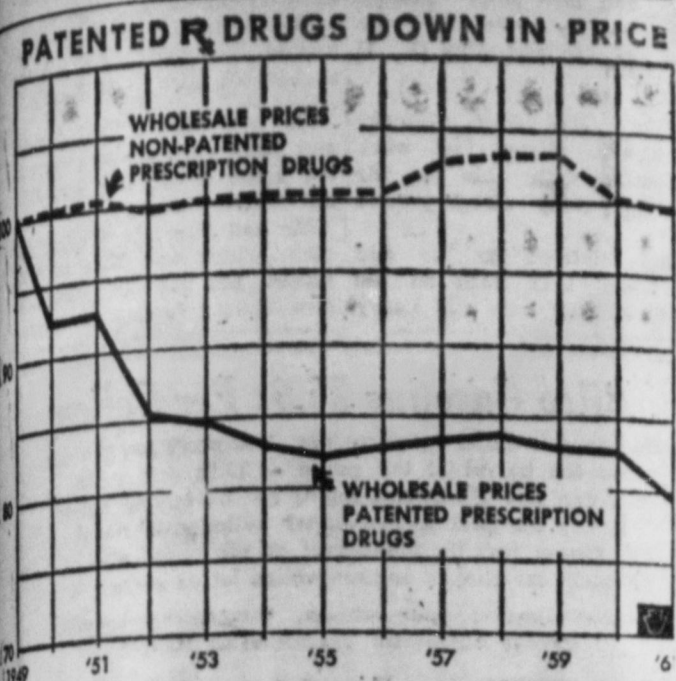

How does the American patent system serve the interests of the American people? In the case of prescription drugs it encourages research on new and improved products for the promotion of health. It also stimulates competition and brings down prices. A comparison of wholesale prices of patented prescription drugs with wholesale prices of non-patented drugs, for the seven-year period beginning in 1949, shows that patented drugs dropped in price 20.2 percent, while non-patented drugs rose almost the same, dropping only 1.3 percent. During the same period, the wholesale prices on all manufactured goods went up about 26 percent. (Sources: U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, Wholesale Price Index; John M. Firestone, Associate Professor, College of the City of New York, Base, 1949 = 100.)

GOVERNMENT HELPS MANY FARMERS BY FHA PROGRAM

The Farmers Home Administration of the U. S. Department of Agriculture loaned farm families and other rural people a record \$637 million in fiscal 1952 which ended on June 30. Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman announced this week.

The volume of loans, largest during any other 12-month period in the agency's history, was 61 per cent larger than the 1951 total of \$395.7 million, and 106 per cent above the \$308.9 million loaned in 1950.

Nearly half of the total loaned during fiscal 1952 went for farm operating expenses, almost a third for the purchase, development or enlargement of family farms, and about a sixth went for the construction and improvement of houses and service buildings on farms and in rural communities.

Approximately 205,000 families were using Farmers Home Administration credit for these and other purposes at the end of the fiscal year, 12 per cent more than the year before.

Ownership loans were made to 11,788 farm families to buy, develop, or enlarge their farms. Among these borrowers were tenants and sharecroppers, as well as young farmers trying to get started. Private lenders advanced 77 per cent of the funds loaned under Farmers Home's insured loan program.

Housing loans went to 11,349 borrowers to build or improve houses and service buildings on farms and in rural communities. The amount loaned for housing was 37 per cent above the 1951 figure.

Emergency loans were made to 20,861 farmers to assist them in maintaining normal farming operations following disasters, such as drought, floods and storms.

Water developments and soil conservation loans went to 953 individual farmers and 100 associations serving approximately 5,400 people.
