A San Angelo Standard Times Sports writer used these words Thursday morning in an advance story on the play-off game "Coach Oscar Boecker's Forsan Buffs play host to the Jayton Jaybirds today in an eight-man bi-district encounter and hope to make the Jaybirds look like a well-worn Thanksgiving turkey before the afternoon's over."

A fine group of Jayton people followed the football team to the game. The fans were pretty evenly divided, with about as many on the Jayton side as on the home side.

Probably Coach Arthur's greatest worry this next week will be trying to keep the boys from getting into a psychological vacuum in other words, to get them up mentally for the game.

Having already won once over Oklaunion, and now meeting them for region, this may pose a problem. Or it would for most teams. But Coach Arthur is an old hand at this sort of thing, and usually comes up with the right recipe. Neither he or the boys are in the habit of taking the opponent too lightly.

Looking back over the season some peculiar statistics appear on the record book. For instance Jayton lost the second game to Three Way by some 20 points. And then a team about the same calibre as Forsan beat them. And on paper Forsan was better than Jayton. This could prove perhaps two things. First, you can never play a game on paper and they many times turn out differently on the field.

Secondly, the Jayton group is a much better ball club now than when they played at Three Way. They have been getting better from week to week.

In one of our more weaker moments last Saturday we let the boys persuade us into going to the football game at Lubbock. "Just think" they insisted "it will be your only chance to see Tech win this year."

And right they were. Tech did win, but before the game had ended, we had long lost an interest in who would win. Our only concern was in who would keep from freezing to death.

At half time we made our way down under the stands to the concession joint, and got a cup of liquid they called coffee. Up came Mrs. Doug Love, from Jayton, also in quest of something warm to drink.

The Commissioners Court met Monday to consider leasing for oil and gas some of the land in Dawson and Martin Counties owned by this county, but there were no bids offered.

Only matter transacted by the court was to order the bills to be paid, however they did discuss a number of other items. Dale Condon, an attorney from Throckmorton met with the court and discussed with them the matter of filling the impending vacancy in the office of County Attorney when Dawson Bryant's resignation becomes effective.

No action can be taken until the vacancy exists, but at least three members of the court expressed themselves as favoring his application.

On Nov. 7th in a special meeting the court canvassed general election results and found no irregularities.

They voted to pay Clyde Hager \$1250.00 for right of way, to furnish material for his fence and to pay him the contract price for the labor of building the fence.

They agreed to buy \$12,000. worth of Hurst - Eules - Bedford School District bonds, rate of 4 pct to yield 3.5 pct.

On Nov. 12 they met in regular session. They voted to raise the salary of the Court house custodian Willis Long from \$360.00 to \$375.00 per month.

They voted to advertise for grass bids on county land in Dawson and Martin Counties.

Voted to lease for oil and gas some county land in Hudspeth County, which the state also has an interest in. The county will receive \$960 from this source. And there will be rentals for 10 years.

Jayton Swamps Forsan 56-22 In Pursuit Of Region Crown

FORSAN - Jayton sophomore quarterback William Ray Smith scored 24 points here Thursday afternoon and passed for 6 more as the Jayton Jaybirds notched their ninth consecutive victory of the season with a 56-22 bi-district conquest over a confident crew of Forsan Buffaloes.

A capacity crowd estimated at 900 attended the game. Fans filled the bleachers on both sides, and fences surrounding the field were lined with spectators.

THE WIN SENDS Coach Sonny Arthur and his Jaybirds into the regional finals against Oklaunion, the fourth such trip in as many years for Jayton. In a meeting earlier in the season at Jaybird Stadium, Jayton defeated Oklaunion, 28-6.

BOTH JAYTON seniors played vital roles in the smashing assault. Fullback Harold Murrell put 8 points on the score board with a touch down and a conversion, then teamed with end Woody Byrd in two scoring situations for 12 more points.

The Jaybirds almost completely dominated game statistics leading the Buffs in every department except passing. Even there Jayton had better accuracy. The Jaybirds out rushed the host team 387 to 286, and led in first down 14 to 11.

JAYTON HALFBACK Billy Stanaland was the game's leading rusher averaging 9.9 per carry with 109 yards in 11 runs. His total topped that of Forsan quarterback Ken Soles who gained 94 yards in 14 tries.

Murrell carried seven times for 63, Smith 14 for 55 and Freshman Eddie Morales three for 48.

In the pass reception department Byrd led the field with two catches for 77 yards. Stanaland caught four for 32 and Kyle one for 3 yards.

In preempting the passing laurels of the game, Forsan's Soles connected with end Donnie Gooch with 7 of his passes for 104 yards.

JUNIOR GUARD G. L. Hamilton and sophomore center Donnie Rinker were tough in the middle of the line. Forsan backs found it difficult and sometimes impossible to get through. They were aided in their efforts by sophomore guard Kenny Davis.

Others seeing action in the game were: Dan Dibrell who did some fine kicking, Alan Dunlap, Charlie Murdoch, Bobby Starland, Mark Taylor, Junior Alvarado, Gerald Murrell, Granville Smith and Donny Richards.

Following is a chronological account of activities: Jayton chose to receive. Forsan got off a good kick the ball going off the field, and being brought out to the 15. On second down Stanaland rounded right end and rolled 60 yds before being stopped at the 3. Wm. Smith made the first score of the game with 1 minute and 13 seconds of play gone. Stanaland added the 2 points giving the Birds an early 8 to 0 lead and they never did give it up.

FORSAN TOOK the ball at the 15, made two firsts and then ran out of gas on fourth down at the Jaybird 35. Murrell made 32 yards on second down, then four plays later Murrell stepped over from the 1 with the second TD. Attempts to convert failed and the Jaybirds led by 14 to 0 with 2 minutes and 40 seconds left in the first period.

Forsan took the kickoff after score at the 10, moved up to the 34. On the third down they connected on a fine 42 yard pass that put them on the 5 and then went over two plays

later for their first score, and ran the 2 point play which set the score at 14 to 8 with just a bit more than a minute on the clock. Jayton just had the time to receive the kickoff before the end of the quarter.

STARTING the second period Murrell passed to Byrd for a nice 58 yard touch down play and Murrell ran the extra points, giving the Jaybirds a 22 to 8 lead.

Forsan took the kickoff, fumbled at the 10 and the ball rolled out of bounds. On third down they punted to the Jayton 32 where it was fumbled and Forsan recovered.

Forsan tried three downs and could not move and punted into the end zone.

The Jaybirds failed to go in three downs and punted to the Forsan 20.

The home team returned the punt to the 35, ran four downs and stalled cold at the 34.

Smith and Stanaland shared the running honors on a nice drive up field that ended with Smith going over from the 2.

THE TRY for extra points failed and the score then stood at 28 to 8.

Forsan took the kickoff at the goal line and returned to the 31. Attempting a quick pass, the Jaybird defense was tight and they lost 15 yards as the first half ended.

After the half, Forsan took the kick at the goal, moved up to the 20, but backed up to the 10 on a clipping penalty.

Ran three downs for 9 gain and then tried fourth and 1 at their own 20 and made it.

Four downs later they had to punt, which went out of bound at the Jayton 32.

On a drive up field, Murrell made 18 yards. Stanaland 9 a few plays later Smith went into the end zone from the 10. Kyle took a pass from Smith for the 2 points making the score 36 to 8.

Forsan took the ball at their 15, and then on fourth down punted on their own 25. Murrell passed to Stanaland for 12 gain and then Smith went over from the 13. Smith passed to Stanaland for 2 extra points widening the spread in the score to 44 to 8.

Forsan took the kickoff at the 15, ran two plays and fumbled at their own 24 and Jayton took possession.

The 1962 Regional Championship game is set up to be played in Jayton on the night of Friday, Nov. 30. Game time will be 7:30.

Jayton school officials met with the Oklaunion school group in Big Spring, Thursday night after the Forsan game, and worked out the details of the all - important game between the two teams.

To try some new luck, Supt. Chas. O. Champion tossed the coin and Oklaunion called. Jayton won the toss, and of course chose to play the game in Jayton.

On setting the time of the game Oklaunion won the toss and wanted a night game.

Advance tickets to the game will be sold. The price will be adults 1.25 and children 50c. However the price if bought at the game will be 1.50 for adults and 50c for children.

A first down pass was intercepted by Smith at the 31 and he moved to the 20 but a clipping penalty moved them to about midfield.

ON FIRST down there was a Jaybird fumble and Forsan took over at their own 18.

Forsan connected with a nice 27 yard pass, made another first down, and then lost possession on downs at the Jayton 21.

Jayton fumbled on second down and lost possession at the 36.

Forsan completed three passes moving up field and scored from the 10. They added no extra points making the score 50 to 14.

Jayton took the kick at the 25 and moved to the 35. With 2 minutes and 40 seconds on the clock the coach sent in his reserves, a complete team and on third down Eddie Morales broke loose and scampered 37 yards for paydirt. The added effort failed.

The home team made the final score of the game on a 56 yard pass play and then passed for extra points setting the final score Jayton 56 and Forsan 22.

Jayton took the kick off and had a pass intercepted. Then Forsan took the ball and the final play in the game Morales intercepted a Forsan pass.

As the final whistle sounded, it also sounded the bi-district title for the Jayton Jaybirds.

The Governor has issued a proclamation declaring the county to hold a hearing in the animal health commission office on Jan. 7, 1963. On Feb. 19, 1963 the brucellosis Type 2 control area will be proclaimed in Kent County.

Dr. R. M. Zirkle of the Texas Animal Health Commission stated that testing for brucellosis in Kent County would probably begin early in March.

Kent County is one of the few counties in West Texas that has not been declared a brucellosis control area or a free area.

The completed petition that was sent in contained the names of 75% of the counties' cattle owners who own at least 51% of the cattle.

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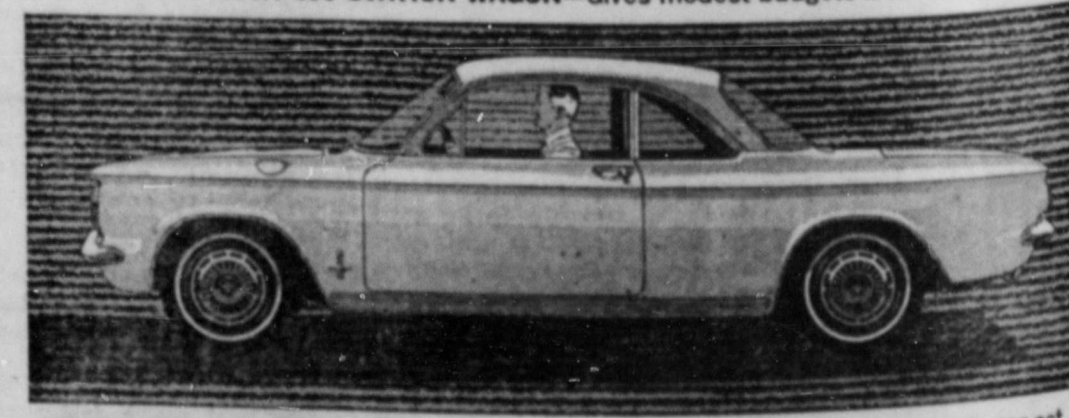
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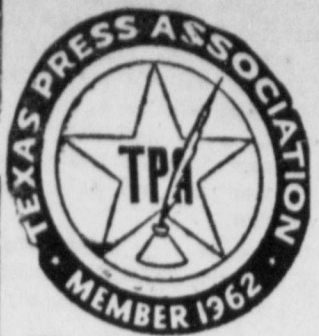
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Turkey Encore Second-Day Feast



Leftover turkey becomes a second-day feast when combined with peas and mushrooms in a delectable sauce, and served shortcake fashion over hot corn bread. The creamed turkey mixture is made in one saucepot in a matter of minutes — an idea welcome to any cook. The full-flavored creaminess and smooth body of the sauce is due to double-rich evaporated milk used in its preparation, to say nothing of the extra food value which this whole milk concentrate provides. The shortcake is a whiz, made from a convenient corn bread mix with chopped green pepper for flavor accent.

TURKEY ENCORE

1 package frozen peas (10 oz.)
2 cups cut-up cooked turkey
1 tablespoon butter
1/4 cup chopped pimiento
2 teaspoons grated onion

1 can mushrooms (4 oz.)
3 tablespoons flour
1 tall can evaporated milk
(1-1/2 cups)
Hot corn bread

Cook peas according to package directions, but shorten cooking time to 3 to 4 minutes. Stir in turkey, then butter, pimiento, onion, mushrooms with their liquid. Remove from heat. Stir in flour, blending well; then gradually stir in evaporated milk. Return to heat and cook over medium heat until thickened, stirring constantly. Add salt, if needed. Serve hot over Pepper Corn Bread. Makes 6 servings.

To make Pepper Corn Bread: Prepare 1 package corn bread mix (10 oz.) according to package directions. Mix in 1/4 cup finely chopped green pepper. (If milk is called for, you can substitute evaporated milk diluted with water.) Bake according to package directions. When ready to serve, split hot corn bread into two layers. Ladle half of turkey mixture over bottom layer, spreading evenly. Replace top layer and ladle over remaining turkey mixture. Garnish with parsley, if desired.

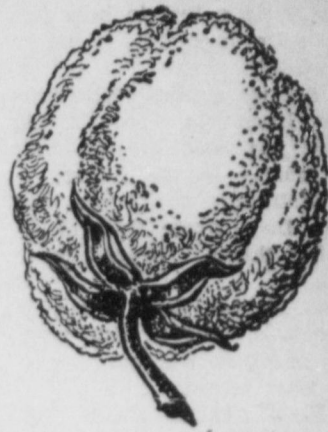
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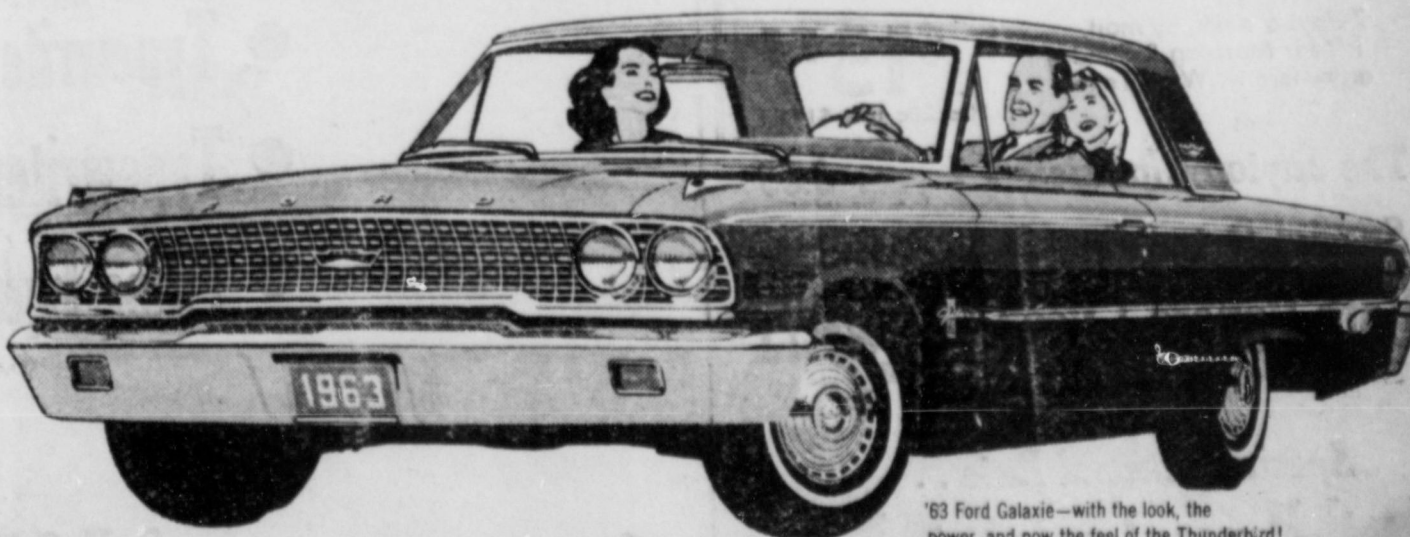
