Haskell Indians Begin Practice Sessions Monday

Haskell High School head coach, Sonny Everett, stated he expects some 52 boys to be on hand Monday, August 17, at 8:00 a. m. for football practice which officially gets underway. Everett said that two-a-day practice sessions will be held from August 17th through the 21st, and with the opening of school on August 24th, practice sessions will revert to once a day. The first scrimmage will be here on August 28th at 7:00 p. m., with Iowa Park. Prior to the Indians-Iowa Park scrimmage, the Junior Varsity will take on the Rule A team. Everett's coaching staff includes Bill Pringle, James Ivey, Tommy McAdams and Wayne Lehrer. The Indians will open the season with a non-conference tilt against the Coleman Bluecats on Friday night, September 11th, here.

Hometown baseball fans desiring to see a good game, only had to travel to Sweetwater or Odessa this past week. Many Haskellites did this, not once but three or four times. The support was great and so the representation of Haskell by these teen-age boys. As reported in last week's paper, the Haskell Warriors won the first game of their tournament which was held in Sportsman's Park in Sweetwater, by a score of 15-7 over Brownwood. On Wednesday at 7:00 p. m., Haskell met Snyder for a thriller which the Warriors won 5-4. Winning pitcher for Haskell was Walton Wooten, who went the entire distance, giving up 4 runs and 12 hits. Both teams scored two runs in the first, but from then on Haskell lead. Haskell's first two runs were scored by Frank Jirek and Robin Medford on singles by Wooten and David Dodson. The second two by Erick Whitaker and Jackie Young on singles by Jirek and Medford. The final run came in the 6th inning when Young got on base on an error and Jirek blasted a single to score him. Still playing in the winner's bracket, Haskell met undefeated Sweetwater Thursday at 7:00 p. m. In the top half of the first inning, Sweetwater scored and for three more innings the sides were retired with no great threats by either team. Haskell's first break came when Wooten singled and then scored on an error. But the tie score remained only minutes until Sweetwater first baseman, James Brown, homered. Then Haskell's luck began to change. Bobby Cobb, second baseman, made it to first when the catcher dropped the ball on the last strike. Centerfielder, Don Hisey got on by an error and Cobb scored to tie the game. Eric

Whitaker then singled in the winning run with a blast over second base. At this point the Warriors were the only undefeated team of the eight teams entered in the tournament, and again met Sweetwater who had defeated Lake Jackson. This game at 7:00 p. m. Friday, saw Walton Wooten on the mound for three innings and David Dodson for the last four. Sweetwater scored first and from that point the Warriors tried to take the lead. Even after scattering 10 hits by Aosta, Medford, Whitaker, Dodson, Cobb and Jirek, the Warriors lost by a score of 4-6. This made another game necessary to decide the championship. 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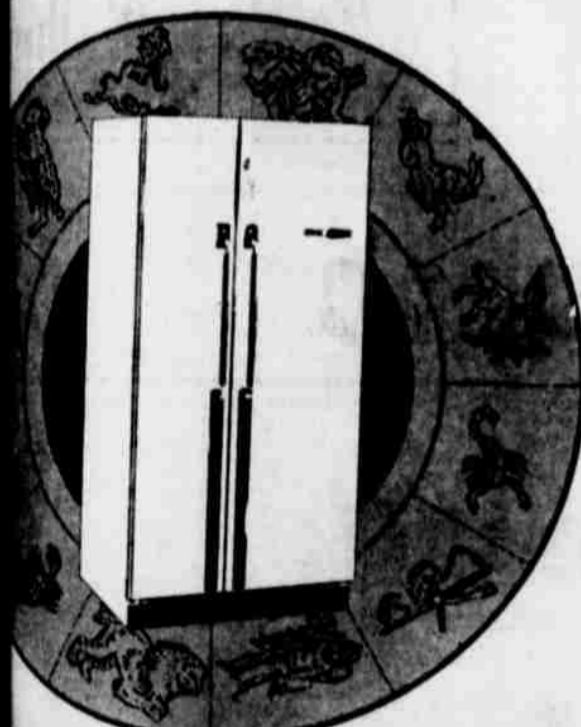

30 YEARS AGO
(August 18, 1918)

The first bale of 1940 cotton to be ginned in Haskell County was received at Rochester, Thursday, August 8th, four days earlier than the first bale for 1939 which was ginned at O'Brien August 12, 1939. The bale ginned at Rochester is the first from the 1940 crop to be reported in West Texas, and was brought in by J. E. Adkins, farmer living five miles north of Rochester. The bale was ginned by the Rochester Gin Co., and weighed 446 pounds. Rochester merchants and businessmen made up a premium of \$65.00 for the bale, and the cotton was sold for 9c per pound to a Rochester buyer.

Rains that were general over a wide section of West Texas Wednesday, with a downpour of three and one-half inches received here, revived prospects for a bumper crop and late feed crop and likewise benefited tanks and reservoirs with ample stock water for several months. The precipitation here, as reported by Mrs. F. T. Sanders, government weather observer, was the heaviest downpour since early spring. Total rainfall for this year now stands at 19.44 inches.
