Local Boys State Delegates Are In Austin

The thirty-first annual American Legion Boys State sponsored by the Department of Texas and held on the campus of the University of Texas got underway Saturday, June 5th as 840 high school boys from all parts of Texas, and two from Mexico, began registering.

Among those registering from Haskell were Gary Black, Bill Cox, Jim Bob Miekler and Milton Schmidt, who were sponsored by the American Legion Post.

Following registration, each citizen was assigned to one of two political parties...the Nationalist or Federalist. Each citizen then functions as a member of his party, he attends its precinct, county and state conventions and votes in its primary.

In Boys State, the American Legion provides the type of program where the young citizen has the opportunity to learn for himself that his government is just what he makes it. The boys "learn to do by doing."

The program takes an added significance this year as the vote is extended to 18 year olds. Most Boys State are in the 16 to 17 age category.

Highlight of Boys State will be a trip to the Capitol, tomorrow, Friday morning, where each elected Boys State official will be given an opportunity to serve in his respective office for a day, followed by the Governor's Ball Friday evening.

Boys State enrollment this year brings the total to 15,779 junior high school boys who have attended since 1940, when Boys State was first inaugurated in Texas.

According to Harvey Croft of the Nine-Point Grain Inc., Haskell received its first load of wheat from the 1971 crop May 24th.

The "first load" was produced by Bob Sezo and cut by Buck Bland on land owned by the Turner Estate.

The 8,000 lb. load had a moisture content of 13%.

"Grain officials expect a very short and light crop due to the drought," Croft said.

Cong. Burleson Comments On Redistricting

Congressman Omar Burleson today commented on the Congressional Redistricting just completed by the Texas Legislature. "By legal necessity," he said, "the State Legislature has just gone through the most difficult job of reapportioning Congressional Districts on the basis of population. The outcome of these adjustments on the basis of population is never calculated to please everyone and, as a matter of fact they seldom please anyone completely. The Legislature does the best job it can, and it is no easy one."

In Burleson's statement, he continued, "It is my feeling that a community of interest should be maintained in establishing Congressional Districts. It is fundamental that this be preserved for best representation of the people and, in this instance, I believe the Counties added to the 17th Congressional District closely relate to the area which it has been my privilege to represent in Congress for a great many years. Our District will remain a 31-County District. We are fortunate to retain 19 counties, including Haskell County, and I am delighted with the prospect of representing the 12 counties which will be added."

Congressman Burleson lamented the fact, however, that 12 counties will be removed from his District. "I regret exceedingly that I will not have the privilege of representing the people of these counties after the 92nd Congress, but I shall maintain a personal interest in the communities and hope to keep contacts with the valued friendships established over the years," he said.

Numerous reports of cattle deaths from emphysema of the lungs have been received by Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory from different sections of the state during the past two weeks. While the disease is similar to the condition in humans, the cause is thought to be an allergic reaction to something the animals are eating.

Most of the current cases are associated with the high protein constituents of young Bermuda-grass pastures. A veterinarian should be called in for diagnosis and treatment suggestions if the disease is suspected.

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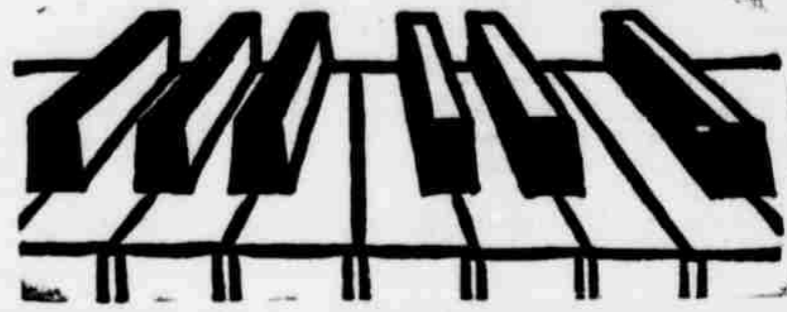
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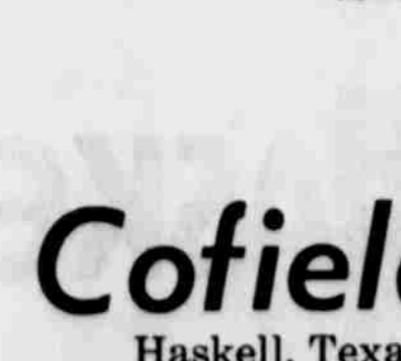

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"It's Easy To Employ Teenagers," Labor Department Official Says

Young workers and their prospective employers were reminded today that Federal child labor laws provide no barrier to summer employment of teenagers, and actually contain provisions to encourage employment of students.

William J. Rogers, Regional Director of the U. S. Department of Labor's Wage and Hour Division in Dallas, called a "myth" the current notion among many employers that "you get into problems with the Federal child labor laws when you hire teenagers."

Rogers said there are no Federal restrictions on the type of work that may be offered youth 18 years of age and over, and few on those above 16. Even 14 and 15 year olds may work at many clerical and sales occupations in establishments covered by the Federal statute, he said.

In fact, he said, the law provides for wage rates below the statutory minimum for the employment of full-time students in retail and service establishments and in agriculture. "Full-time students" are defined as those who attend an accredited school and who work only during hours they are not attending classes or during school vacations.

The Fair Labor Standards Act permits the Secretary of Labor to grant certificates to individual retail and service and farm establishments, authorizing them to pay full-time students at 85 percent of the applicable minimum wage—\$1.60 in non-farm employment, and \$1.30 in agriculture. Application for such certificates must be made to the Wage and Hour Division, the Labor Department

official said. He pointed out that the only jobs not open to teenagers under 18 are those that the Secretary of Labor has declared hazardous, after hearings. On the farm, certain hazardous occupations are barred to those 16 years old and younger. And farm youth over 14 may be hired for some hazardous occupations if they have taken 4-H Club or vocational agriculture training on tractors and certain farm machinery.

Non-farm occupations barred to 16 and 17 year olds as "hazardous" include: Working with explosives and radioactive materials; Operating certain power-driven woodworking, metal-working and paper-products machinery; Operating various types of power-driven saws and guillotine shears; Operating most hoisting apparatus such as fork lifts and man lifts; Most jobs in slaughter houses and meat packing and processing; Most jobs in mining. All jobs in roofing and demolition. Some jobs in excavation; Driving or working as outside helper on most motor vehicles (there are a few exemptions); Most jobs in logging and sawmill operations; Most jobs in manufacturing bricks, tiles and similar products.

Youth 14 and 15 years old, in addition to the hazardous occupations, may not be employed in manufacturing occupations or in most processing occupations, nor may they clean or repair power-driven machinery. They may not be employed as public messengers. In work connected with warehousing, storage, transportation, communications, public utilities, and construction, 14

'Refined' Denims Express Moods Of Popular Fashion

Denim is no longer just the blue fabric that's rugged, coarse and dependable. For spring 1971, it's been refined, says Mrs. Barbara Elliott, County Home Demonstration Agent.

The fabric is not found in cotton or cotton-polyester blends or woven or knitted designs in a wide range of colors. And permanent press finishes make its care an easy job.

With its new personality, denim dresses, rainwear, shirts, jeans and pants all express the popular fashion moods of earthiness and naturalness.

The total denim look is sporty. So select patterns with top stitching flat felled seams, patch pockets and front closings to emphasize the denim look.

Denim is especially popular with home sewers because the fabric is easy to handle and requires no special sewing equipment. But a few sewing hints

can be helpful. Work from the right side of the garment when topstitching, lengthen the stitch to 8 stitches per inch, and sew about one-fourth inch away from the seam edge. Topstitching is best along side seams, at the hem, around edges of collars, cuffs, pockets and down front openings.

An almost straight seam is required flat fell, the agent advises. To sew a flat felled finish first reverse the normal seam by stitching it with the right sides out, wrong sides together. After pressing the seam open, press it again with both seams in one direction. Trim away the under seam allowance to one-eighth inch, then fold in the top seam allowance to half its width. Stitch to the garment along the folded edge.

The flat felled seam is especially useful to prevent raveling. Use other details to add interest to denim. At neck facings or under edges of hem, sleeves or pockets, face with one of the prairie prints. Select decorative zippers, sporty buttons or decorative gripper snaps for closings. Or, add an Indian or peasant print braid.

to induce veterans to return their certification of attendance cards to VA during the last full month of their current enrollment period. For most schools, this means the months of May or June.

And there are two very good reasons for jogging their memories:

(1) VA cannot prepare a final check for the spring 1970-71 school year until the agency has received the certification of attendance card from the student involved.

(2) Returning the card at the end of the current semester, lets the student automatically be enrolled under the GI Bill for the upcoming summer or fall semesters.

Trainees attending school below college level must also return their certification of attendance cards, but they must do so every month, VA explained.

Failure to complete and return the cards on the part of both college level and below college level trainees will make it necessary for the VA to automatically stop payments.

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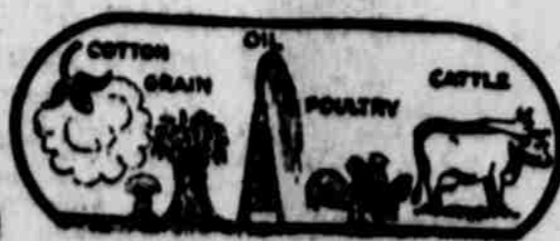

VA Questions And Answers

EDITOR'S NOTE: Veterans and their dependents are asking thousands of questions or earning the benefits for them through the Veterans Administration. Below are some representative queries. Additional information may be obtained at any VA office.

Q—I was recently discharged from active duty and converted my Servicemen's Group Life Insurance. Am I eligible to apply for insurance from the VA?

A—Generally, no, unless you were separated from service on or after April 25, 1951, with a service-connected disability. If not, you may apply to the VA for a non-participating National Service Life Insurance. Each veteran must have been associated from service under other than dishonorable conditions, and be in good health except for any service-connected disability. Application must be made within a year from the date the VA notifies the veteran that a disability was rated as service-connected.

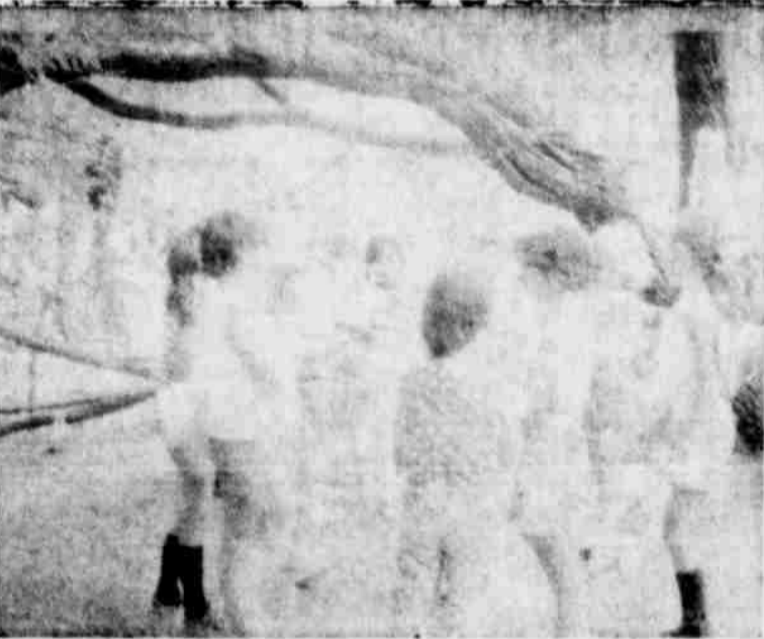
