New Talk Explains Drunk Driver Law

A free illustrated talk explaining the new Texas law which makes chemical breath tests mandatory for drunk driver suspects is now available from the Texas Safety Association.

Entitled "So, What Do We Do Now?", the talk points out that for the past ten years, 68 percent of persons killed in one-car accidents were drunk when they died, as were 43 percent of those killed in two-car accidents. It goes on to state that enforcement of the law can lower those percentages considerably, saving many as 500 lives a year.

Starting September 1, 70, drivers suspected of driving while intoxicated must take a test to determine the alcohol content of their blood. If they refuse the test, they can have their driver's license suspended.

"So, What Do We Do Now?" describes each step in the ministering of the test to a suspect. The talk is designed to give Texans a better understanding of the "breath" law and the procedures which will be followed in enforcing it.

Stitching And Stewing

County H. D. Agent By Ruth Ann Fansler

Thousands of brides and other homemakers are challenged with buying and storing perishable fresh foods.

The expiration of ethylene gas by some fruits affects the storage life of vegetables. When crispers are filled with apples and pears during the winter months, this gas could turn the salad greens brown.

Here are some storage suggestions that will prevent this:

1. Keep apples, pears and melons separated from carrots, celery, cabbage, potatoes, onions and salad greens.
2. Keep celery and onions separated.
3. Keep potatoes and fruits separated as the potatoes can give an earthy flavor to the fruit.
4. Keep oranges away from eggs and butter.
5. Keep dairy products away from fruits and vegetables.
6. Keep ripe pineapple wrapped in plastic bag to hold in the aroma.

Normally, potatoes and onions are stored in a cool, dry place outside the refrigerator.

Ring-Around-the-Fruit

Neen Newton of the Weisert Junior 4-H Club submitted this week's recipe:

- 2 pkgs. (3 oz.) or 1 pkg. (6 oz.) Jello, Strawberry, Raspberry or Lime
 - 2 cups boiling water
 - 1 can fruit cocktail
 - 1 can (8-3/4 oz.) pineapple tidbits
 - 1/2 cup maraschino cherry halves
 - 1/3 cup coarsely chopped nuts
 - 1/2 cup miniature marshmallows
 - 1 cup sweetened whipped cream or prepared Dream Whip whipped topping
- Dissolve jello in boiling water. Drain fruit cocktail, measuring syrup. Add water to make 1 1/2 cups. Add to gelatin. Pour into a 1 quart or individual ring molds. Chill until firm. Combine fruit, nuts and marshmallows. Fold in the whipped cream. Chill. Then unmold gelatin onto large serving plate or platter. Spoon the fruit mixture into center of ring. Makes about 4 cups gelatin and 4 cups fruit mixture, or 8 servings.

Tax Questions And Answers

(This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.)

Q—What's the Social Security tax rate now for household help?
 A—The tax rate is 4.8 percent for the employer and 4.8 percent for the employee. Employers liable for this tax for the second calendar quarter (April, May, June) should file a Form 942, Employer's Quarterly Tax Return for Household Employees, with a check covering both the employer's and the employee's contribution by July 31.

Q—I converted my World War II National Service Life Insurance to a Modified Life Plan several years ago and was advised at that time that the policy would not participate in dividends. I recently received a dividend on the policy. Was this a mistake? Must I return the dividend check?
 A—It was no mistake and you can keep the check. The dividend you received on your Modified Life Plan was due to interest earnings.

If existing interest levels continue, you may expect similar dividends in the future. You will receive any dividends to be paid on or near the yearly anniversary date of your policy.

Dividends are being paid only on those modified life policies issued in the World War II NSLI program.

ATTENTION Registered Voters

In order to avoid prolonged litigation (which could result in losing our \$1.5 million dollar Federal grant) we must have another election allowing every registered voter to vote.

If you may be out of town August 14th, please vote absentee by August 8th.

Industrial Tour Guides Are Released

Texas hospitality in the form of more than 630 plant tour invitations has been extended by the state's industries through a brochure just released by the Travel and Information Division of the Texas Highway Department.

Largest industrial tour guide of any state, the 1969 publication lists 132 Texas cities with industries offering plant tours. Houston, as expected, leads the list with 51 firms; Dallas has 47

and Austin is a surprising third with 32. Other cities with a substantial number of tours are San Antonio, Wichita Falls, Fort Worth, Arlington, Amarillo, Garland, Corpus Christi, Beaumont, Freeport and Hearne.

The listings include industries in smaller communities in addition to giant industrial complexes. The plants offering tours are engaged in diverse processes ranging from aerospace equipment to sportswear and cowboy boot manufacture.

Small Business Administration Accomplishes Outstanding Record

A record number of communities inaugurated 511 government-assisted, self-help programs valued at \$109.4 million to expand local industry and create new jobs during the past fiscal year, the Small Business Administration announced.

SBA Administrator Hilary Sandoval, Jr., said that during fiscal year 1969 SBA's local development company program accomplished these record results:

17,176 new jobs were created initially, in addition to 13,940 existing jobs. As the projects continue to grow, more new jobs are being created all the time.

Local communities raised \$17.9 million to support the new projects. Banks provided \$40.8 million, and SBA provided \$50.7 million in loans.

51 of the projects were in inner city areas and helped finance minority-owned businesses. The others were in rural communities where new industry is needed.

For each job created, only \$2,955 in Federal funds was involved.

"When one considers the benefits to the community, to the state and to the nation in increased economic activity and increased tax revenue from each new job, the importance of this program is apparent," Sandoval said.

He said that the local development programs have steadily gained in favor as a means of community development since the program was started in 1958 when 11 loans were approved.

"In fiscal year 1968 SBA approved 414 loans," Sandoval said, "and since the start of the program 2,292 projects have been approved in 50 states. More than 78,000 new jobs have been created."

He said that next year SBA expects to set another record.

"Our record for fiscal year 1970 is 575 projects financed by \$50 million in SBA funds augmented by another \$50 million private funds," Sandoval said. "Our objectives are to assist in the development of deprived areas, both rural and inner city ghettos; to help establish minority-owned businesses; and to stabilize economic growth."

Regarding the last objective, stabilizing economic growth, Sandoval said he hoped to help develop new industries in communities now dependent on single industries; to create jobs in non-defense work to offset any slowdown in defense production; and to promote the growth of small businesses to counter-balance big business expansion.

He said he hoped to persuade state and county pension funds to cooperate with local banks and with SBA in financing new local development projects.

Yeary Says Litter Is Bitter Enemy Of Conservation Farmers, Ranchers

Litter is almost as bitter an enemy of conservation farmers and ranchmen as erosion, a local conservation leader said this week.

J. C. Yeary, Jr., District Conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service, said that was why his office and others serving the California Creek Soil and Water Conservation District were glad to join with the Beautiful Texas Council in helping focus public attention on the statewide litter problem. The Council recently asked all Texas to renew anti-litter efforts this summer.

"Too many people still litter our countryside with bottles, cans and other trash," Yeary stressed. "This not only mars the beauty of our rural lands, but when it collects on farm or grassland, it can also become a conservation problem."

Yeary listed several ways litter is a conservation menace. First, it is a fire hazard. He pointed out that under certain

conditions, bottles had been blamed for magnifying the sun's rays enough to start costly grass and forest fires. Every year, countless wildlife and livestock are poisoned by litter.

The conservationist also said litter hinders farming and ranching operations; it can pollute ponds and streams, killing fish; some trash catches water, increasing mosquitoes, thus becoming a health problem; it can be a safety hazard; and it costs millions just to pick up every year. Besides that, he said, it's ugly.

"Conservation farmers and ranchmen do as much to beautify Texas as any other group," Yeary added. "Neatly sloped and seeded gullies, lands and woodlands, well-managed free ponds, lakes, and streams and seeded gullies, all this and other work of conservation farmers adds the beauty of the land. The least the rest of us can do is put our litter in a trash can instead of throwing it on the land to mar this beauty."

Lone Star Gas Announces Gas; New Pipeline

Lone Star Gas Co. announced today that it has contracted for substantial natural gas reserves from the Delaware Basin in West Texas and plans to construct a major pipeline from the western extremity of its transmission system to Sweetwater, Texas, 181 miles to Pecos County, Texas, by mid 1970.

The 20-year gas purchase contract with Pecos Growers Gas Co., a wholly owned intrastate subsidiary of Texas Oil and Gas Corporation, calls for delivery of approximately 700 billion cubic feet of gas beginning next year. Deliveries from Texas Oil and Gas Corporation's Cayanosa, Texas, plant are scheduled to peak in 1973.

The contract, part of a continuing program designed to assure a continuous supply of gas to Lone Star customers, is the third major gas purchase by Lone Star since 1966. These purchases totaled 3.7 trillion cubic feet of additional reserves. The company acquired 1.6 trillion cubic feet of gas from the

Katy field near Houston, Texas in 1966 and 1967. In November 1968 the company contracted for 1.4 trillion cubic feet of gas with deliveries scheduled to begin this fall at a point near Austin, Texas.

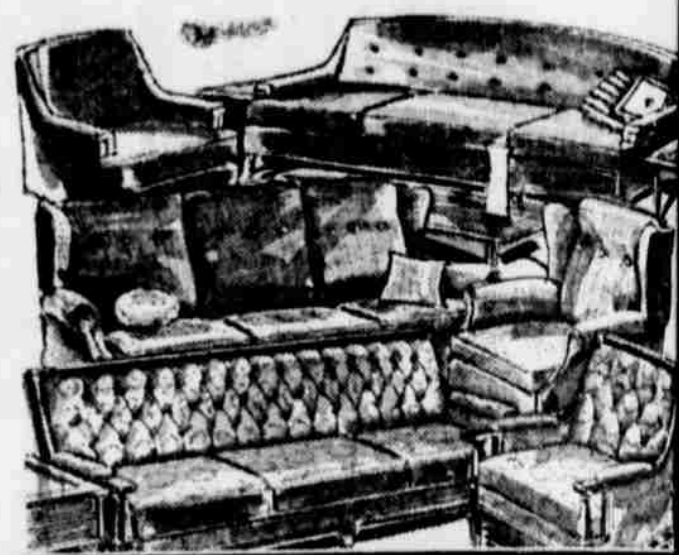
Mrs. Shuman Rites Held At Rochester
