



From The Recipe File of Opal Richards Fresh Vegetable Plates

BROCCOLI SAUTE 2 pounds fresh broccoli 1/2 cup water

1/4 cup Vegetables Oil 2 cloves garlic, minced 1 teaspoon salt

1/8 teaspoon pepper Wash broccoli. Split ends of large stalks lengthwise into halves or quarters, depending on size. Place in large skillet. Sprinkle with water, vegetable oil, garlic, salt and pepper. Cover tightly; cook over very low heat 20 to 30 minutes, or until stalks are tender. Turn broccoli several times during cooking. Makes 4 servings.

ITALIAN POTATO BALLS 1 1/2 pounds potatoes 2 egg yolks

1/2 cup grated Parmesan

2 tablespoons finely chopped 2 tablespoons Vegetable Oil

1/4 cup finely chopped parsley 2 teaspoons salt

1/2 teaspoon black pepper

2 eggs, beaten Fine dry bread crumbs Vegetable Oil

Peel potatoes; boil in salted water until done. Mash and combine with egg yolks and cheese in a large bowl. Saute onion in 2 tablespoons vegetable oil until golden. Add to potato mixture along with parsley, salt and pepper. Stir until smooth; shape into 24 smali balls.

Roll potato balls in flour, then in beaten eggs; coat with bread crumbs. Chill until ready to use.

Fry in deep hot (375° F.) Vegetable Oil until golden brown. Makes 6 servings.

BAKED EGG PLANT NAPOLI 1/2 cup chopped onion 2 tablespoons vegetables oil 1 can (10 1/2 ounce) tomato puree

2/3 cup water

Dash pepper

1 1/2 teaspoons salt

1 teaspoon oregano leaves 1 medium eggplant, peeled and thinly sliced

2 cups grated sharp Cheddar cheese

In a skillet saute chopped onions in vegetable oil. Add tomato puree, waters, salt, oregano and pepper. Bring to a boil and simmer for 15

In a greased 2-quart baking dishalternate layers of sliced eggplant, tomato sauce and 1 cup grated cheese, starting with layer of eggplant and ending with layer of tomato


