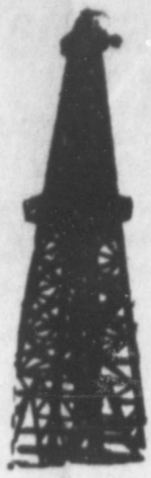

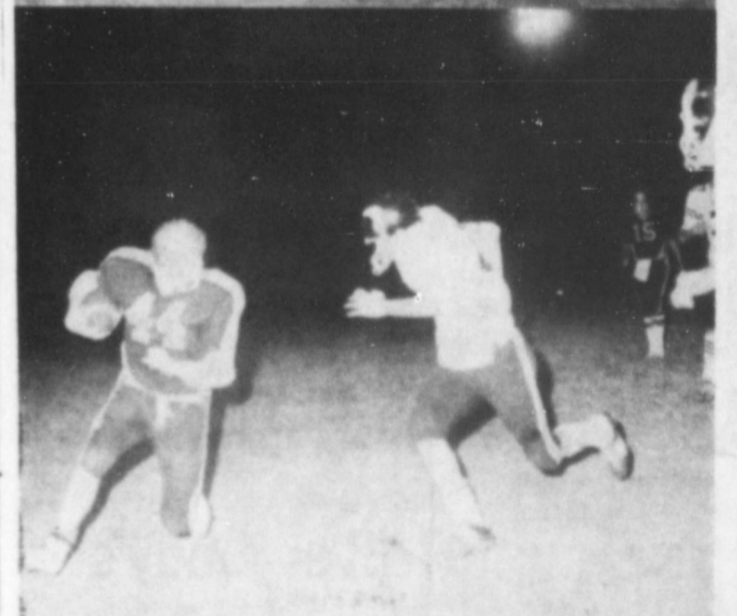

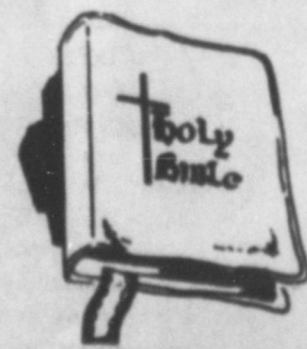

shell carefully cut through peel and around shell, leaving a 1-in. piece attached at opposite sides of the shell. Bring the strips up together at the center and secure with a small piece of thread or short piece of wooden pick. Decorate center of handle with a sprig of water cress or mint, or a small flower.

**STUFF BREAST OF CHICKEN**

- 6 whole chicken breasts (boned and rolled)
- 1 pkg. (7 1/2 oz.) herbed stuffing mix
- 2 cups boiling water
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 1/2 cup chopped celery
- 1 egg
- 3 tbsp. melted butter or margarine

Place stuffing mix in bowl; pour boiling water over mix. Add onion, celery and egg; toss well with fork. Stuff chicken breasts with mixture and fasten with skewers. Brush chicken with butter. Bake in preheated 325° oven 1 1/4 hours, basting frequently. Add more butter if necessary. Serve gravy separately. Excellent accompaniments are cheese crescent rolls and lemon-buttered broccoli. Makes 6 servings.

**SWEET AND SOUR CHICKEN**

- 4 cups cubed cooked chicken
- 4 tbsp. cornstarch
- 1 cup water
- 1 cup reserved pineapple juice (or add enough water to make 1 cup)
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup vinegar
- 4 tbsp. soy sauce
- 1/4 tsp. black pepper
- 1/2 cup slivered almonds
- 1 green pepper, cut in 2" pieces
- 2 fresh tomatoes, cut in wedges
- 1 can (15 1/4 oz.) pineapple chunks, drained

Mix cornstarch with water to form paste; blend in pineapple juice. Add sugar, vinegar, soy sauce and pepper. Simmer 10 minutes. Add chicken and last 4 ingredients. Cook another 10 minutes until thoroughly heated. Spoon over rice. Makes 6 servings.

**BAKED STUFFED FISH**

- 1/2 cup butter
  - 1/3 cup chopped onion
  - 1/4 cup chopped parsley
  - 1/2 cup finely chopped celery
  - 6 cup soft 1/4-inch bread cubes
  - 1 3/4 t. salt
  - 1/8 t. pepper
  - 1 3-4 lb. fish, dressed for stuffing
- Melt 1/3 cup of butter. Saute onion, parsley and celery in butter until tender. Add bread cubes, 1/4 teaspoon salt and pepper; stir to coat bread cubes. Brown fish. Stuff fish loosely with bread mixture; close and hold dressing in place with skewers. Place in greased shallow baking dish or oven-proof platter. Brush fish with remaining butter. Bake in 350 degree oven 40-60

minutes or until fish flakes easily. Baste several times with butter or pan drippings.

**TUNA SALAD**

- Drain well, separate into small chunks and put into a bowl the contents of
- 2 7-oz. cans tuna (about 2 cups, drained)
- Prepare and mix lightly with the tuna
- 1 cup sliced celery
- 1/4 cup sliced radishes
- 2 tablespoons chopped green pepper
- Blend together and add
- 1/2 cup salad dressing
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 1 tablespoon minced onion
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- Toss lightly to mix thoroughly. Chill mixture thoroughly in refrigerator.

To serve, arrange on a chilled serving plate or in a salad bowl

Crisp salad greens  
Spoon the tuna salad in the center. Garnish with strips of pimiento.

**SALMON SALAD IN GRAPEFRUIT BASKETS**

- Prepare Grapefruit Baskets, reserving and draining pulp, from
- 2 medium-size grapefruit
- Drain, flake and put into a bowl contents of
- 1 1-lb. can salmon (about 2 cups, flaked)
- Add drained grapefruit pulp to the salmon with
- 1/2 cup diced celery
- Toss together lightly.
- Blend together and pour over salad mixture
- 1/2 cup mayonnaise
- 1/4 cup chili sauce
- 1 teaspoon grated onion
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- Toss lightly to mix thoroughly. Chill in refrigerator to allow flavors to blend.
- When ready to serve, heap salad carefully into the grapefruit shells.
- 4 servings.

**GRAPEFRUIT BASKETS**

Rinse grapefruit and cut into halves. With a grapefruit knife or a sharp paring knife, loosen each section by cutting down and along either side of dividing membranes. Cut completely around outer skin to loosen membrane from shell. Remove grapefruit sections and reserve for use in food preparation. Remove and discard membrane and fibrous center. To make a handle for basket, about 1/4 in. down from top of each half

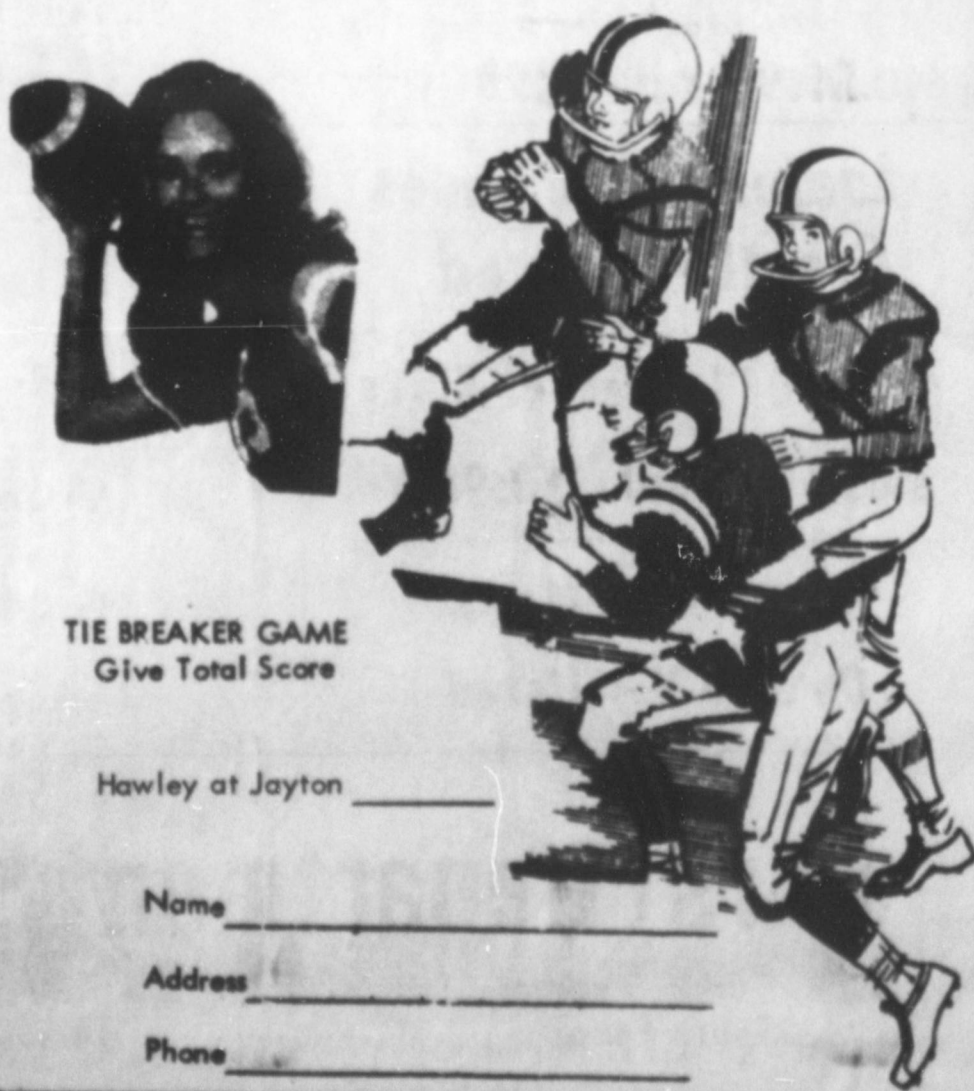

Also we will have her demonstrate the making of "Book-tique". This book-tique is something new in which an old book is taken and made into a jewelry box and antique.

We will have a carry-in luncheon. Everyone bring a covered dish, their own table service, plate, silverware and glass or cup. We can work all day. This workshop will start at 9:30 a. m. November 16th. The following is her list of supplies in the courthouse Extension office. Supplies for Wise Men and Angels

1. For the wise men choose three matching bottles, quart sized coke bottles are good, I like best the plastic bottles liquid detergents come in, such as Lux or Ivory.
2. One pound wall paper and 1 roll of toilet tissue or instant paper mache.
3. Large bowl for mixing
4. Old sheet or heavier textured material
5. About 36" soft wire
6. Bits of heavy lace and fringe, old jewelry and sequins
7. About one yard of cord
8. One can of gold spray paint
9. A small pkg. bottle or item for wise man's gift
10. News papers, rags, pliers, scissors, pocket knife and many miscellaneous items come in handy
11. Walnut sized or a little

larger styrofoam falls or old used flash bulbs for making the heads.

12. Wool yarn for angels hair.

  9. Heirloom egg shell varnish or Varathane, satin finish.
  10. Light sand paper.
- The first day we will use only the book and Gesso, and paint brush. I will bring a finished one to display so you will understand more of what

type of decorations you will want to use on your book.
