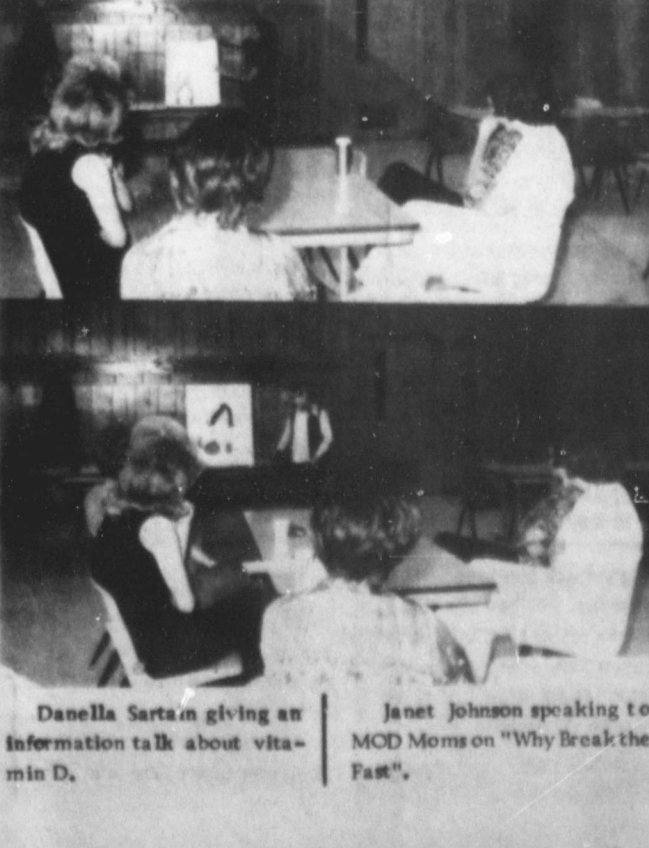

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NOTICE OF INTENTION TO CHANGE WEATHER MODIFICATION ACTIVITIES

Notice is hereby given that Atmospheric Incorporated of 688 East Delta, Fresno, California 93721, who holds license #2 of the State of Texas, intends to engage in an operation to change or attempt to change by artificial means the natural development of atmospheric cloud form by and on behalf of the Colorado River Municipal Water District located at P. O. Box 889, Big Spring, Texas, 75602, and will conduct the program of weather modification designed to increase precipitation by means of the aerial application of silver iodide and other artificial nuclei as follows:

- 1. The area over, or in which, equipment may be operated shall include the counties of Lynn, Garza, Kent, Deason, Burdon, County, Fisher, Martin, Hower, Mitchell, Baker, Glasscock, Sterling and Gola.
2. The target area, within which the precipitation is intended to be enhanced can be described as follows:

The boundary may be described by a line beginning at a point of origin at Big Spring, Texas, and running along highway #7 to a northerly direction to Lamesa, thence north-northeast on highway #7 to the north border of Deason County, thence east along the north border of Deason, Burdon, and County Counties to highway #8, thence southeast along highway #8 to the north border of Deason County, thence south-southwest to Highway #7, thence south-southwest to Highway #7 to a point approximately 12 miles southwest of Sterling City, thence northerly along highway #7 to the point of origin at Big Spring, Texas.

- 3. The equipment, materials and methods to be used in conducting the operation within this area of approximately 2000 sq. miles include a low radar system, cloud seeding aircraft, and the application of silver iodide for nuclei, hygroscopic nuclei or other nuclei considered appropriate to the artificial nucleation of clouds or weather systems.
4. The program will be operational during the period from April 15, 1972 through October 31, 1972.

Any person who feels they may be affected in some adverse way by this program may file a formal complaint to the Texas Water Development Board, P. O. Box 12868, Austin, Texas 78711.

The Kent County Home Demonstration Club Women and the agent Mrs. Roberta Stanaland, went to Abilene Wednesday March 8th. Some leaving at 8 a. m. and others at 9 a. m. There were 13 attending from Jayton and Girard, having lunch at Barton's Cafeteria, then were met by Taylor County H.D. Agent. They saw many items that would be useful in sewing. One was a blocking cloth which is marked in square inches. This cloth is nailed to a half inch piece of plywood, and can be used as a pressing board. A tailor's ham stuffed with wool is much lighter than one stuffed with saw dust.

Another was a rolling pin covered with wool. The pin was shaved off on one side to make it lie flat to be used for pressing seams. For making men's pants they have the interfacing in grey and tan also they have the material to make pockets for men's pants.

Lingerie fabrics for making slips, panties, and gowns. As for the elastic and straps for slips, this fabric is denier crepe-set and is anti-static. There is elastic for the waist of the pants is non-roll.

Stuffed Southern Flounder

1 to 20 ounce whole flounder
 2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce
 2 teaspoon salt
 2 teaspoon cayenne pepper
 2 teaspoon lemon juice
 2 teaspoon dry mustard
 2 tablespoon butter
 2 tablespoon flour
 2 cup milk
 1 cup crabmeat
 1 cup bread crumbs
 1/2 cup shrimp (optional)
 2 cup water

together in a bowl; parsley, Worcestershire, salt, cayenne, lemon juice and mustard. Set aside. Then melt butter, stir in flour and add to milk, cook to boiling point but do not boil. Add first mixture and mix well. Fold in crabmeat and blend in bread crumbs thoroughly. Divide into 4 portions and stuff pockets of flounder. Top each with two raw shrimp (optional). Broil for 10 minutes. Then steam in closed pan with 1/2 cup water for 20 minutes at 350°. If each flounder is cooked in individual pan, use 4 tablespoons water per fish. Serves 4 to 6.



Southern Spoon Bread

1/2 teaspoon soda
 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
 1 cup buttermilk
 2 eggs
 1 heaping tablespoon corn meal
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1 1/2 ounces butter or margarine, melted
 Add soda and baking powder to buttermilk. Beat eggs lightly and combine with milk. Then add meal, salt, melted butter and mix well. Pour into casserole and bake 20 minutes at 325° or 25 minutes at 350°. It is done when firm and brown. Yields 6 portions.

Farmers Plowing Less But Enjoying It More

Texas farmers are plowing less and enjoying it more, thanks to a new construction measure being pushed by the Soil Conservation Service.

As a result, there may be less dust in the air you breathe this winter and spring. Or less sediment in your city's water supply.

More moisture conservation, higher profits, more free time, and less soil loss are some of the benefits to farmers.

"All this is possible because of a new farming system called minimum tillage," Clyde W. Graham, state conservationist for SCS, explained. "With minimum tillage, crops are planted without prior land preparation. Weeds are controlled with herbicides. Since the land is not plowed, leaves and stalks

from the previous crop are left on the soil surface as a protective cover during the fall, winter and early spring."

The surface cover is highly effective in preventing erosion. It breaks up the erosive effect of falling raindrops, letting them fall harmlessly onto the surface. The residue also protects the soil from windstorms.

Graham pointed out that wind-blown dust is our state's largest source of air pollution. He also stressed that erosion-produced sediment is our biggest water pollutant, muddying streams and filling natural channels and lakes. Reducing water and air pollution from erosion has vast environmental benefits, he said.

"And think what scattered seed and residues left on the surface do for wildlife," Graham said. "In some farming areas, wildlife are almost entirely dependent upon crop residues for food and cover needed for survival during the winter months. Pheasant, doves, quail, geese, songbirds, deer, turkey, antelope and other wildlife benefit from such practices."

"In fact, widespread use of minimum tillage in Texas would be a boost of our state's wildlife."

Graham pointed out that farming operations destroy surface residues. If farmers can substitute herbicides for cultivation in controlling competition, they can reap the many benefits possible from maintaining crop residues protect young seedlings. The cover also produces better soil tilth and it increases income.

He said, however, that many farmers still plow their land over and over again, more out of habit and custom than from actual need.

Farmers have reported eliminating as many as 12 tractor trips across a field in one year with minimum til-



lage," Graham revealed. "However, about six is probably closer to an average. With average farming operations costing at least \$1,500 per acre, cutting out six to 10 trips can mean big savings."

On the other hand, the state conservationist said cost of herbicides used from weed control can be expected to offset part of the savings.

"The big reason for using minimum tillage is that it allows a farmer to do a superior job of conserving his soil

and moisture," Graham said. "The fact that most farmers report higher profits is also significant. But the advantage from a soil and water conservation standpoint justifies use of the system."

Graham said the Soil Conservation Service has published a new booklet "Minimum Tillage in Texas" which describes minimum tillage farming systems. To get a free copy, contact the nearest SCS office or write P. O. Box 648, Temple, Texas 76501.

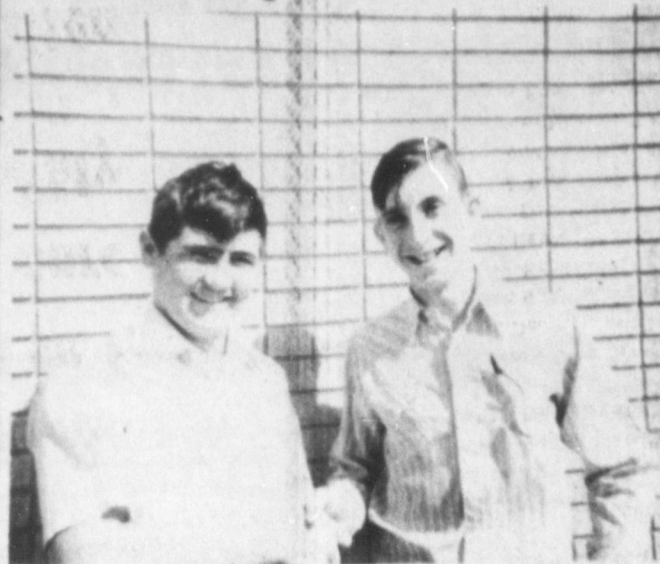

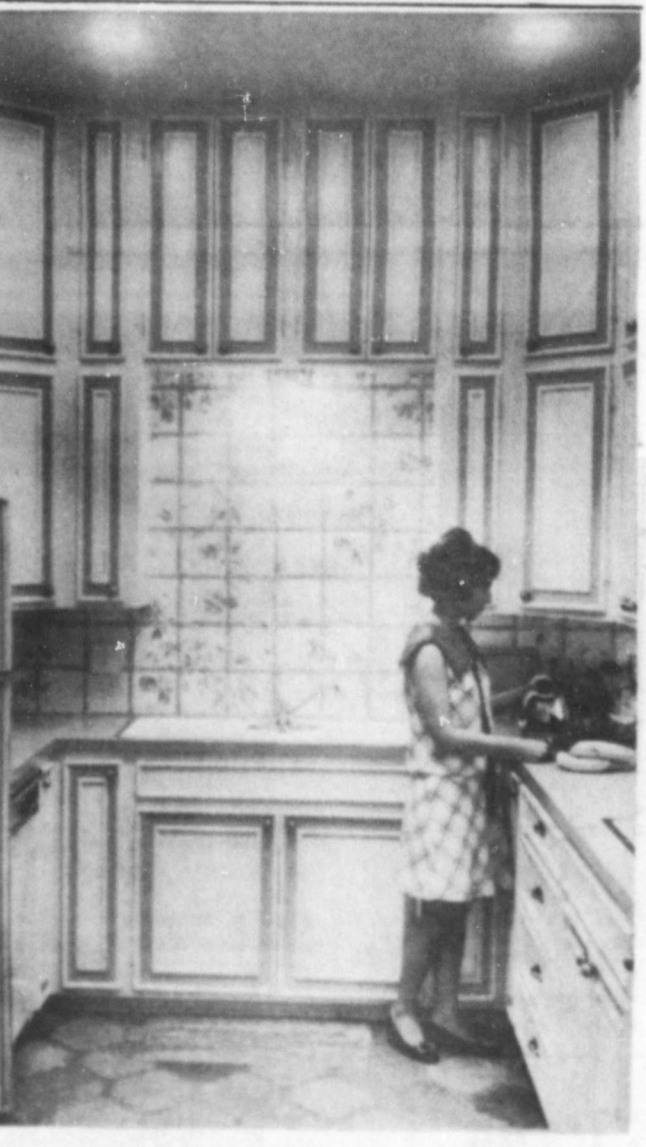
