

More Than 100 Persons Attend Dist. III Farmers Union Convention Here

More than 100 persons attended the Texas Farmers Union District III Conference held here Thursday night, March 26th, at the Elementary School. The meeting got off with a "big bang", as the talented Scarleteens, choral group, entertained the large delegation.

Foy Mitchell, of Roby, president of District III which is composed of 18 counties, was master of ceremonies. He introduced John Scarborough, president of the Jones County Farmers Union. Scarborough gave a report on the Washington "Fly-In", held in February. He said "that this is where the farmer has the privilege to leave the farm and go to Washington to debate with his Congressman on issues for farm programs and inform his Congressman what farm legislation he would like for him to support."

Texas Farmers Union vice-president, Joe Rankin, of Ralls, reported on the National Convention, held in Denver, Colorado and quoting Congressman Purcell said: "I think it is time to pass a good farm bill despite the administration."

A brief report was given by the representatives on Farmers Union Insurance and Hospitalization and the Rolex tires.

Texas Farmers Union President, Jay Naman, of Waco, the key speaker, discussed farm legislation. He had high regards for the 27 farm groups, which have united to form the Coalition of Farm Organizations. The Coalition group is seeking to extend the 1965 farm act, which will expire at the end of 1970.

"If the Coalition Bill is not passed it will be a great loss to the farmer and to rural America," Naman said.

Mitchell adjourned the meeting and refreshments were served.

George L. Neely, 81, prominent Haskell businessman, passed away at 5:25 p. m. Monday at Haskell Memorial Hospital after suffering an apparent heart attack at his home, 101 N. Ave. F.

Funeral services were held Wednesday at 2:00 p. m. from the First Presbyterian Church, Haskell, with Dr. Harry Sarles, pastor, officiating. Holden-McCauley Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements and interment was in Willow Cemetery.

Born March 12, 1889, in Smyrna, Tenn., he moved to Haskell in 1940 from Peecos. He established Neely Dry Goods Store that year in Haskell and continued to be active in the operation of his business until his death.

He married Louise Brooks Feb. 6, 1943, in Haskell. He was a member and elder in the First Presbyterian Church, Haskell. He also was a member of the Haskell Lions Club, a veteran of World War I and member of the American Legion. He was a retired fireman from the Haskell Volunteer Fire Department, in which he had served for 27 years. Twenty of those years were served as secretary-treasurer. He resigned April 28, 1969.

Survivors include his wife; one sister, Mrs. H. R. Rosebro of Roanoke, Va.; one brother, Jess Neely of Nashville, Tenn. former coach at Rice Institute.

Moisture Above Normal Here During March

According to Sam Herren, "The Weatherman," a total of 2.91 inches of moisture in the form of rain, snow, sleet and mist fell here during the month of March, making it an unusually wet month.

Normal moisture for March is .92. Normal moisture to date is 3.17, while a total of 4.53 inches has been gauged to date for 1970.

Here is how the moisture came during March: March 6, .91; March 7, 1.21; March 8, .05; March 12, .06; March 13, .01; March 16, .01; March 17, .09; March 19, .06; March 21, .44; March 28, .07. Total, 2.91.

The 5.2 inches of snow during March helped considerably to add to the moisture total for that period.

A low of 28 degrees was registered on two consecutive days, March 12th and 13th. A high of 83 degrees was registered on March 24th.

Another .02 of an inch of rain fell early Wednesday morning, April 1.

City Sales Tax Does Not Effect Number of Items

The City of Haskell one percent (1%) sales and use tax which went into effect Wednesday, April 1, will apply only to the same purchases covered by the State Sales Tax.

Exemptions include food, medicines, shelter services and amusements. The tax also does not apply to automobiles, tobacco, gasoline and oil, all of which are covered by State Excise Taxation.

The California Creek SWCD enters nominations annually in the Texas Conservation Awards, sponsored by the Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce.

J. C. Yeary, District Soil Conservationist, told Lions that Overton who was selected as the Outstanding Conservation farmer, farms over 1,000 acres of land in the Paint Creek Community, and his operation consists of crops and livestock.

Overton's practices include brush control by tree-dozing; conservation cropping system of cotton and wheat; contour farming; erosion residue management with chisel type plow; parallel terraces; proper grazing use of native pastures.

Four Persons Are Injured In Two Accidents

Four persons were injured in two accidents on U. S. Highway 277 four miles north of Stamford Friday night and early Saturday morning, according to Highway Patrolman Bobby Stone and Larry Gilbreath, who investigated the mishaps.

The first accident occurred around 11:40 p. m., Friday when a 1968 Ford Mustang traveling south, driven by Sgt. John W. Bersuch, 21, of Raytown, Mo., braked his vehicle to let a motorist pass, and in turn the Mustang skidded and hit a guard rail. Sgt. Alton R. Gardner, 21, of Hamilton, was a passenger in the car with Bersuch. Both men received treatment for cuts and lacerations at the emergency room of the Haskell Memorial Hospital, and were removed to the Air Force Base Hospital, Altus, Oklahoma.

The second accident occurred around 12:30 a. m. Saturday. When Patrolmen Stone and Gilbreath arrived on the scene, they parked their car on the paved shoulder. A 1960 Pontiac traveling north, driven by Roy Brooks, 19, of Haskell, struck the wrecked Mustang and Patrol car and two bystanders, A. D. Johnson and son, Roy Gene, 13, of Weinert, were hit as they had stopped to help the victims involved in the first wreck.

A. D. Johnson was also treated in the emergency room at Haskell Memorial Hospital for minor injuries and released. Johnson's son, Roy Gene, was admitted to the hospital, and his attending physician said the lad suffered a fractured right leg just above the knee and severe cuts and bruises about the left knee.

A Holden-McCauley Funeral Home ambulance, Haskell, brought the Johnson boy to the hospital.

Patrolman Stone said it was raining at the time of the accident. Haskell County Sheriff Garth Garrett and Deputy Olen King, assisted with the investigation.

Roy Brooks was charged with DWI in County Court, Monday.

Munday Young Man Killed In Wreck Near Here

Robert William Rickett, 17, of Munday, was killed instantly, and Anderson Landess, 71, of Haskell, was admitted to the Haskell Memorial Hospital for treatment of broken ribs, cuts and bruises, received in a grinding two-car crash, two and one-half miles west of the city limits of Haskell, around 8:10 p. m., Saturday. Landess was dismissed from the hospital Sunday morning.

A Holden-McCauley Funeral Home ambulance brought the injured man to the local hospital and the body of young Rickett to the funeral home here.

Rickett's body was moved to the McCauley-Smith Funeral Home in Munday for final rites.

Rickett's vehicle a Morris Minor (foreign car) and Landess' Buick were totaled.

Larry Wayne Short, 30, of Haskell, driving a 1969 Pontiac Station Wagon, headed west, ran upon the wreck and hit the rear-end of Landess' Buick. Short was not injured.

Patrolmen Bobby Stone and Larry Gilbreath and Haskell County Sheriff, Garth Garrett, and deputies Buster Shelton and Pete Mercer investigated the accident.

Funeral services were held at 2:00 p. m. Monday at the Munday Church of Christ, with Cecil Cox, minister, officiating. Burial was in Johnson Memorial Cemetery, Munday, under the direction of McCauley-Smith Funeral Home.

Rickett was born October 25, 1956, in Winters, and came to Munday from Seymour with his parents in 1963.

He was a junior at Munday High School and a member of the Munday Moguls football team. He was active in the Future Farmers of America program and a member of the Munday Church of Christ.

Survivors include his parents; one sister, Betty, of the home; one brother, Steve, also of the home; his paternal grandfather, W. J. Rickett of Star; his maternal grandfather, J. C. Hasty of San Angelo.

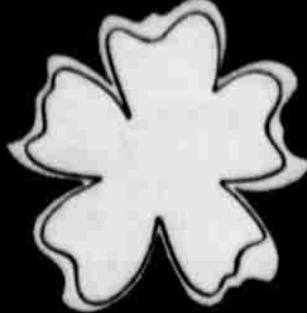

CONG. OMAR BURLESON ANNOUNCES FOR RE-ELECTION



OMAR BURLESON

Congressman Omar Burleson has formally announced his candidacy for re-election to Congress, subject to the Democratic Primary on May 2 and the General Election in November. The 17th Congressional District, which he represents, is composed of 31 counties, covering approximately 30,000 square miles. Within this area live about 440,000 people.

Burleson says, "During my tenure of office I have followed two guiding principles: First, to know the views of my constituents and reflect their sentiments to the greatest degree possible in my actions in the Halls of Congress. Second, to inform and advise as closely as I can on those issues which affect our District, our State and our Nation."

Burleson termed his approach to Government as one of "common sense," gained through the

years of public service. "I have tried to see that the people's tax money is spent as wisely and as judiciously as you would have spent it had you been in my place," he said.

"The record will show that a greater part of the time I have found myself in the minority in opposing the vast spending programs of doubtful value which have been put into effect in recent years. In every Session of the Congress the record will show my votes for expenditures below that recommended by the Executive Department and far less than actually appropriated by the Congress, except in the field of National Defense," Burleson said. He continued, "Without meaning to appear boastful, if the Congress had followed those of us who have voted consistently over the years for fiscal responsibility, our financial affairs would not be in the shape they are today."

"In areas providing for the defense of our Country, I have always supported those things to make and keep our Nation stronger than any other in the world," he said.

"I have been discerning in separating those activities which the Federal Government was not designed to do, from those which are truly its responsibility," he said.

Burleson stated that activities of State and local governments, in accordance with the Constitution, should not be infringed and encroached upon by the Federal Government.

"The Federal Government does have specific missions," he said. He gave as examples the conservation of our natural resources, the defense of the Country and its general welfare.

"At the same time," he said, "the Federal Government cannot and should not try to take care of everything from Washington, either foreign or domestic. The Federal Government has grown to colossal proportions and centralized power in Washington has increased," Burleson pointed out. "To this, I am opposed and my record is clear in this respect."

Burleson is among the senior members of the U. S. House of Representatives in point of service. He was elected to the 80th Congress from the 17th District and has been re-elected to each succeeding Congress. He is a member of the Ways and Means Committee, considered to be the most powerful and prestigious in the House.

Burleson is a former County Attorney and County Judge of Jones County. He was appointed an FBI Agent, and served in a number of assignments over the U. S. He resigned from the FBI to join the Navy in World

War II, and saw duty in both the Atlantic and the Pacific.

Burleson ended his formal announcement by saying, "Although not having opposition in this year's election, it is my hope to visit my constituency as opportunity affords. The Congress being in session at this time and expected to be long after the Primary Election, there will be little time to leave duties in Washington, I expect, however, to get back home at short intervals to do the best I can in seeing my friends and to make new ones. I believe it is incumbent upon a Congress-

OLD BOOM-TIME HABITS

Business is slowing down. Profits are squeezed and in some area jobs are declining. According to Business Week, "Industry has not added to payrolls since October, and manufacturing employment is down 350,000 since last August. Haskell County History

30 YEARS AGO
(April 5, 1917)

Registering the same motor vehicle for 21 years in succession is the unusual record of a Sagerion farmer, E. W. 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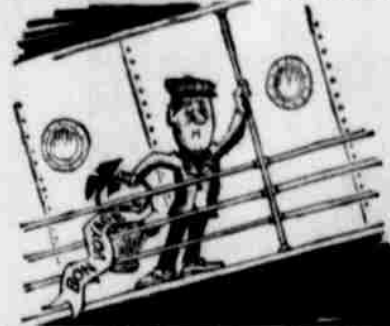
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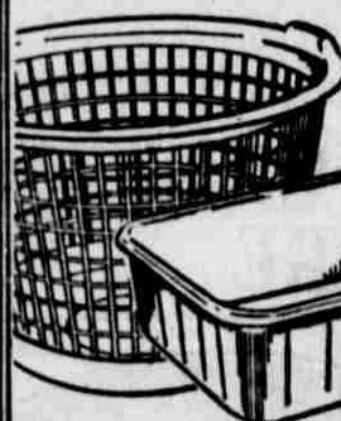
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
