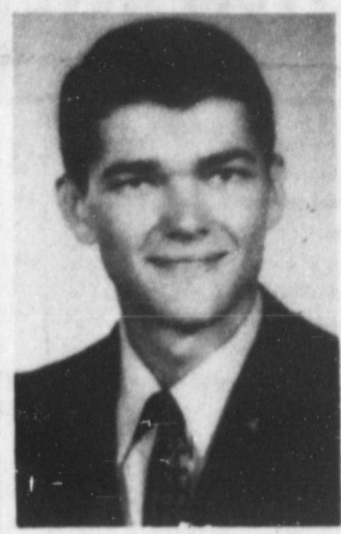

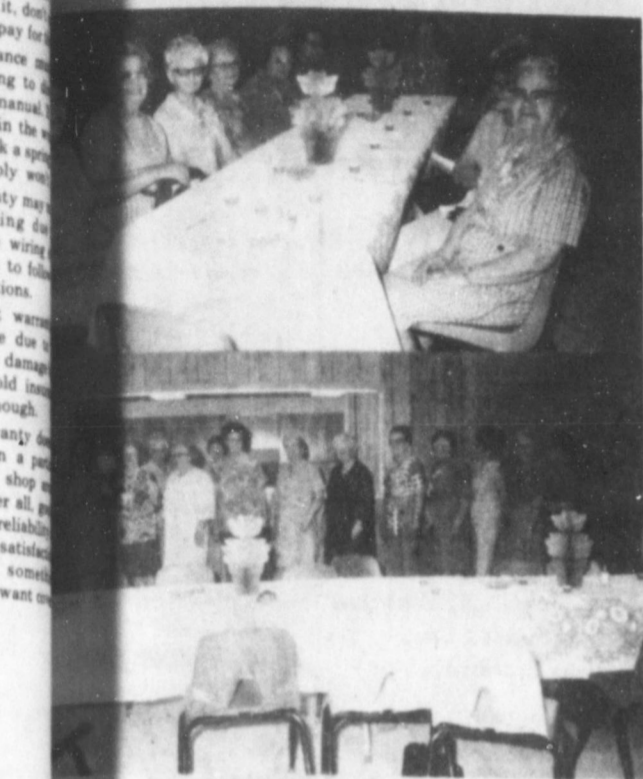

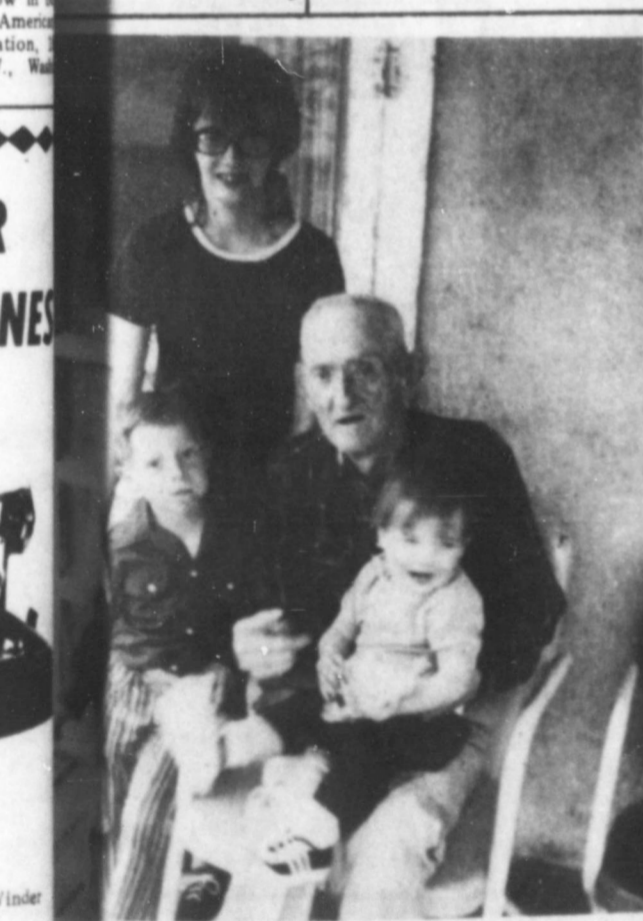

As It Looks From Here

AFTER THREE DAYS of debate the U. S. House of Representatives last week passed a Bill on environmental protection with a price tag of \$24.6 billion. Knowledgeable estimates indicate that the cost will soar to \$35 billion before the provisions are fully implemented.

THE ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION AGENCY, created to administer the program already has over \$2 billion appropriated to it and has yet to really get off the ground. To use these sums of money they will have to spend as if were going out of style.

OF COURSE EVERYONE IS FOR cleaning up and preserving our environment. The effort should have been started in an orderly way long ago but since present conditions didn't get that way overnight, corrections and remedies can't be made to work overnight either.

THE EXPERTS HAVE YET to agree on the many approaches to curing the problem. Wide disagreement exists on what pollutes our air and water and about what should be done. For instance, not long ago certain phosphate detergents were blamed

and condemned. A few weeks later other experts said not so.

ANOTHER EXAMPLE IS THE emissions from leaded gasoline. Last year the Administration proposed a \$4.00 per pound tax on lead to eliminate its use for octane support in gasoline. Something called aromatics was to take the place of lead to maintain the octane level until automobile engines can be built to run effectively on low octane fuel. This was supported by a group of "experts" but another group of seemingly qualified scientists came along and found, after research and testing, that aromatics are more polluting than lead.

THE GOALS FOR A CLEAN and wholesome surrounding are indeed laudable. Conditions in some places in the country are deplorable and to some degree or other threaten human and animal life. There should be both scientific and common sense efforts at eliminating these useless hazards. It can be done without squandering billions of dollars and doing needless injury to property and industry. Money alone is not going to clean up our surroundings.

WHILE INFLATION CONTINUES TO EAT away at the economy, some things being proposed can have no other effect than to increase the price of things to pay for costs of meeting required standards. Just as safety requirements for automobiles, some of which have dubious value, run up the price, so will some of the demands on industry increase costs of many products we all have to buy.

THE ANNUAL BUDGET OF THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT has committed to it 72 percent in uncontrolled costs. In other words, the Congress has discretion over only approximately 28 percent of total expenditures. One of the best examples of fixed spending is the \$22 billion interest on public debt. And so on and on the Legislative Branch has abdicated its responsibility over the purse strings. Our friend Congressman George Mahon, Chairman of the Appropriations Committee, agrees that those of us who claim fiscal responsibility can protect our credibility only by opposing the procedures followed in the measure passed last week. It further adds to spending over which the Congress has no control.

THE BILL AS PASSED DOES NOT permit a year-to-year appropriation, as is the case in most all other programs. There is no annual review of the whether the program is working or whether it needs more or less money. A lump sum of \$24.6 billion is provided for a three year period with little or no control by the Congress which responsible for these purse strings of this Nation. 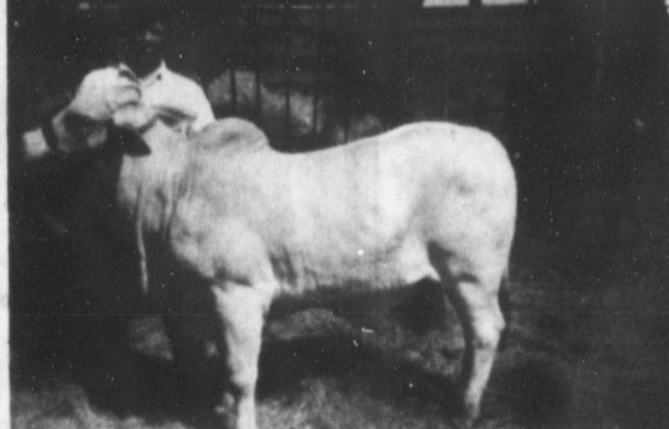

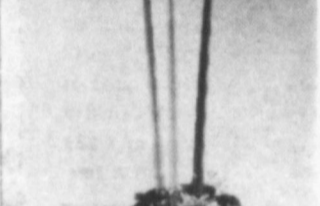
THE LOWDOWN ON PRICES

Byron Tunnell Announces for Railroad Commission

Byron Tunnell, vigorous young Chairman of the Railroad Commission of Texas, has announced for election to his second full term on the Commission. His election last year as Chairman

established him as the youngest presiding officer of the agency in Texas history.

Tunnell is a graduate of Tyler public schools and Baylor University Law School. Prior to his Commission service he was a practicing trial attorney in Tyler. The candidate is a Navy Air Corps veteran of World War II.

This East Texan has already made a mark as one of Texas' great advocates of conservation of the state's natural resources. Tunnell, in accepting the Chairmanship of the Commission, pledged the full force and effect of the agency to conservation for the economic and ecological welfare of all Texans.

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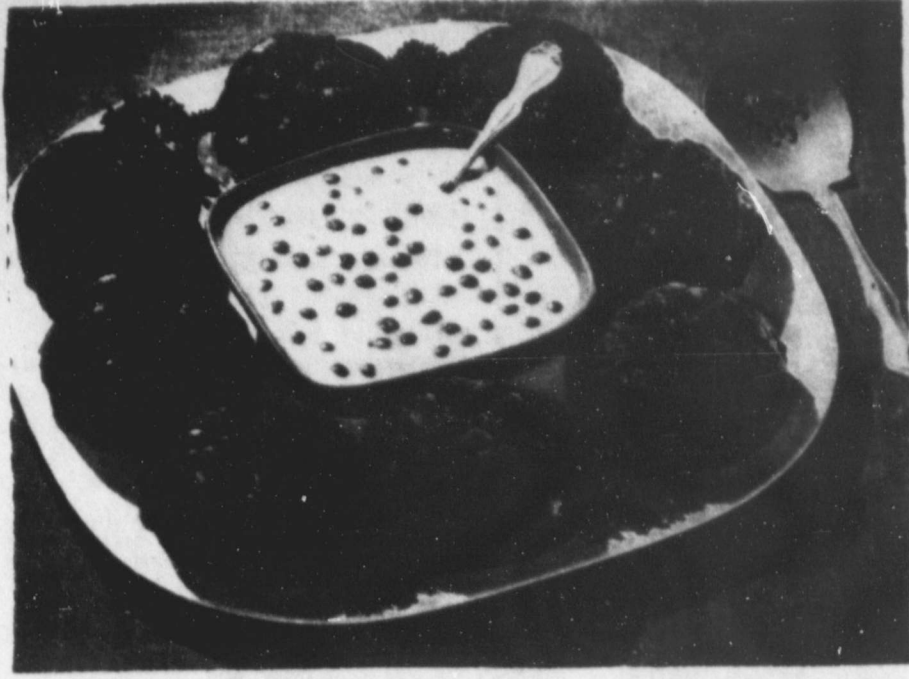

Individual Ham Loaves

2 lbs. ground ham
1 lb. ground lean beef
2 cups soft bread crumbs
1/4 cup chopped onion
1/4 cup chopped green pepper
1/8 teaspoon pepper
1/8 teaspoon cloves
1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
1 can cream of celery soup
2 eggs, beaten
1 cup tomato juice
Catsup for basting

Combine ingredients in the order listed, mixing thoroughly. Shape individual loaves, using about 3/4 cup of mixture per loaf. Make a crosswise slash in the top of each loaf and drizzle with catsup. Place in a shallow baking pan. Bake in slow oven (325°F.) 45 minutes to 1 hour. Serve with bowl of creamed peas. Makes 12 small ham loaves.

Upside Down Ham Loaf

2 lbs. ground ham
1 lb. ground lean beef or veal
1 cup soft bread crumbs
1 teaspoon horseradish sauce
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1 1/2 cups thick, tart applesauce, strained
2 eggs, slightly beaten
UPSIDE-DOWN MIXTURE
1/4 cup brown sugar
1/2 teaspoon dry mustard
5 to 6 pineapple slices, halved
1 cup pineapple juice for basting
Combine meats with bread crumbs and seasonings. Blend

in apple sauce and eggs, mixing well. Combine brown sugar and mustard, and sprinkle on the bottom of a well-buttered 9 1/4-by 5 1/4-by 2 3/4-inch loaf pan. Lay halved pineapple slices over brown sugar. (Apple slices, prunes, apricots, or peaches may be substituted for the pineapple). Pack meat mixture lightly on top. Bake in moderate oven (350°F.) for 1 1/2 hours. Baste several times with pineapple juice. Serves 8. Unmold, bottom side up. Garnish with pineapple and parsley.

Green Thumb Tips

When you order seeds this year why don't you consider the collections offered in the catalogs? There are collections offered of vegetables such as peas, consisting of several varieties to be planted at one time for a continuous crop. There also are collections of flower seeds of several or many kinds. Any of these will save you money. Why not look in your catalogs for these offers?

The kind of soil used to cover seeds is important. If it happens to be clay it is likely to form a hard crust when the sun dries it. Small seedlings, just sprouting, often cannot push through such a crust. So, instead of covering seeds with clay, mix a special cover-upper of half sand and half granulated peat moss and give the seedlings a chance.

Everyone has a shade problem because everyone who lives in a house has a north side on which there is no sun.

That's why every gardener should be familiar with and grow the plants that thrive in shade. These include coleus, impatiens, begonias (tuberous and fibrous-rooted), balsam, browallia and lobelia so that you have plenty of choice.

Do you still remember where you planted asters last year? Avoid that place when you plant them again.

While it is true that many modern varieties of asters are "wilt-resistant" and will not readily contract that disease, it is also true that "resistant" doesn't mean "immune".

The best way to insure healthy asters is to sow seeds in a different area of the garden every year. Aster wilt is soil-borne and may exist in soil used last year.

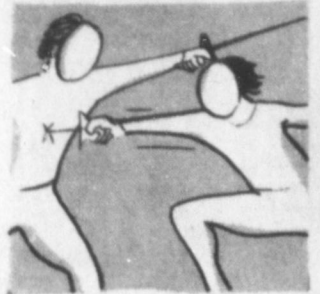
Play At Your Own Risk

Eddie and the corner grocer were boon companions. Often, when business was slow, the two men would engage in friendly scuffling around the store. One day, the grocer shoved Eddie a little too vigorously. Eddie lost his footing, fell against the counter, and cracked two ribs.

That ended their friendship. In short order, Eddie sued the grocer for damages on grounds of assault and battery. But a court turned him down, saying his claim was barred by the doctrine of "assumption or risk."

This doctrine has wide application in all kinds of playful and recreational activities.

"One who takes part in a sport," said one court, "accepts the dangers that are obvious and necessary, just as a fencer accepts the risk of a thrust by his antagonist."



Most often, the doctrine has been applied in golf. Thus:

A golfer shanked an iron shot, and his ball struck another player standing far to the right. Admittedly, he had not yelled "Fore!" before taking his swing. Nevertheless, he could not fairly have foreseen danger to anyone so far out of range.

Result: a court ruled that the victim should not collect damages. The court said this was the kind of risk he had assumed by going onto a golf course in the first place.

But the doctrine does not apply to risks that are not "natural" to the sport—that are due instead of somebody's misconduct.

In another case two fishermen were sitting in a rowboat when one, trying to make a backward cast, hooked his companion in the cheek. Sued later for damages, he sought refuge in the doctrine of assumption of risk. "Accidents," he said, "will happen."

But the court said accidents like this will not happen if fishermen are reasonably careful with their hooks. The victim had not assumed a risk, said the court, that was preventable by plain common sense.
