
700 Attracted To The Fair Saturday





In effect a dilute soap solution, the wetting agent dis-persed the particles evenly over the individual fibers without causing them to stick together. It actually tended to lubricate the fibers.

The iron can be washed away at any point. There is little likelihood of chemically altering the cellulose. The fabric thus could be chem-ically treated for a variety of effects such as durable press

or flame resistance. Cotton processing tech-niques have remained es-sentially the same over the past 200 years and scientists see the possibility of elimi-nating a number of steps through making the fibers respond to magnetic forces.
