yourself upon landing. She said she did make very good landings all the times she jumped and received no injuries

The parachute training center where Miss Perry is receiving her instruction is the Elmdole Parachute Service, one and a half miles east of Old Abilene Town on IH20 access road.

Miss Perry jumped from a height of 3,000 feet. Profession al free fall skydivers leave the airplane at heights of 13,000 feet and fall earthward at speeds of up to 120 m.p.h. before the chute opens at about 1,600 feet above the ground. By maintaining absolute control of their body during the fall they can land within a 1,000 foot circle target area. They reach

the ground going only 2 m.p.h. And there seems to be no end to her interest. After she masters skydiving, she plans to become an airplane pilot, she




