# Cotton Spraying Is In Full Progress

County cotton farmers in the north part of the county are being sprayed in the Cotton Diapause Insect Control program. The spray program is in its third week in the county.

A total of 131 fields were sprayed during the first week, with 44 sprayed the second week and 71 during the third week. Farms are sprayed if boll weevil counts are ten percent in higher infested on each field. Malathion is the in-

secticide being used in

the control program. Sprayed at the rate of 16 ounces per acre, the spray program is aimed to keep the ball weevil from going into hibernation and to decrease the population next year.

The 1973 spray program completes the 10th year that the boll weevil diapause control program has been in effect. Other research is being done in Kent County to study the habits of the boll weevil, egg laying, hibernation, migration,

A recent New York Times survey showed the number of American tourists visiting Europe this year had declined, and that those who did tour the Old World were spending less freely.

More Americans have always traveled abroad than the reverse, and the money gap caused by this outflow of dollars is one of the causes of U.S. payments deficits in recent years, though a relatively minor one in the huge 1971 and 1972 deficits.

The fall of the once-mighty dollar, of course, has helped cause slowed tourism. It has, for Americans, sharply pushed up prices of everything along with inflation, so that Europe is no longer cheap by American standards. In fact, a good meal in European restaurants today costs more than at home.


