Indians Bomb Bluecats; Try Anson Tigers Friday Night

The annual pancake supper, sponsored by the Haskell Lions Club, is slated tomorrow night, Friday, November 7, from 5:00-7:15 p. m. at the high school lunchroom.

The pancake supper, which will be held just prior to the Haskell-Anson Homecoming football game at 8:00 p. m. in Indian stadium, is expected to draw a large crowd, as has been the custom in the past.

Tickets for \$1.00 each may be purchased from any member of the Lions Club, or tickets may be obtained at the door during the time of the supper.

Money raised from the project, which is headed by C. O. Holt, chairman, will be earmarked for the Goodfellow Fund to help less fortunate families in Haskell at Christmas time.

The rampaging Haskell Indians added another "notch" to their big guns last Friday night as they continued their unbeaten string by clobbering the Bluecats at Coleman to the tune of 40-14.

The Indians are now all alone in first place in 7-AA, following the Anson Tigers' upset over Hamlin. The locals have two games remaining, as they meet Anson here Friday night, and then journey to Hamlin Friday night, November 14.

Haskell's victory over Coleman pushed their string to eight wins and no losses this season, with five of those tilts being conference games.

Against Coleman, the running of Keith Everett, Charles Franklin and the passing of "Quickie" quarterback Lanny Ivy proved too much for the host Bluecats.

Everett put Haskell two touchdowns up in the first period on runs of four and 35 yards. Fleet-footed Franklin had a 42-yard run in the second quarter and Ivy passed 32 yards to Donald Love for another score. Franklin capped the Haskell point production with two scores of 15 and 45 yards in the third period.

The roaring Haskell Indians will take on the Anson Tigers here tomorrow night, Friday, November 7th, in a big "Homecoming" tilt at Indian Stadium. Haskell tripped the Tigers 32-6 in a non-conference game played in Anson on September 12th, the opening battle of this season. But Friday night's game will be for "keeps" and the Tigers are apt to furnish stiff competition come Friday night, since they knocked-off Hamlin.

Indian Stadium is expected to be packed for the game of the week, which will see the crowning of the "Homecoming Queen."

Judgment Of County Court Is Affirmed

The Eastland County Court of Civil Appeals handed down its opinion on Friday, October 31, 1969, affirming the judgment of the County Court of Haskell County, Texas wherein Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Kittley were awarded damages in the sum of \$10,878.60 for an easement across their land for construction of an electric transmission line.

The case was tried in Haskell in County Judge B. O. Robertson's County Court, January 23 and 24, 1969.

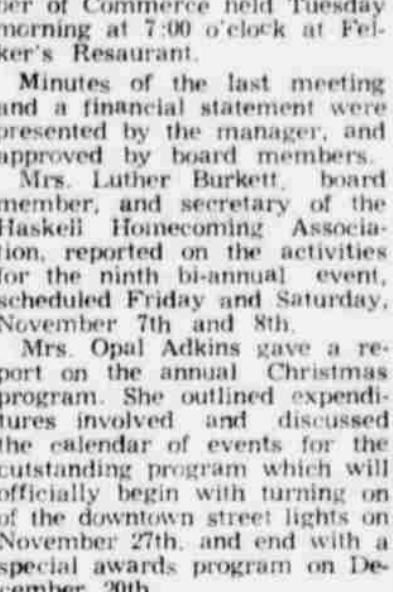

Bishop Kenneth Copeland To Be Homecoming Speaker Here

Bishop Kenneth W. Copeland, who serves the Texas and Gulf Coast Conference of the United Methodist Church, and former pastor of the Haskell Methodist Church, will be the featured speaker at the ninth bi-annual meeting of the Haskell Homecoming to be held here Friday and Saturday, November 7th and 8th.

Bishop Copeland has been invited to address the homecoming group at 3:00 p. m. Saturday, November 8th, at the General Assembly at the Haskell First United Methodist Church.

He was born April 3, 1912, in Bexar, Arkansas, son of the Reverend and Mrs. John Wesley Copeland, pastor of Bexar Circuit of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

On October 5, 1933, he was united in marriage to Catherine Andrews of San Angelo. Two daughters were born to the family: Patricia Ann (now Mrs. J. W. Ard, Jr., of Dallas), and Martha Sue (now Mrs. Preston Dial, Jr., of San Antonio).

Bishop Copeland's ministry began as an Ordained Elder in the Methodist Protestant Church in Oklahoma at the age of 19. In 1938 he was elected president of the Texas Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church, and led his conference into Methodist union in 1939. Pastors include: Corsicana, Cooper, Wichita Falls, Haskell, San Antonio, and Stillwater, Oklahoma.

He was elected a Bishop at the South Central Jurisdictional Conference meeting in San Antonio, June 24, 1960, and was consecrated at the altar of Travis Park Church where he

Great Plains Conservation Program Funds Released to County Producers

Approximately \$52,000 of Great Plains Conservation Program funds were released this week to Haskell County producers.

According to J. C. Yeary, Jr., District Conservator for the Soil Conservation Service at Haskell, these funds will be used to obligate contracts under the GPCP that have been pending since before July.

Contracts were prepared with Leonard Weise of Irby Community, R. G. Walton of Paint Creek Community, H. L. and Kenneth Lane of Haskell, and Delma Williams of Rule, cooperating with the California Creek Soil and Water Conservation District. Contracts were also prepared with Lee Roy Schaske and C. G. and T. V. Burson of Haskell, cooperating with the Wichita-Brazos SWCD.

Yeary stated that these contracts brought the total contracts in Haskell County to 154. Seventy-eight of these are still active while 76 contracts have been completed and have expired.

"Over \$500,000 has been spent for soil and water conservation practices in the county," Yeary said, "since 1962 through the Great Plains Program. This doesn't include funds for personal services or by the producers as matching funds. It would be almost impossible to arrive at an all inclusive dollar figure the program has profited our people. I would estimate that about 90 per cent of the money spent for the GPCP has been spent right here in Haskell County."

According to Yeary, the Great Plains Program could possibly result in the expenditure of 3 1/2 to 4 million dollars in Haskell County. To make such a figure a reality, Yeary concluded, would take between 600 and 650 producers participating in the program, and with no limitations of funds.

A low of 34 degrees was registered on October 13. Highest reading for the month was a warm 94 degrees on October 10.

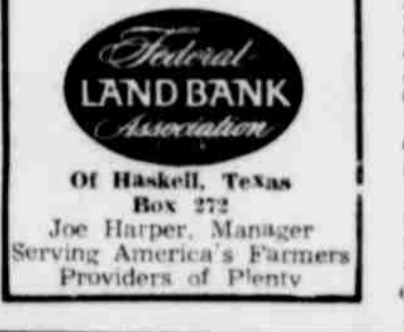

AN ORDINANCE FIXING AND DETERMINING THE GENERAL SERVICE RATE TO BE CHARGED FOR SALES OF NATURAL GAS TO RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL CONSUMERS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF HASKELL, HASKELL COUNTY, TEXAS, AND PROVIDING FOR THE MANNER IN WHICH SUCH RATE MAY BE CHANGED, ADJUSTED AND AMENDED AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HASKELL, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. Effective with the first gas bills rendered after the final approval of this ordinance, the maximum general service rate for sales of natural gas rendered to residential and commercial consumers within the city limits of Haskell by Lone Star Gas Company, a Texas corporation, its successors and assigns, is hereby fixed and determined as follows:

First 800 cu. ft. or fraction thereof \$1.956 Gross; \$1.76 Net.

Next 1,200 cu. ft. @ \$1.7267 per Mcf Gross; \$1.554 per Mcf Net.

Next 3,000 cu. ft. @ \$1.1711 per Mcf Gross; \$1.054 per Mcf Net.

Next 20,000 cu. ft. @ \$0.8933 per Mcf Gross; \$0.804 per Mcf Net.

All over 25,000 cu. ft. @ \$0.8378 per Mcf Gross; \$0.754 per Mcf Net.

No gas bill will be rendered to any residential or commercial consumer served under the above rate not consuming any gas during any monthly billing period.

ADJUSTMENT

The amount of each net monthly bill computed at the above stated rates shall be subject to the following adjustment: Plus an amount equivalent to the proportionate part of any new tax, or increased tax, or any other governmental imposition, rental, fee or charge (except state, county, city and special district ad valorem taxes and taxes on net income) levied, assessed or imposed subsequent to July 1, 1969, upon or allocable to the Company's distribution operations, by any new or amended law, ordinance or contract. Each gross monthly bill shall be adjusted proportionately, Company, at its option, may forego the application of this adjustment; however, failure of Company to apply such adjustment shall not constitute a waiver of Company's right from time to time, or at any time, to make such adjustment, in whole or in part, in any subsequent current monthly bill that may be applicable to such bill.

Net rate shall apply to all bills paid within ten days from monthly billing date; gross rate shall be applicable thereafter.

The above rate is applicable to each residential and commercial consumer per month or for any part of a month for which gas is used at the same location.

In addition to the aforesaid rates, Company shall have the right to collect such reasonable charges as are necessary to conduct its business and to carry out its reasonable rules and regulations in effect.

SECTION 2. The rate set forth in Section 1 may be changed and amended by either the City or Company furnishing gas in the manner provided by law. Service hereunder is subject to the orders of regulatory bodies having jurisdiction, and to the Company's Rules and Regulations currently on file in the Company's office.

SECTION 3. The fact that there is an imperative public need for an ordinance fixing and determining the rate for gas and gas service furnished to residential and commercial consumers creates an emergency, and the reading and passage of this ordinance at three separate meetings is hereby suspended and this ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after the date of its passage at a single meeting and the approval thereof by the Mayor.

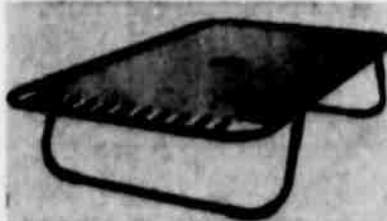

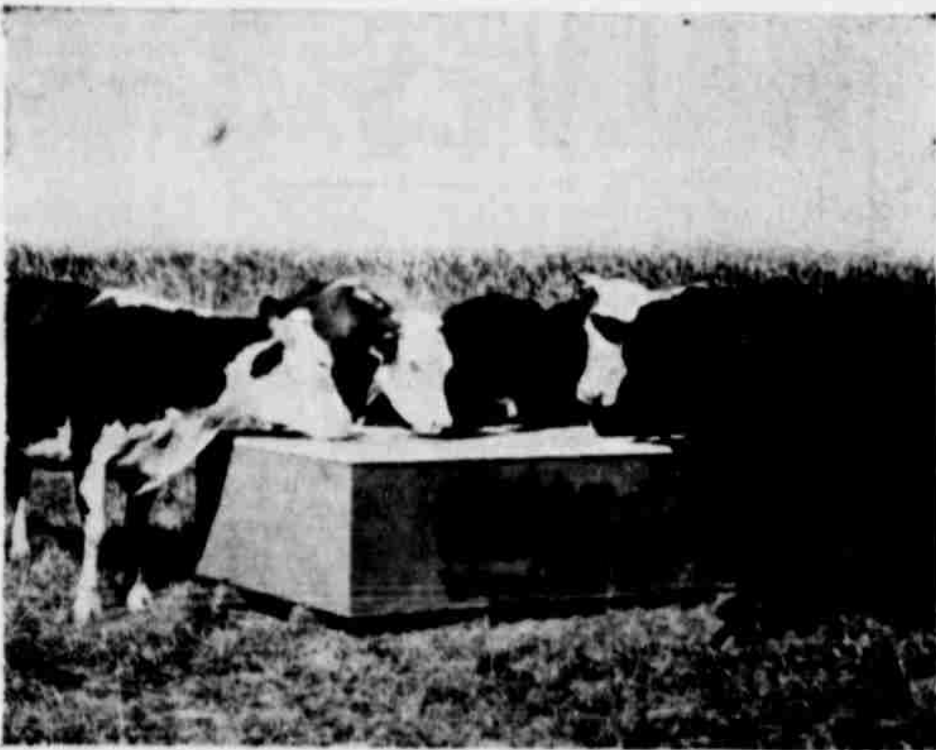

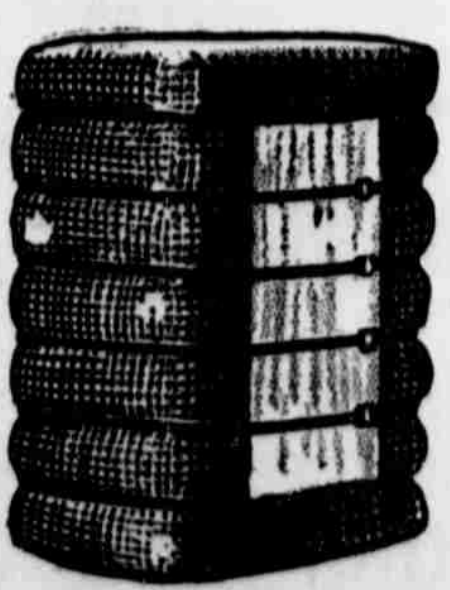

VETERANS DAY

This day, Veterans Day, November 11, 1969, was first observed as Armistice Day. Silence had fallen across Europe at 11:00 A. M. November 11, 1918, ending World War I. This is still a day of hope, fifty-one years having passed since that eventful day. Over 4 1/2 million men represented the United States during this great conflict, World War I. Over 126,000 men would not be coming home, having paid the supreme sacrifice for their country. They were remembered in services beginning on November 11, 1921. In 1926, Armistice Day was the official name given this day of observation. In 1938 Congress proclaimed the date a legal public holiday.

The hopes and dreams of mankind were shattered just one year later, in 1939, when World War II began. America again responded to the challenge. Over 16 million men were called to forsake peaceful pursuits and bear arms for the protection of our allies.

Twice since that date, Americans have come to the aid of oppressed people, once in Korea, and now in Vietnam. When communist forces invaded Korea and South Vietnam, we came to the aid of those suffering people who had visions of living in a land that was free.

We Americans still maintain hope for peace in the world today, even though battles continue to rage in the jungles of Vietnam. We will not accept a peace of slavery, but a peace of honor and dignity.

As we observe Veterans Day 1969, we pause to remember the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, a symbol of all American fighting men who paid with their lives, that the living might enjoy enduring freedom. More than one million men have given their lives in this endeavor.

Veterans of all wars of the United States now number more than 39 million. Of this number, there are some 414,000 women veterans. There are more than 27 million of these veterans alive today. We have a tremendous responsibility and owe a great debt to these veterans who have given us our dearly cherished freedom.

To this very special group of Americans, we owe a pledge of assurance that we are worthy of the many sacrifices they have made and are making at this moment, in order that we may remain a free nation.

We face the future with confidence and hope that world peace will come because of the actions and deeds of our veterans of past wars and our men who fight today on the battlefields of Vietnam.

Today, Veterans Day, 1969, we salute those heroes of past wars and our fighting men of today, who are preserving our democracy. We honor those who died for freedom's sake, and we pledge to those who live that we will remember with reverence their contributions to our freedom.

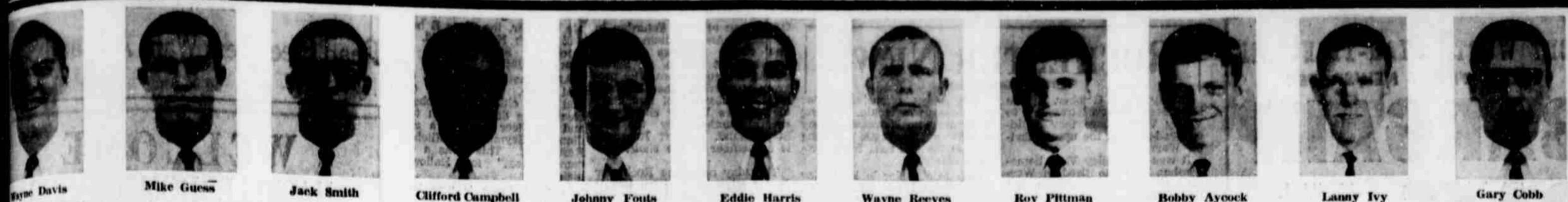
