bill authorizing Health Maintenance Or ganizations in Texas was defeated in the last session of the Legislature. The State Board of Insurance, under the leader of Chairman Joe Christie, is now studying whether under other legislation, the Board has the authority to approve HMOs.

Few debated the merit of HMOs. The major controversy developed over who should control them, the physicians who deliver the services or the laymen who use them.

Lay control over professional services is not un-American. It has worked effectively for other professional services, and it can work as well in medicine.

We must not allow the controversy over control to deny Texans the same advantages HMOs have provided citizens of many other states.

to check food price in -"But it's also the quickest way to increase dust storms, sediment pollution, and other erosion problems unless sound

conservation measures are installed," Butler pointed out.

There is a lot of land in our Duck Creek Soil and Water Conservation District which can be used for cropland safely if managed properly," Butler said. "Yet there are other soils which are so susceptible to blowing or washing that they should never be used for crop production."

Butler said he hopes farmers will use soil survey information available from his office before putting new land in

cultivation. 'Soil surveys have been made on (all) the land in Kent County Butler said, 'These surveys show which soils are best suited for crop production and which soils are most susceptible to erosion. They can also show which soils are most productive."

SCS is giving top prior-ity helping farmers plan conservation measures on new land brought into cultivation. For information, contact the local SCS office at Jayton, Texas telephone 237-2624.

As It Looks

No one is sure at what place on the rappahannock George Washington sailed the dollar across or for sure whether he did at all. What is for sure, if measured in terms purchasing power today it would have fallen short if tossed at the narrowest

point. By reason of the dollar's shrinkage, and possibly other reasons, thought is being given to resurrecting the \$2 bill. The Federal Reserve is reportedly giving being reportedly giving serious consideration to the idea and the Bureau of Printing and Engraving is looking on it as a way of reducing cost of running off \$1 bills.

The \$2 bill was always sort of minor curiosity. It never gained wide circulation but perhaps it was just ahead of its time.

It seems this bill denomination always had sort of a bad reputation. Some of it supposedly stems from its use in buying votes in the Presidential Election of 1880. They were convenient at the racetracks where they matched the basic bet and for other purposes of a rough and rowdy nature.

The first \$2 bills were printed in 1862 and bore "I think I'll call that one the portrait of Alexander a hippopotamus," Eve said. Hamilton, then Secretary of the Treasury. Mr. "I don't know . . . the \$2 bill was somewhat

unlucky. A more likely explanation is that people often spent or received in payment, the bill, assuming it to be of \$1 denomination. A bill of larger size would have had more attention and hence less error.

Anyway, because the \$2 bill was in less use than was thought to justify its printing and engraving, it was discontinued in 1965. At that time there were only relatively few of these bills-about \$135 million worth-in circulation. (By that time the picture of Madison had been replaced with the face of ThomasJefferson.) Most of those in circulation in 1965 were really out of circulation in that they were tucked away in the back of wallets or dresser drawers as collector's items or for

sentimental reasons. In considering the re-vival of the \$2 bill, suggestions are made that it carry the picture of Susan B. Anthony, the great 19th Century fighter for women's rights. This sounds like a good idea since there has been no woman's image on our currency and since M s. Anthony bravely dedicated herself to that crusade which, in that day, hardly met the approval of many. She endured with patience and perseverance to accomplish what then seemed the impossible.



A Weekly Report Of Agri-Business News

Of The Texas Department of Agriculture John C. White, Commissioner

Grain Stocks Decline . . . Livestock Sales Decrease . . . Egg Production Drops . . . Poultry Hatchings

Both in Texas and throughout the nation, stocks of the four feed grains-corn, oats, barley and sorghum-show declines as of Oct. 1.

In Texas, the stocks of the four feed grains are set at 52,000,000 bushels, down 40,000,000 bushels from a year ago. Grain sorghum was responsible for most of the decrease. Corn stocks are below a year ago, but stocks of oats and barley are above a year ago.

Wheat stocks in all positions in Texas is estimated to be 18 per cent below a year ago.

Old Crop grain sorghum stocks are 67 per cent under a year ago, the lowest level since 1954. Corn stocks of old crop grain is 49 per cent below a year ago.

Oat stocks are up 11,300,000 bushels from a year ago; barley stocks are 1,200,000 higher than a year ago, and rye stocks are 84,000 bushels more than a year ago.

Nationwide, stocks of all grains are down 26 per cent.

SALES of cattle, calves, sheep, goats and hogs in Texas are below year ago totals, the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service notes.

Cattle and calves marketed through auctions in Texas during September numbered 602,000 head, 15 per cent below a year ago and 33 per cent below the previous

Sheep sales during September totaled 75,000 head; this is 41 per cent below a year ago and 54 per cent below a month ago. Goat sales during September totaled 33,000 head; this is 28 per cent below last year and 13 per cent

Hog sales totaled 37,000 head, this is both 18 per cent below a month ago and a year ago.

EGG production statewide during September is four per cent below a year ago and two per cent under last month. Nationwide, egg production was down four per cent from the past year and three per cent less than August

Texas layers totaled 11,100,000 during September, two per cent below a year ago but one per cent above August. The number of layers throughout the nation declined four per cent from last year, but showed a one per cent increase from last month.

PRODUCTION of egg-type chicks, broilers, chicks, and turkey poults in Texas is up from a year ago. Nationwide, the trend is also true.

The September hatch of egg-type chicks in Texas is up two per cent from a year ago and 10 per cent from a month earlier. The match of broiler chicks increased two per cent from a year ago but was three per cent less than the preceding month

The total poult hatch was more than double that of a year ago, but was four per cent below a month ago.

THE 1972 county statistics for Texas Agriculture production are now available. Single county sheets are available on request.

The entire book contains agricultural production information for all 254 counties in Texas-from Anderson through Zapata.

Information includes total gross income for each county, production and value of each commodity in individual counties, and totals for livestock and poultry production as well.



Collision With Ambulance

Driving home from work, Harat a busy intersection. In short order he found himself facing a charge of "failing to yield the

But in court, Harold came up with the following facts in his 1) that the traffic light had

been in his favor;
2) that he had not heard the iren because he had his winows up and his radio on; and 3) that he had not seen the mbulance until the last moment. because other cars were obscur-



gent in Harold's conduct, and missed the charge.

Traffic codes generally do give pecial privileges to ambulances. However, these privileges are not bsolute. In case of a collision between an ambulance and a private car, the court will weigh the entire situation on its merits. Furthermore, ambulances have privileges only when there is (or at least appears to be) a true

emergency. Thus, in another case, an ambulance that was merely returning to its home office was held not entitled to go through a stop

And an ambulance transport ing a patient to the hospital, with no apparent need for haste, was held not entitled to disregard a red light. Still, in most situations, the

ambulance's right-of-way will be upheld. One indignant citizen decided this preference was a form of unfair discrimination against the motoring public. But when he challenged it in court, the judge held that he had no kick coming.

"The grant of special privileges to an emergency vehicle," said the judge, "is a proper exercise of the police power of the state. When human life may be at stake, prompt performance of the duties imposed upon drivers of emergency vehicles is impera-
