HASKELL GETS AIRPORT FUND

AUSTIN, TEXAS: **Texas Aeronautics Com**mission has granted the City of Haskell \$27,500 to help build an airport.

The project was one of 18 approved Tuesday with allocations totalling \$324,500.

The money will be used to acquire land, clear zone easements, and construct a northsouth runway, taxiway and apron. The runway will not be large enough to handle jets, but could handle most propellerdriven aircraft.

The \$27,500 is the largest amount allowed to be allocated in one year by the TAC to any one community by law. However, subsequent appropriations in different years are possible, and Haskell will probably get one for the installation of lighting in order to make it 24-hour airport. a

Historically, the TAC has always approved subsequent appropriations for lighting and safety features when the original allotment was not enough to cover the cost.

VIETNAM VIEW

(As reported by Marine Corps Combat Correspondents) By Sgt. John McGowan DA NANG, Vietnam — With

northing more than courage, a little deception and two fragmentation grenades, a 20-year-old Texas Marine singlehanded-ly assaulted and destroyed an enemy bunker that had pinned his company down with heavy automatic weapons and machine gun fire.

Cpl, Alfredo Erigas (809 Madrid Ave., San Antonio, Texas), a squad leader with "C" Co., 1st Bn., 7th Marine Regt., was manning his position when his company came under heavy gun fire while sweeping an area 16 miles southwest of here.

"When the enemy soldiers in the bunker opened up on us I knew we were in trouble," stat-ed Erigas. 'With the bunker in the treeline and us in the open, they just about had us where they wanted us...down.'

With each attempted assault virtually halted before it began, the Marines called in artillery and air strikes. "As soon as the artillery and air strikes would let up, the enemy bunker would open up again with their auto-matic fire," stated 2nd Lt. An-thony H. Yusi, 22 (Kaneohe Bay, Hawaii). "They were well dug in and looking for us."

Grabbing a pouch of fragmentation grenades, Erigas began to make his way toward the 2nd platoon, which was taking the brunt of the fire, "When got to the platoon's position, I tossed three grenades at the bunker ... with no results," related Erigas. "Then I tried a one-man envelopment.

Stripping to the waist, the 20year-old Texan grabbed two grenades and donned a helmet. "When I was ready to go, one my friends kidded me and said I looked like an NVA. I remember smiling and telling him that if the NVA saw me I hoped they would think the
