October 19-25 Has Been Proclaimed As National Business Women's Week

National Business Women's Week October 19-25 has been proclaimed by Mayor H. V. Woodard as a salute to all working women with emphasis on the Golden Anniversary of both the Texas and the National Federation of Business & Professional Women's Clubs.

The National Federation was formed in a four-day meeting of 212 women from widely diverse backgrounds and geographical sections sharing the interests of all business and professional women in St. Louis in 1919. The National Federation story is a saga of Modern Women influenced by events that had gone before and by the winds of change to come. The first year, 1919-20, drew 25,541 working women to the Business and Professional Women ranks. A non-partisan, non-sectarian, non-profit, self-supporting and self-governing organization, the National Federation of Business & Professional Women's Clubs now has a membership of 178,491 working Business & Professional women in the fifty states of our Nation, the District of Columbia, the Virgin Islands and Puerto Rico. The National Federation is a Member of the International Federation of Business & Professional Women.

In July 1919, Dr. Minnie L. Maffett was installed as the first president of the Texas Federation. The Federation objectives are as timely and vibrant as they were in 1919:

To elevate the standards for women in business and in the professions; To promote the interest of business and professional women; To bring about a spirit of cooperation among business and professional women of the United States; To extend opportunities to business and professional women through education along lines of industrial, scientific and vocational activities.

With a membership of approximately 8,000 members the Texas Federation of Business and Professional Women can indeed point with pride at the accomplishments over the past half century during which they have contributed immeasurably to the effort of bringing dignity and self-fulfillment to millions of working women. With this firm base of 50 years of service to working women, the Federation insures fulfillment of its promise of 50 more years of dedicated service through a program of Build, Plan, Work for Membership.

On the local level, the Haskell Business and Professional Women's Club was organized in 1955 with the same objectives as the National and State Federations of which the Club is a part. The local Club includes in its projects Books to County Library, Easter and Christmas remembrances to Abilene State School, Valentine gifts to residents of local rest homes, sponsor of the Christmas Home Lighting, assistance to Hey-Day activities and Railroad Museum and scholarship to high school students. An annual event of the Club is the Tasting Bee held each year in March. The funds from this event go to the scholarship which is presented each year to an outstanding Business student.

Stitching And Stewing

Neat, carefully arranged storage space for clothing and accessories has a lot to do with how you look.

Organize for space, time and beauty by first removing everything from the closet.

Can the rip in the pink shirt be repaired, or would it make a better dust cloth? How about those pants? Will you wear them again? If the answer is no, put them in the rummage bag.

Test anything still usable that you wish to discard. Be honest - you can't afford to waste space on things you haven't worn in years.

Put the current season's clothing back into the closet. Space-savers as shirt hangers, belt loops, shoe and handbag files give the effect of enlarging the closet.

Put the out-of-season wardrobe in garment bags and storage boxes. Contents neatly listed on the outside give a ready reference when you need a stored item.

A look of perfection is easier to achieve when the closet is as well-groomed as the owner.

Spoon Burger
 1/2 cup chopped onion
 1/2 cup chopped celery (can be omitted)
 1/2 cup chopped green pepper
 2 T. margarine or butter
 1 lb. ground beef
 1 T. flour
 1/2 cup tomato catsup
 1/2 cup chili sauce
 1/2 cup water
 1 T. Worcestershire sauce
 1 t. lemon juice
 1/2 t. chili powder
 8 hamburger buns, split and toasted.

Cook onion, celery, green pepper in margarine until tender. Add meat, brown. Drain off excess fat. Blend in flour, add catsup, chili sauce, water and seasonings. Cook, stirring occasionally, about 25 or 30 minutes. Spoon mixture into buns.

Two Rural Accidents Investigated In Haskell County During September

Improvements On F.M. Road 2976 To Proceed

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated two accidents on rural highways in Haskell County during the month of September, according to Sergeant Frank Jirek, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed, one person injured and an estimated property damage of \$1,550.00.

The rural accident summary for this county during the first nine months of 1969 shows a total of 60 accidents resulting in three persons killed, 33 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$36,205.00.

The month of October will bring a drastic change in driving habits. With the return to Central Standard Time on October 26, many motorists will find themselves going to and from work in darkness. The increased hours of darkness will hide dangers otherwise visible during the daylight hours.

The Sergeant listed some factors why driving is more hazardous at night than during the day: (1) Reduced visibility prevents drivers from seeing hazards. (2) It has been longer since most drivers have slept and the resulting fatigue increases reaction time. (3) It is easier for drivers to become confused and panic. (4) More drinking drivers will be on the road.

These factors in varying degrees, coupled with high speed, cause accidents that would not occur in daytime.

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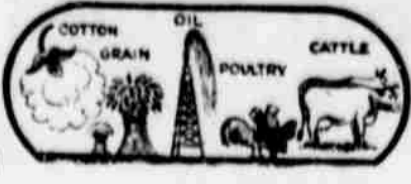

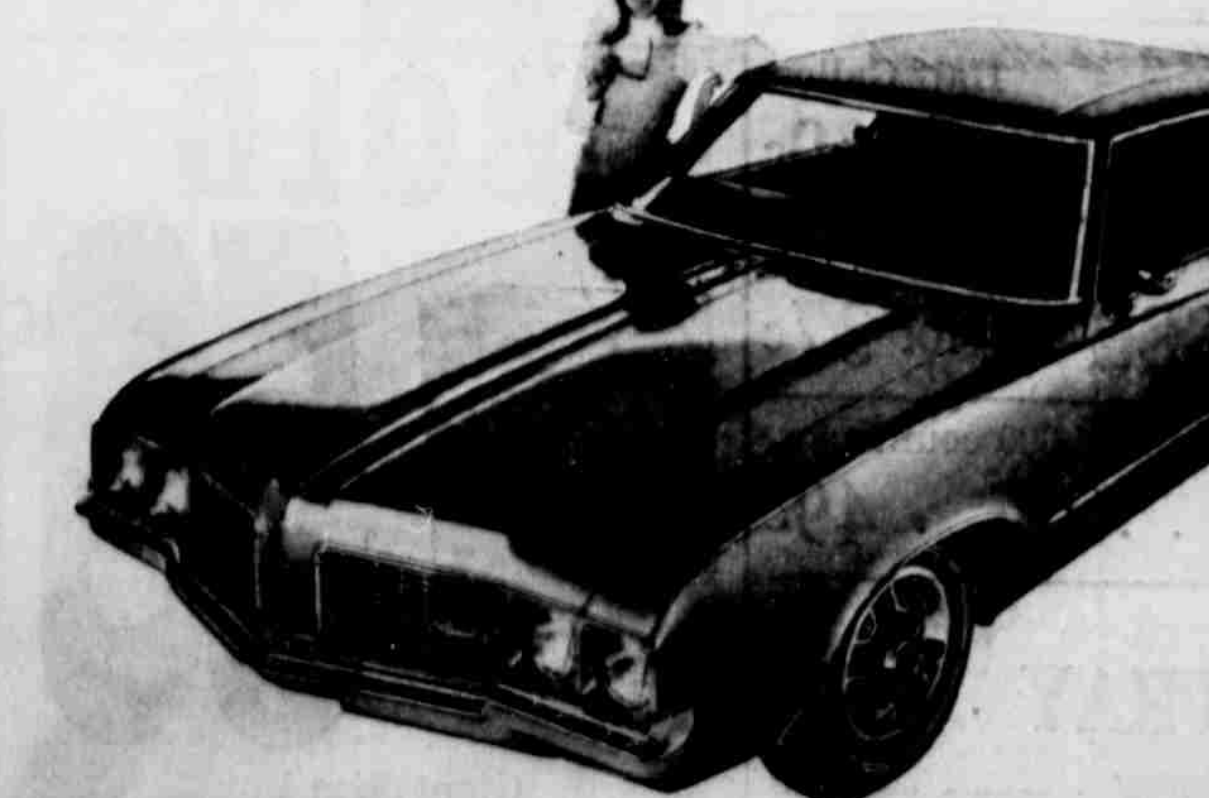
