# SCS Steps Up Efforts To Control Erosion

Edward E. Thomas, State conservationist for SCS, said this week "Local conservation districts and SCS techincians are redoubling their efforts to help farmers and ranchers get new cropland acres under a conservation plan, and to apply measures needed to stop excessive soil erosion.

These include the newer minimum tillage techniques as well as crop rotation, strip croping, terracing, and contour



#### Baptists, Catholics & Women

The Couthern Baptist Convention recently turned down proposals women be ordained as ministers in the church. Standing by the church interpretation that the scriptures specify only men be ordained as ministers, delegates at the recent Dallas convention rejected pleas to "modernize" Baptist practice. The motion to reject the proposal was made by the wife of a Houston minister and carried over-

Thus not everyone believes women should plunge into every pursuit men have traditionally followed. The Southern Baptist position parallels that of the Roman Catholic Church and certain other churches, in general, on this ques-

America, of course, is in the forefront of the movement to grant women the right to enter every field of human behavior heretofore dominated by men. But many obviously believe the idea and goal can be pushed too far-to military combat, for example, or to church ministry.

Even in America those of this persuasion think a line of distinction (libbers say a line of discrimination) should be drawn, in the best interests of both sexes. And since America is leading the women's lib charge, it will be interesting to see if the churches turn out to be that part of the social structure which repels the libber tide, stabilizes some of the existing differences between the sexes-which polls indicate a majority of both sexes, in fact, favor.

#### **Network News**

Recent audience ratings have revealed that the number of viewers of television news is down, from last year, for all three networks. Of the three networks, the biggest decline has been felt by CBS, which had led the other two networks substantially.

The CBS evening news decline is larger than that at NBC and ABC, and a general belief among many is that CBS' stronger preoccupation with Watergate woes, muck-raking and scandal reporting is the reason.

Television reporters such as Dan Rather, who earlier this year attempted on national television to debate the President in a tone many considered disrespectful of the office, and others, have obviously turned off much of the

American viewing public. The obsessive preoccupation on Watergate by too many self-righteous, biased or anti-Nixon reporters h edly wearied some of television's viewing audience, who have grown tired of night after night overemphasis.

Of course, the networks don't admit their bias or preoccupation. Rather, television reporters seem to be busy patting themselves on the back and seeking acclaim from the liberal, the left, and awards, for their zealous efforts. But the American public is souring on too much Watergate from the three New York-based networks, and the audience decline for news shows proves it.

Perhaps if a few million more Americans are wise enough to turn to good newspapers for the news rather than opt for the easy, soft chair route-where they can't really get complete news coverage anyhow-economic considerations might force the networks to curb bias. Economic considerations are, after all, the networks' primary concern.

As some already suspected, medical researchers have recently concluded drinking too much coffee makes one more susceptible to heart

A Boston team, after a study of the habits of many heart attack victims, says those who drank as many as five cups of coffee a day proved twice as likely to have heart attacks as those who drank no coffee at all.

As with cigarette smoking, this result will be challenged; it will be claimed that the individual who drinks coffee is exhibiting worry or strain, which may be the cause of the heart attacks, not coffee. But the recent medical study points to coffee. If you drink it, wisdom suggests a sensible



Do high radio and television towers have a tendency to draw lightning and thereby lessen the danger to lower structures and trees nearby?

High metal towers will often draw electrical discharges from clouds passing low overhead. So will especially tall buildings. Since the electrical charges of clouds are attracted by the nearness of high grounds. like transmission towers. these towers often pull the lightning that would otherwise discharge later, else-

If you live in the vicinity of very tall buildings or high metal towers, these structures will act as the old lightning rods-draw the lightning and ground it harm-

The tendency of these tall towers to attract lightning is recognized to an extent that builders install special lightning devices to carry off the frequent bolts that strike them. In a lightning storm, stay away from such structures, tall trees and any other high objects which might suddenly become a ground for electrical discharge from the clouds.


