Grass strains proven and put into use by SCS include Mason sandhill lovegrass; Selection 75 Kleingrass, El Reno, Uvalde, and Vaughn sideoats grama; King Ranch bluestem, green sprangletop; and Grenville switchgrass.







For the sake of health and convenience, it is wise to take along remedies nost likely to be needed, and especially favorite brands. On a holiday weekend, even simple aspirin may not be headache. And, for those prone to gas pains, unfamiliar foods and overindulgence in food or drink, or anxiety, may intensify the problem. A medication called Phazyme is reported to reduce gas pains and is available in tablet form. It dispels the frothy mass that causes distress.

Gynecologists have report ed that vulvitis and dermatitis may be produced through the use of some scented and "flavored" vaginal sprays and cosmetic douche products.

However, medicinal douche products have their established place, according to many physicians. Trichotine, available in powder and liquid concentrate form, is reported to eliminate the source of odors rather than just mask them. It has been found to be

nonirritating to most women. When a specific disorder such as vaginitis (infection of the vagina) is not present, and douching is desired simply for routine feminine hygiene, physicians recommend that it not be used more than twice a week.

George Jensen, chairman of the National School Calendar Study Committee, says the nation is moving toward 12month school operation. Jensen says within the last three or four years some 249 schools in the nation have gone over to full-year operations.

Jensen claims the present nine-month term was designed to fit the needs of an agricultural nation, that this need no longer applies. He says of the schools which have switched to a year-round operation only one has returned to the ninemonth system.

There are, of course, economic advantages in a 12-month school year. Fewer buildings are needed, for one thing, thus more money can be made available for other educational needs. Major plant facilities and other equipment, including buses, don't 'lie idle and unused for three months.

The question is one which must be decided by local authorities. That question also affects parents, who, if children were given staggered vacations, would often be free to schedule family vacations in months other than summer.

Which is better-arranging for my wife to collect my insurance in a lump sum, or arranging with the insurance company now to pay her so much per month?

A. The lump sum method is better if your wife is good with money - and especially if you want her to use the proceeds to pay off the mortgage, buy a condominium, or make some other major some other major expenditure.

After your death, and be-fore collecting from the insurance company, your wife has the right to tell them to pay monthly, and she'll get the same monthly payments as if you had set it up that way.

But if interest rates are at a very high level, it may pay your wife to get the funds in a lump sum and buy high grade bonds with them, rather than leaving the money at a lower rate of interest with the insurance company.

On the other hand, if your wife is inexperienced at being responsible for a large sum of money, and if you think it might be unwise or burdensome to her to saddle her with the investment responsibility, having the insurance company pay the funds monthly is a safe, sensible idea.

The main things to rememlær: if you leave a lump sum, and if your wife would prefer monthly payments, the nsurance company will pay her monthly; but if you stip ulate monthly payments, even if your wife doesn't like it, she can't lump it.

Are the fish in your favor ite waterway competing with litter for the end of your line? If so, let's try to follow some helpful hints to clear

It only takes common sense and a little forethought to make sure your boating fun is not the cause of water pollution. Here's how: Always include a garbage

bag with take-on-board equipment. As a further assurance against littering, keep a supply of garbage bags on the boat. Any kind of receptacle will do as long as it leaves the boat when you do and not before.

Place food for a day's outing in a sturdy air-tight container. Anything not eaten will remain fresh and undamaged for later use in the container and not stale and soggy in the water.

Inform members of your crew that any litter thrown bverboard must be personally retrieved. There should be no exceptions to this rule.
