County Soil Survey Is Now Available

The Kent County Soil Survey is now off the press and is available for distribution to interested parties by your local Soil Conservation Service office.

This is a very interesting publication and contains a wealth of valuable information that can be used effectively by farmers, ranchers, game managers and sportsmen, engineers, builders, and homeowners.

This information was compiled through many hours of work by Soil Conservation Service Soil Scientists, Engineers, Range Specialists, Biologists, Agronomists, and other specialists.

This publication tells how the soils were formed and how they are classified. It has a complete description of each soil located in Kent County, where they are located, the use suited to each soil type and what its limitations are. There are sections that deal with the management of different types of soils for cropland, pastureland, and rangeland. One section deals with the management of the soils for wildlife that can be used by anyone interested in developing his land for wildlife.

The Engineering section provides information of special interest to farmers, ranchers, builders, contractors and private citizens. Discussions in this section are the soil properties that effect construction and maintenance of roads, pipelines, building and home foundations, water

storage facilities, terraces, diversions, ponds, cess pools, and septic system filter fields. It will tell you if your soil is suited to the construction of any of the items mentioned above and how to select a site that has the best soil suited to them. It will tell you how corrosive different types of soil is on steel and concrete and many more interesting facts about your soil.

This publication will take a lot of the mystery out of why your SCS personnel will encourage the use of certain practices such as crop rotation, crop residue management and strip cropping of different types of soil. Or why we may tell you that a pond is not likely to hold water in certain types of soil. It may tell you why you have trouble with your cess pool or septic system because your soil has a very slow permeability or what soils a septic system will work well in. These are just a few of the many uses for this Soil Survey.

This publication will serve many uses to many of the residents of Kent County and the Soil Conservation Service encourages anyone that is interested to drop by your local SCS office in the Court House. We will be glad to furnish you with a copy and answer any questions you may have about this publication and to advise you on any specific problems you may have on your soils.

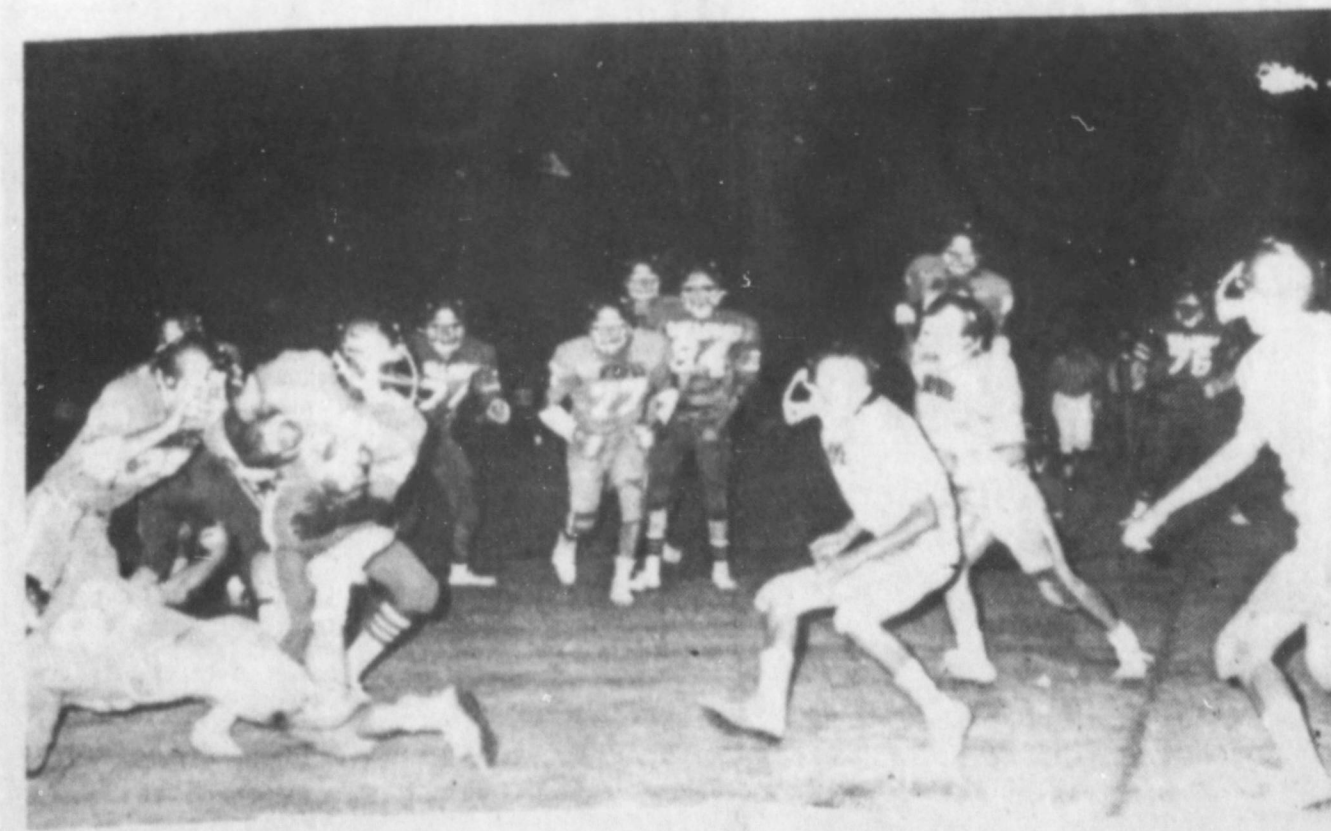

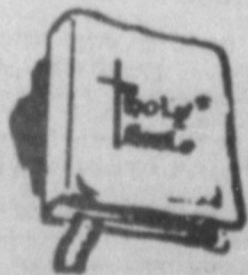

Moth May Stump The Tumbleweed

Those tumbling tumbleweeds may make for rhythmic cowboy ballads, but they're costly nuisances for Western farmers and ranchers.

Now a tiny white moth from Pakistan may prove to be the undoing of at least one type of tumbleweed, if an experimental project underway in California is successful.

This particular tumbleweed, the Russian thistle, is the only plant attacked by the moth. In fact, the moth's craving for the weed keeps it under control in Pakistan and makes the plant much smaller there than it is in the American west.

Scientists believe importing the moth for use against the Russian thistle could greatly reduce the plant's population in this country, even if it does not completely wipe out the weed.

The Russian thistle is believed to have started in this country in the early 1870's when some flax seed from Russia was planted in South Dakota. Besides being a costly weed, it also is a host plant for the beet leafhopper which spreads a "curly top" disease in crops.

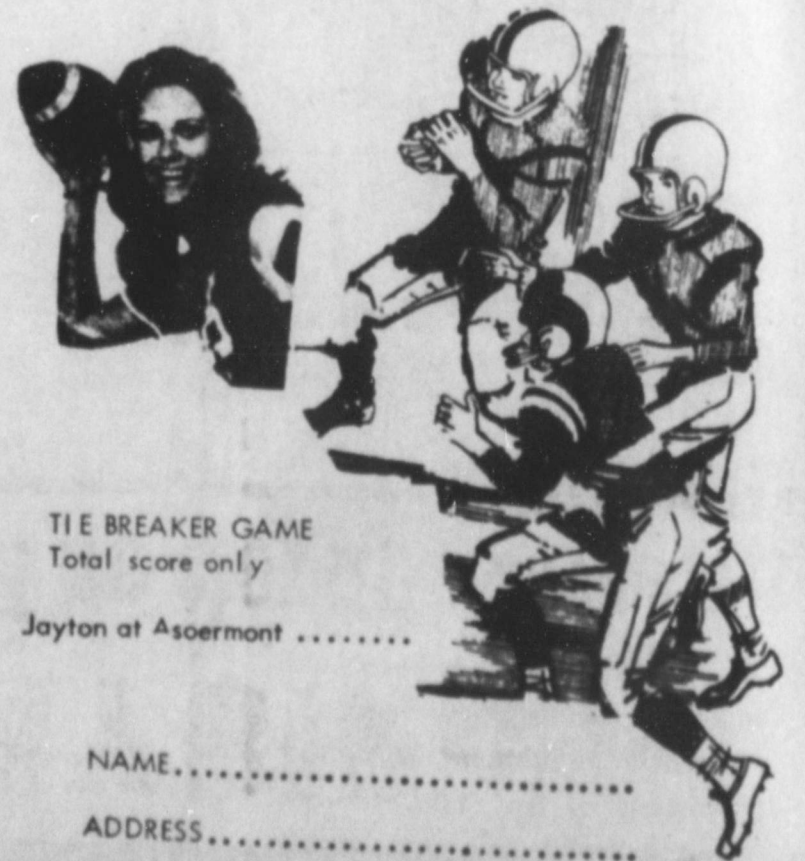
