



### **Highway Improvements Planned For The County**

ments in Kent County are included in a \$50.2 million safety and improvement program for 1975 approved recently by the Texas Highway Commission.

Roger G. Welsch. District Engineer of District 8 (Abilene), stated that the program includes a seal coat (asphalt and aggregate overlay) on the travel lanes for the following projects: U.S. 380 -From the St. 70 Junction south of Jayton to Stonewall County Line. Estimated cost for the

project is \$17,5000. The 1975 State High-

ment and Farm to Market Road Improvement Program statewide include 709 projects in counties of the state, involving 4,328.2 miles of roads.

Fifty-two percent of the work is on U.S. and State numbered routes, 47 percent is on Farm to Market Roads and one percent is reserved for later assignments.







AUSTIN-Some 565 farmers and ranchers have qualified for Family Land Heritage Day Oct. 14 at the State Fair and around twothirds of these are expected to attend awards activities. Agriculture Commissioner John C. White has announced.

White will present honorees with a gold and white scroll-like certificate suitable for framing at 1 p.m. ceremonies at the fair's Music Hall.

"We are expecting a big day," White said. "This is the inaugural Family Land Heritage ceremony and we want these families who have given so much to Texas agriculture to return home with pleasant memories and a sense of their contribution."

The Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) established the Family Land Heritage Program this summer to honor those farmers and ranchers whose families have worked the same land for 100 years or more.

Activities will begin at 9 a.m. with registration in the Food and Fiber Pavilion on the fair grounds. Coffee and rolls will be served in the VIP Lounge of the building and guests will be able to visit informally with other families.

A special showing of 'This Land of Texas," a sight and sound production on Texas' agricultural heritage is scheduled. Guests will also tour the Food and Fiber exhibits and the oldfashioned Country Store display of TDA's Marketing Division.

Washington, D. C. Unless plans have to be changed, beginning to-morrow, October 11, the Congress will be in recess until the 12th of November. In most parts of the

country the general elect-

ion on November 5 means the real election. Since all House Members and one-third of the U.S. Senators are up for reelection they feel they must get back to campaign and there is little time left for them to be active back home. Those who are being contested are aware that people are restive about many things and that it is not a favorable time for incumbents. It is a time of 'get the rascals out" and catches

everyone who is "in". A. 'lame duck' session is scheduled to begin on November 12 and could continue until Christmas but the hope is to adjourn about December 6 until January. There are big issues remaining to be resolved. Some legislation, such as appro-priation bills, of which there fourteen covering major operations of the Government, must be enacted. In other areas there is legislation considered to be a "must" before the expiration of the 93rd Congress. This ometimes becomes a

matter of opinion, but whatever can be done to deal with inflation and all things connected with it is a real necessity. No real course of action has yet been decided upon by the Congress or the President, although a myriad of ideas and proposals are kicking around.

The President is submitting to the congress his recommendations in some of these areas, including tax changes. 

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Money By Mistake

Martin took a \$37.50 check to the bank to be cashed. But the teller, absentmindedly overlooking the decimal point, counted out \$3,750. Martin accepted the money without a word and went home rejoicing.

But his joy did not last long. The bank discovered the mistake, reclaimed the money, and then had Martin arrested on a charge of larceny.



At the trial, he pleaded not

"It was their error, not mine," he reasoned. "They gave me that money of their own free will."

Nevertheless, the court ruled that Martin was indeed guilty of larceny. The court said he committed the crime by taking money that he knew wasn't his, fully intending to keep it.

Courts generally agree. In-the view of the law, an accidental overpayment is supposed to be handed back at once.

But what if Martin had accepted the money in all innocence, not discovering the error until he got home? If he decided at that point to keep it, would he be guilty of larceny? Many courts say no, although

he would probably be guilty of a lesser offense. As one judge explained, larceny technically involves a dishonest purpose at the very moment of taking.

Nor is it larceny if someone takes another person's property under the mistaken-but reasonable-belief that he has a legal right to do so.

That kind of a case arose when a landlady noticed that one of her roomers had spilled ink on a carpet. To make sure he would pay for cleaning the carpet, she took a watch out of his room as se-

As a matter of law, she had no claim on the watch. But when the roomer had her haled into court on a charge of larceny, the judge found her not guilty. The judge said she had acted in good faith, without the slightest intention of keeping the watch for herself.
