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Cranberry Glazed Turkey

10 to 12 lb. turkey

10 cups soft bread cubes (about 14 slices) 1 cup chopped walnuts 1/2 cup chopped onion teaspoon salt

teaspoon leaf rosemary 1 teaspoon ground sage 1/2 teaspoon leaf thyme 1/4 teaspoon pepper 2 cup water or broth

1/2 cup butter or margarine.

Prepare turkey for baking. (If frozen, thaw first and follow label directions.) In large bowl, combine remaining ingredients except Cranberry

Glaze; toss lightly to combine. Stuff turkey cavity and neck portion with stuffing mixture.

Bake at 325° at 18-20 Min. per lb.

Prepare Cranberry Glaze; brush on turkey. Return to oven for about 15 minutes. basting frequently, until nicely glazed. Serve remaining glaze with turkey. 10 to 12

Cranberry Glaze: In medium saucepan, heat cranberry sauce until somewhat thinned, stirring constantly. Add apple juice and butter; continue to heat, surring constantly, until butter has melted.

Washington, Nov. 14--The U. S. Department of ulture (USDA) today announced that the 1975 upland program will have a national base acreage allotment of 00,000 acres and a national production goal of 12,559,000 hard bales of 480 pounds, net weight. The acreage ent is the same as for 1974 and the production goal ares with 14,802,000 bales for this year.

Also announced today were a target price of 38 cents per d unchanged from 1974--and apportionment of the nal base acreage allotment to states.

The Department had announced other major program sions earlier. On Aug. 26, USDA said there will be no ge set-aside or conserving base requirements under the nd cotton or the feed grain and wheat programs next year s release 2433-74). On Oct. 31, the department announced iminary loan rate of 34.27 cents per pound, applicable to ling one-inch upland cotton (micronaire 3.5 through 4.8) eight, at average U. S. Location, and a seed cotton loan im for the 1975 crop. (micronaire is a measure of fiber

Water, Inc. Takes **New Look At Water Importation Plan**

Water, Inc officials have present procedures.' taken a positive stance on the Bureau of Reclamation, Corps of Engineers study of an important plan for West Texas and Eastern New Mexico. They have viewed the study as a giant step forward, a "poor press"not withstanding.

On the positive side, the study found that a supplemental water supply is needed on the High Plains of West Texas and Eastern New Mexico, that surplus water is available in the Mississippi River system and that from an engineering standpoint, facilities could be built to transport the water.

The single dosconcerting finding was "the importation alternative plan just cannot be economically or fmancially justified using

The key to this finding, however is "using present procedures." This phrase refers to procedures no longer in use which tabulated benefits only to the primary water user. Already, since the study was completed, procedures have changed which take into consideration some secondary benefits, and further procedures are anticipated within the coming year.

"All indications point to criteria revision by mid-1975 that will justify the feasibility of the import project" said Duncan Ellison, Water, Inc. executive director. "We continue to work closely with federal authorities for criteria. that will fairly reflect the total. project benefits" he said.




